Purpose

To seek Council's direction for the City of Vaughan to obtain a loan of the 'Outcome of the War of 1812' Exhibit (the "Exhibit") from the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (the "MCFN") and showcase it in honour of National Indigenous History Month.

Report Highlights

- The City of Vaughan has proclaimed June 2024 National Indigenous History Month.
- The Exhibit tells the story of the MCFN who fought alongside the British in the war of 1812 and settled the Toronto Purchase Specific Claim in 2010, and their connection to Toronto's land and waters.
- The City of Vaughan seeks to borrow and showcase the Exhibit from the MCFN as part of Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action 45iii & 57, which pertain to respect for treaty relationships and call for related professional development and training.
- Having the Exhibit prominently displayed in Vaughan will share a First Nations perspective on Canada's history, provide an opportunity for residents of Vaughan to recognize and learn about traditions and history of one of the First Nations communities closest to Vaughan and promote understanding, reconciliation and respect for Indigenous cultures.

Recommendations

- 1. That Staff be authorized to proceed with all necessary negotiations and arrangements in connection with the loan of the Exhibit to the City;
- 2. That the Deputy City Manager, Corporate Services, City Treasurer and Chief Financial Officer, or designate, be authorized to sign a loan agreement and any other required documentation with respect to the loan of the Exhibit to the City, in a form satisfactory to Legal Services, and to take any other actions necessary or ancillary to entering into the agreement; and
- 3. That the Deputy City Manager, Corporate Services, City Treasurer and Chief Financial Officer, or designate, be authorized to amend the loan agreement or any associated documentation, or to terminate the loan agreement as necessary, in consultation with Legal Services.

Background

Vaughan is situated on the territory and Treaty 13 lands of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. These lands are also the traditional territory of the Huron-Wendat and Haudenosaunee people. Vaughan is currently home to many First Nations, Métis and Inuit people today.

The Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (MCFN) have a reserve near Hagersville, Ontario, about 38 kilometres southwest of Hamilton. It has roughly 2,570 members, with nearly two-thirds living off reserve. The First Nation is part of the Ojibwe (Anishinaabe) Nation. The City of Vaughan continually strives to strengthen its relationship with MCFN.

The Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's Call to Action 45iii is part of a broader set of recommendations aimed at addressing the legacies of residential schools and advancing the process of Canadian reconciliation with Indigenous peoples. Specifically, Call to Action 45iii calls upon Canadians to "Renew or establish Treaty relationships based on principles of mutual recognition, mutual respect, and shared responsibility for maintaining those relationships into the future."

Call to Action 57 "call[s] upon federal, provincial, territorial, and municipal governments to provide education to public servants on the history of Aboriginal peoples, including the history and legacy of residential schools, the *United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples*, Treaties and Aboriginal rights, Indigenous law, and Aboriginal–Crown relations. This will require skills-based training in intercultural competency, conflict resolution, human rights, and anti-racism."

Item 1 Page 2 of 6 Both Calls to Action are part of a comprehensive effort by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission to address the injustices and lasting impacts of Canada's residential school system on Indigenous communities and to lay the groundwork for reconciliation and a better future. The City of Vaughan is committed to working in harmony with these calls to action.

Analysis and Options

The City of Vaughan has proclaimed the month of June as National Indigenous History Month for 2024

The City of Vaughan has proclaimed June 2024 as National Indigenous History Month and National Indigenous Peoples Day on June 21, 2024, to honour and recognize Indigenous peoples and history in Vaughan and across Canada. Indigenous History Month is an opportunity to recognize and learn about the traditions and histories of First Nations, Métis and Inuit people and to promote understanding, reconciliation and respect for Indigenous cultures.

During Indigenous History Month, the City proudly honours the rich heritage and vibrant cultures of Indigenous peoples in Canada and acknowledges their unique roles and stewardship of the sacred land we call home.

The War of 1812 Exhibit

The Exhibit teaches visitors about the long-term consequences of the War of 1812 for the First Nations through the experience of the MCFN.

The story tells of a people who have a historic and meaningful connection to the land and waters of the Toronto area. Their ancestors were allied with the British and fought in the war. Almost 200 years later, they concluded a fair and just settlement of the Toronto Purchase Specific Claim in 2010.

The display includes cases and tables which will display artifacts and historically important items. Posters and an education panel will tell the background story while explaining the importance of each item. Educational booklets and reading materials will accompany the Exhibit to describe the work.

Borrowing the Exhibit will provide the City with the opportunity to honour the MCFN and to share the knowledge to be gained from it with residents of and visitors to Vaughan

The City of Vaughan is delighted to have the opportunity to borrow the Exhibit and to showcase it during Indigenous Heritage Month. This Exhibit holds great historical significance, and we are eager to display it to honour the MCFN.

From May 28th to July 3rd, 2024, the Exhibit will be displayed at the entrance of Vaughan City Hall (Alcove 2). Following this period, it will be displayed at Vaughan Public Library's Pierre Berton Resource Library from July 5th to Aug. 2nd, 2024.

Having the Exhibit showcased in this way will share a First Nations perspective on Canada's history with a particular focus on the era of the war of 1812 and its effects. It will provide an opportunity for residents of Vaughan to recognize and learn about traditions and history of one of the First Nations communities geographically closest to Vaughan and promote understanding, reconciliation and respect for Indigenous cultures.

The Exhibit will be fully insured during the transportation periods and while it is in the City's possession to mitigate any risk.

The Exhibit will be fully insured while it is in the City's possession and during the periods it is being transported in a manner that complies with City's normal processes for the borrowing of artwork and artifacts owned by a third party.

Financial Impact

Transportation

Transportation costs for the Exhibit, which includes careful handling of delicate historical items, are projected at an estimated amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00). This figure accounts for secure transport services to be arranged by the City from 1) the Community Centre on the reserve near Hagersville to City Hall; 2) City Hall to Pierre Berton Resource Library; and 3) Pierre Berton Resource Library back to the Community Centre near Hagersville, totaling a distance of approximately 270 km.

Honorarium

The City will provide MCFN with an honorarium totalling one thousand, five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) in recognition of the opportunity to borrow and display the Exhibit. This honorarium is a gesture of appreciation for the sharing of their cultural heritage by the MCFN and will serve to strengthen the relationship between the City and the MCFN community.

The financial impact of these expenditures is confined to the current fiscal period, with no anticipated recurring costs. The funding for both the transportation of the Exhibit and the honorarium will be drawn from the existing capital budget allocations. The necessary funds are available within the current budget framework of the Office of the Chief Human Resources Officer, thus negating the need for additional budgetary amendments.

Operational Impact

In preparation for borrowing the Exhibit, consultations have been conducted with multiple departments within the City to ensure a cohesive operational approach.

In particular, the departments of Facilities Management, Communications and Engagement, Vaughan Public Libraries, Archives, Economic Development, Legal Services, and the Clerk's Office have been integral to the planning process, offering their specialized input to align all aspects and expertise in anticipation of hosting the Exhibit. This includes selection and logistics of venue, communication and marketing plans and transportation. Collaboration between these departments will continue so as to ensure a seamless and successful experience.

Broader Regional Impacts/Considerations

The showcasing of the Exhibit at City Hall and later at Pierre Berton Resource Library represents not only a local initiative but also an event of regional interest with significant historical relevance. The Town of Aurora has expressed interest in showcasing the Exhibit in Aurora Town Square from August 4th to September 30th, 2024, which demonstrates the Exhibit's regional appeal and the collaborative spirit among municipalities within the York Region.

The interest expressed by partners within York Region to host the Exhibit reflects a collective engagement in cultural exchange and public education. The City of Vaughan is actively engaged in discussions with other civic partners who are interested in exploring potential hosting opportunities. This regional dialogue is instrumental in expanding the reach and impact of the Exhibit, promoting a wider appreciation of Indigenous heritage and contributions.

Conclusion

A successful showcasing of the Exhibit, will contribute to the City's celebration of National Indigenous History Month and its advancement of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action.

This initiative will provide an opportunity for residents of Vaughan to obtain knowledge of Indigenous heritage and learn about a piece of history through the lens of an indigenous community. It will also strengthen the relationship of the City of Vaughan and its residents with the MCFN.

Directing staff to proceed with this initiative will support the City's promotion of Indigenous Heritage Month and result in benefits to the City and its residents while underscoring the City's commitment to strengthening its relationship with MCFN.

Purpose **Purpose**

This report seeks Council's approval of the Reimagining Black Futures in Vaughan: 2024-2031 Addressing Anti-Black Racism Action Plan, which outlines the City's strategic approach, action plan and key measures addressing barriers to the full and meaningful participation of the Black community in services, programs, events and general city life.

Report Highlights

- The Reimagining Black Futures in Vaughan: 2024-2031 Addressing Anti-Black Racism Action Plan was developed in consultation with diverse Black communities in the City, the Special Advisory Committee and relevant stakeholders using online surveys, in-person and online focus groups.
- The Action Plan spans 8 years or two terms of Council, containing 3 pillars aligning with the Term of Council Strategic Priorities with approximately 25 Objectives, 58 Key Action items and accountability measures.
- The Action Plan takes a universal approach to addressing anti-Black racism, with 31% of key activities that address broad systemic inequities. The remaining 69% are highly adaptable and can be used to achieve similar outcomes with different communities (i.e., accessibility, newcomers, Indigenous, etc.).

Recommendations

- 1. That the Reimagining Black Futures in Vaughan: 2024-2031 Addressing Anti-Black Racism Action Plan be approved for implementation; and
- 2. That staff be directed to monitor and measure progress and provide annual updates to Council via the annual updates on the overall Diversity Equity and Inclusion Plan.

Background

Anti-Black racism is historic, pervasive, and systemic in Canada. It is both visible and invisible. It is entrenched into societal practices that reflect and reinforce beliefs, attitudes, prejudice, stereotyping and/or discrimination directed at people of African descent and is rooted in their unique history and experience of enslavement and colonization here in Canada. Anti-Black racism is micro (as seen in day-to-day interactions) and structural (as seen in laws and policies). While racism negatively impacts all racialized people, disparities between Black people and other marginalized groups clearly show that Black people continue to be more profoundly impacted by racism.

Through the development of Reimagining Black Futures in Vaughan: 2024-2031 Addressing Anti-Black Racism Action Plan (Action Plan), the City is committed to identifying and addressing barriers to the full and meaningful participation of the Black community in services, programs, events and general city life. The City, through the procurement process, contracted the Diversity Institute (DI) to conduct community consultations to inform and develop the final strategy, action plan and key measures.

Community Engagement

Community Consultation: Survey

The Diversity Institute (DI), in collaboration with the City, developed a survey focused on the following sections:

• Experiences with anti-Black racism in the City: to understand perceptions and experiences of anti-Black racism, as well as senses of belonging and allyship.

- Experiences with City events and services: to understand experiences accessing and using City services, as well as to understand participation in City events and the needs of Black entrepreneurs and Black business owners in the City.
- Experiences communicating and engaging with the City: to understand experiences receiving City information, channels used, and opportunities for improvement.
 Further, to understand perceptions of engagement – whether diverse Black communities believe that the City seeks their input and feedback on initiatives.
- Open-ended questions: embedded throughout sections to provide diverse Black communities with an opportunity to share recommendations for change related to services, events, communications, and others. The survey also included open-ended questions at the end of the survey geared towards understanding what the City does well broadly and what can be improved.

The survey collected demographic information including racial identity, gender identity, sexual orientation, Indigenous identity, whether participants are living with a disability, information on citizenship and newcomer status, age, religion, and languages spoken. This accounts for intersectionality, and where possible, DI will disaggregate findings to understand specific experiences and needs across diverse Black communities.

Community Consultations: Focus Groups

DI held a series of community conversations in 2023 with individuals from diverse Black communities in the City to understand current experiences and barriers to participation in City initiatives, as well as their recommendations for change. Sessions were held both virtually and in person to provide flexibility and consideration for individuals with different needs.

- March 12: General experiences of Black individuals
- March 14: Experiences of Black Immigrant individuals
- March 15: Experiences of Black Seniors
- March 27: Experiences of Black Youth
- March 28: Experiences of Black members of the 2SLGBTQ+ community
- March 29: General experiences of Black individuals
- March 30: Experiences of Black Business Owners
- April 12: General Session
- April 20: Youth in-person session
- April 25: Adult in-person session

Session planning centred around the following efforts:

- Intentional engagement and outreach: In Phase 1 and Phase 2, DI intentionally and proactively reached out to organizations supporting diverse Black communities, as well as individuals part of the Black community, to share project efforts and objectives, and to encourage individuals to participate.
- Widespread, accessible, and intersectional participation: DI mitigated and addressed barriers to participation in engagement activities for diverse Black communities, including planning around other City events, providing virtual and inperson sessions, considering religious holidays and practices, and others. DI further ensured that sessions considered the intersectional experiences of the Black population and held sessions specific for Black immigrants, Black youth, Black seniors, Black members of the 2SLGBTQ+ community, and Black business owners.
- Respectful and solutions-oriented dialogues: DI created safe and welcoming spaces for Black individuals to share stories, barriers, and experiences of anti-Black racism while focusing conversations on solutions and recommendations for change. This was fostered through pre-session communications on session expectations and goals, mindful facilitation tactics, and trauma counsellor support.

Participation

- Consultations/focus groups/1-1 meetings: across both virtual and in-person sessions from Phases 1 & 2, 81 individuals participated.
- Survey: 108 individuals completed the survey, and 83 of them were Black.
- A total of 81 unique individuals attended the sessions in Phases 1 and 2, which were held either virtually or in person. This figure excludes any repeat attendances within the same session and the presence of DI individuals. However, it does include people who attended multiple different sessions, such as someone who participated in both a virtual and an in-person session.

City Department Meetings

DI engaged with City departments to share information about the project, understand departmental responsibilities and activities, and seek staff and leadership perspectives on how they envision their department's work supporting diverse Black communities.

Following the drafting of the Action Plan, the DI re-engaged the various City departments to ensure the drafted recommendations aligned with the City's various responsibilities, plans, etc. This internal City review involved feedback from 14 departments to ensure that City staff remained informed and engaged, and the appropriate department had been engaged. This feedback was used to further revise the plan ahead of the public feedback campaign in a manner that ensures the City

remains committed to eliminating the biases and barriers that impact diverse Black communities.

Public Validation Workshops

DI held a series of virtual and in-person workshops in 2023 to present the draft Addressing Anti-Black Racism Action Plan and ensure the community had an opportunity to comment on the plan components. In conversation with community leaders, diverse Black communities, and individuals who had previously engaged in the survey and prior consultations, DI hosted several collaborative workshops to share the draft plan and receive feedback:

- Sept 13: In person at the Civic Centre Resource Library with the public
- Sept 14: Virtual over Microsoft Teams with the SAC
- Sept 18: Virtual over Zoom with the public

Special Advisory Committee

Throughout the process, DI engaged and collaborated with the Special Advisory Committee (SAC) to share progress, findings, and the draft Action Plan for their review and feedback. In addition to the virtual validation workshop, the SAC was given additional opportunities to provide written feedback on the plan. The SAC was also provided space in the plan to include a message, ensuring their perspectives are integrated into the final plan.

Analysis and Options

The City of Vaughan's commitment to addressing anti-Black racism is reflected in our comprehensive action plan, which has been shaped through extensive community consultations. These consultations revealed the diverse experiences and feedback of Black communities within Vaughan, underlining the critical need for an action plan that not only addresses anti-Black racism but also fosters meaningful connections between the City and its Black residents. This plan aims to continuously engage the community, providing pathways to build stronger, collaborative relationships that enable full and meaningful participation in the City's civic, cultural, and economic life.

The action plan is extensive, reflecting the depth and breadth of the issues at hand, as well as the City's commitment to long-term, sustainable change. The Action Plan takes a universal approach to addressing anti-Black racism, with 31% of key activities that address broad systemic inequities. The remaining 69% are highly adaptable and can be used to achieve similar outcomes with different communities (i.e., accessibility, newcomers, Indigenous, etc.). It spans across two council terms, approximately from 2024 to 2031, allowing sufficient time for the development and implementation of a detailed plan. This timeline ensures that the City can align the action items with

departmental capabilities, staff, and budget resources, while also accommodating necessary adjustments over time.

Benefits:

- Enhanced Community Engagement: By incorporating feedback and experiences directly from the Black communities in Vaughan, the action plan ensures that initiatives are grounded in real needs and perspectives, enhancing their effectiveness and relevance.
- **Strengthened Relationships:** The plan emphasizes building collaborative relationships between the City and Black communities, fostering trust and mutual respect, which are foundational for meaningful participation and inclusion.
- **Strategic Alignment:** The involvement of Senior Leadership Leaders and all departments ensures that the action plan is fully integrated into the City's broader strategic objectives, enhancing cohesion and impact across initiatives.

Risks:

- **Implementation Challenges:** Given the extensive scope of the plan, there may be challenges in aligning departmental capabilities and resources along with competing priorities with the planned initiatives, requiring ongoing adjustments and flexibility.
- **Community Engagement:** Sustaining long-term engagement with the community may present challenges, necessitating innovative approaches to keep stakeholders involved and informed throughout the implementation phase.

Financial Impact

Through careful planning, budgetary considerations, and business case reviews, the plan will work toward ensuring that resources are allocated efficiently and effectively to support its objectives.

Operational Impact

In developing the action plan, DI and the City's DEI team collaborated closely with key internal departments and leaders to secure buy-in and ensure the plan's actions were both relevant and feasible. This foundational work ensures organizational support and a clear understanding of departmental roles in advancing the plan's goals.

Upon approval of the Action Plan, the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion team will lead the development of the implementation plan, working with all City departments to ensure appropriate timelines for execution. This phase will involve providing support and working collaboratively with relevant stakeholder departments to identify necessary staff and budget resources to support the implementation of the Action Plan through the City's Business Case Review process.

Broader Regional Impacts/Considerations

The action plan thoughtfully includes key items that extend support to the broader initiatives of York Region, addressing areas like immigration and settlement that are beyond the City's jurisdiction. By aligning certain aspects of our strategy with regional efforts, we aim to foster a collaborative approach to systemic change across the region. This alignment ensures that our action plan contributes to a unified regional effort, leveraging our collective resources and influence to address anti-Black racism more effectively.

Conclusion

In summary, the approval and implementation of the Reimagining Black Futures in Vaughan: 2024 – 2031 Addressing Anti-Black Racism Action Plan, a comprehensive strategy designed to address anti-Black racism within our community, is recommended. To ensure the plan's effectiveness and its alignment with our long-term goals, we also recommend that staff be tasked with monitoring progress and delivering annual updates to Council as part of the broader Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Plan. Together, these steps represent a committed, structured approach to combating anti-Black racism, fostering a more inclusive and equitable community for all.

Home to nearly 345,000 people, its globally competitive economy includes more than 19,500 businesses, employing approximately 227,000 individuals. Vaughan traces its roots back to the historic communities of Concord, Kleinburg, Maple, Thornhill and Woodbridge.

This welcoming, diverse and forward-looking municipality is in the heart of York Region. Major city-building projects, like Vaughan's emerging downtown – the Vaughan Metropolitan Centre – and Canada's first smart hospital – the Cortellucci Vaughan Hospital – as well as the 900-acre North Maple Regional Park, continue to generate momentum and excitement.



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LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT

We respectfully acknowledge that the City of Vaughan is situated in the Territory and Treaty 13 lands of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. We also recognize the traditional territory of the Huron-Wendat and the Haudenosaunee. The City of Vaughan is currently home to many **First Nations, Métis** and Inuit people today. 

Message from the Special Advisory Committee

"Nothing for us, without us."

The City of Vaughan is home to diverse African, Caribbean and Black communities. Our unique contributions have helped to build a vibrant and prosperous city where people from different backgrounds, identities and living experiences live, work and play together. We celebrate our contributions and achievements while recognizing that anti-Black racism exists and must be addressed and dismantled.

The Addressing Anti-Black Racism Special Advisory Committee was established to centre the voices, expertise and lived experiences of African, Caribbean and Black communities, and the organizations that serve them, as the City embarked on a historic project to address anti-Black racism and dismantle barriers preventing the full and meaningful participation of these communities in services, programs, events and general city life through the development of the Reimagining Black Futures in Vaughan: Addressing Anti-Black Racism Action Plan.

Comprised of Black community members and policy leaders with lived and learned experience and/or expertise, we aim to:

- provide advice on the project.
- facilitate community connections.
- advise and guide the community engagement process.
- provide feedback on the reports in each phase of the project.
- provide feedback on the recommendations and action plan.

To members of African, Caribbean and Black communities: We see you, we hear you. You matter. We are committed to ensuring your perspectives are included through continuous engagement and have advocated for the implementation of an accountability framework that embeds transparency throughout all stages of the action plan while monitoring progress and holding stakeholders responsible.

It should be noted that addressing anti-Black racism isn't the sole responsibility of a special advisory committee or community members who courageously step forward to share their experiences and help identify and address anti-Black racism by improving City programs, policies, procedures and services. It's the shared responsibility of each and every one of us: the Mayor, Council, City staff, and all residents and visitors.

We cannot hope to effectively address anti-Black racism without listening to, learning about and believing lived experiences of African, Caribbean and Black communities, even when those experiences don't match our own. This requires empathy. It's a collective step we can all take towards reimagining Black futures in the city of Vaughan.

We hope you'll walk alongside us as we journey together.



Community Profile

The Black community in the city, as part of Canada's broader mosaic, is a testament to the rich diversity and dynamic growth that characterizes our nation. Statistics Canada data from 2021 paints a portrait of a community that is not only expanding, but also increasingly contributing to the socio-cultural and economic fabric of the country.

GROWING POPULATION AND DIVERSITY

- In 2021, more than 1.5 million people in Canada identified as Black, a significant increase of 349,000 since 2016.¹ This growth underlines the expansion of diverse Black communities.
- The Black population in Canada reported more than 300 ethnic or cultural origins, with the most frequently reported being African, Jamaican, Haitian and Canadian.² This diversity enriches our city with a multitude of perspectives, traditions and experiences.





EDUCATIONAL ACHIEVEMENTS

- 32.4 per cent of the Black population aged 25 to 64 years held a bachelor's degree or higher in 2021, an increase from 27 per cent in 2016.³ This trend underscores the community's commitment to education and professional development.
- The educational achievements vary within the community, with 57 per cent of second-generation African-origin Black women holding a bachelor's degree or higher, significantly contributing to the intellectual and skilled workforce in the city.⁴

LABOUR MARKET PARTICIPATION

 The participation of the Black community in the labour market is robust, with about two-thirds (66.6 per cent) of Black Canadians aged 15 years and older being employed as of December 2022.⁵ This is a testament to the community's strong work ethic and desire to contribute meaningfully to the economy.

AGE DEMOGRAPHICS

 The Black population is notably younger than the total population in Canada, with a median age of 30.2 years.⁶ This youthful demographic is a valuable asset, bringing energy, innovation and a forward-looking perspective to the city.



HISTORICAL CONTRIBUTIONS

 The contributions of the Black community to Canada's heritage are long-standing and significant, dating back to the early 1600s with figures like Mathieu Da Costa, who is said to have interpreted for French and Dutch traders and explorers in the early 17th century.⁷ This rich history is a cornerstone of our nation's story.

BLACK CANADIANS IN THE MILITARY

 Black individuals have a rich and long-standing history of serving in the military, dating back to the early settlement and conflicts in what is now Canada. They have served in different military actions, including the War of 1812.⁸ They have been part of the Canadian Armed Forces in various capacities, overcoming challenges and discrimination, especially during earlier periods. Their contributions span multiple conflicts and peacekeeping missions. Notably, during the First World War and Second World War, Black Canadian soldiers served with distinction, although they often faced segregation and limited opportunities.⁹ Over time, their perseverance and dedication helped pave the way for more inclusive policies in the Canadian military, reflecting the country's growing recognition of diversity and equality within its armed forces.



SPORT

 Black Canadians have excelled in sports, breaking barriers and achieving remarkable success. Marita Payne-Wiggins, a track and field athlete, and her son Andrew Wiggins, a professional basketball player, are among the many inspirational figures.¹⁰ Their association with the city highlights the homegrown talent and athletes who achieve national and international acclaim. Moreover, Black Canadians have played a crucial role in advocating for diversity and inclusion in sports, extending impact beyond athletic accomplishments.

ARTS

• Black Canadian artists have made significant contributions to the arts, including visual arts and music, where they continue to influence other artists and contribute to a legacy that resonates within and beyond Canada's borders.

LOOKING AHEAD

• The Black community in Canada continues to grow, with projections suggesting a doubling of the population by 2041.¹¹ This growth represents not just numbers, but an expansion of ideas, creativity and entrepreneurial spirit.

As we observe and celebrate the International Decade for People of African Descent, it is crucial to recognize and appreciate the multi-faceted nature of the Black population in the city. Their diverse backgrounds, educational accomplishments and active participation in the labour market are integral to the city's prosperity and vibrancy. As a community, we are committed to supporting and uplifting this vital segment of our population, acknowledging their challenges and celebrating their successes.



OUR COMMITMENT COMMITMENT TO DIVERSE BLACK COMMUNITIES


The city is home to a large, vibrant and diverse Black community with a rich history and culture. The community contributes to the growth and economic prosperity of the city through local Black-owned businesses and Black-owned organizations supporting community initiatives. Addressing and dismantling all forms of anti-Black racism is crucial for ensuring diverse Black communities are supported.

According to the Government of Ontario, anti-Black racism refers to attitudes, beliefs and discriminatory practices, among others, that are directed at Black individuals and communities.¹² This includes individual acts of prejudice, discrimination and racism, as well as racism that is embedded within systems, institutions and societal structures.¹³ Although the Black community may share common experiences of racism and discrimination, experiences may vary within the community given intersectionality and overlapping and compounded forms of oppression related to ability, citizenship, gender identity, sexual orientation, age, religion and other forms of identity.

The City is committed to identifying and dismantling barriers to the full participation of communities in City initiatives and fostering inclusive services, programming and events. In our efforts to ensure inclusive societies and communities, we must ensure that we do not overlook the specific and unique needs of different communities, particularly those who have experienced, and continue to experience, racism and discrimination. Reimagining Black Futures in Vaughan: Addressing Anti-Black Racism Action Plan (the action plan) forms part of this commitment and reflects our ongoing effort to dismantle anti-Black racism and support diverse Black communities. By focusing on and implementing strategies aimed at intentionally dismantling systemic barriers, we lay a foundation for creating more equitable and inclusive societies and communities for all


Our Shared Values

As part of the consultation process, diverse Black communities were asked to share the key priorities they wanted to see reflected throughout this action plan, as well as in the daily work of the City. These shared values represent important values that can be applied in the development and administration of City processes to break down barriers and promote belonging. The shared values below are intended to give context to the actions throughout the plan and serve as a cornerstone of collaboration between the City and the diverse Black communities living in Vaughan.



Developing the Action Plan

Addressing anti-Black racism is outlined as a key priority in the City's Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Plan 2022-2026, and the Reimagining Black Futures in Vaughan: Addressing Anti-Black Racism Action Plan further aligns with the strategic priorities of the City's 2022-2026 Term of Council Service Excellence Strategic Plan. The action plan provides key actions for supporting diverse Black communities that fall within the City's jurisdiction and was built in collaboration with diverse Black communities in the city. Their insights, perspectives and recommendations have shaped the objectives, key actions and accountability measures within the action plan. Community engagement was central to the action plan's development, including the following efforts.



Community Engagement

CITY-WIDE SURVEY

A comprehensive survey was used to understand community perspectives on anti-Black racism in the city, experiences with City events and services, City communications, business development and other areas of focus. The findings from the survey were used to develop the objectives, key actions and accountability measures embedded within the action plan.

COMMUNITY CONSULTATIONS AND WORKSHOPS

Community consultations were held with diverse Black communities, including Black seniors, youth, newcomers, members of the 2SLGBTQ+ community and business owners. Sessions aimed to understand experiences of anti-Black racism, as well as experiences accessing and using City services, events, communication materials and channels, and others. Sessions focused on building recommendations and determining ways the City can support diverse Black communities. Following a draft of the action plan, diverse Black communities participated in a series of workshops to review the proposed objectives, key actions and accountability measures to provide additional feedback and insights.

General Accountability Framework

Implementing the action plan includes creating a general accountability framework designed to foster transparency, uphold responsibility and monitor progress.

MAYOR AND MEMBERS OF COUNCIL


The Mayor and Members of Council will provide oversight of the Reimagining Black Futures in Vaughan: Addressing Anti-Black Racism Action Plan, and receive annual updates from the City Manager on the municipality's progress toward the action plan's key priorities and objectives.

SENIOR LEADERSHIP TEAM - EXECUTIVE

The Senior Leadership Team – Executive will lead the accountability for the action plan at the municipal level, and will receive and review quarterly reports on the progress of the action plan's objectives and key activities.

DIVERSITY, EQUITY AND INCLUSION (DEI) OFFICE

The Diversity and Inclusion Officer will create an implementation plan as well as onboard senior leaders and Council to the action plan. The implementation plan will be used to provide annual reports to senior leadership and Council to highlight the progress and outcomes achieved.





INTERNAL AUDIT

The City's anti-Black Racism efforts may be subject to audits by the City's Internal Audit department.

UPDATED FEEDBACK AND COMPLAINTS PROCESS

A recurring theme heard throughout the community consultations was a request for a mechanism to review and resolve complaints, including those related to racism and discrimination. While the City currently has a mechanism for filing complaints (including a webpage to do so), there are opportunities for this system to be expanded in consultation with stakeholder departments, including the DEI Office. An updated complaints process should include clear policies and procedures that aim to improve services for the benefit of all residents, visitors and the public. The complaints mechanism should include provisions to identify complaints stemming from treatment that the complainant feels violates the Ontario Human Rights Code. It is recommended that the expansion of the current complaints process be determined using the City's business case review process and all relevant departments be consulted.

STANDING ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON ADDRESSING ANTI-BLACK RACISM

It is recommended that the City forms a Standing Advisory Committee (SAC). This committee will advise Vaughan Council on issues faced by diverse Black communities and provide oversight and consultation on the implementation of this action plan. The SAC will help ensure all administrative processes and decisions are informed by a comprehensive understanding of community needs and aspirations. This proactive approach not only ensures inclusion and fairness, but also strengthens public trust and accountability. It is recommended that the committee be provided with an honoraria recognizing lived and learned expertise.

Commitment to Continuous **Engagement**

City programs, services, initiatives and engagement frameworks themselves should be designed in collaboration with diverse Black communities and the SAC.

RESULTS

Share results from efforts with diverse Black communities and the SAC and communities across the city to enhance transparency.

DEVELOPMENT

Collaborate with diverse Black communities and the SAC in the development and design of initiatives and services.

FOLLOW-UP

Engage diverse Black communities and the SAC in the follow-up, regrouping and aftermath of initiatives and services.

DELIVERY

Collaborate with diverse Black communities and the SAC in the delivery of initiatives and services.


OVERARCHING COMMITMENTS

The City is committed to including diverse Black communities in decision-making processes and removing biases and barriers from policies and procedures. The objectives and key actions within these overarching commitments reflect the City's ongoing effort to continuously address systemic barriers across all departments and all City initiatives.

OBJECTIVE 1: Embed the perspectives of diverse Black communities in City initiatives, and promote the engagement of diverse Black communities in City initiatives and feedback mechanisms.

Key Actions:

- Re-examine the City's Stakeholder and Community Engagement Strategy and Policy using an equity and inclusion lens to ensure the inclusive and fair involvement of diverse Black communities in projects and programs.
- Use best practices for engagement:
 - Engage with diverse Black communities to identify opportunities and mitigate existing service gaps.
 - Create welcoming spaces for open community dialogue.
 - Maintain ongoing communication throughout the engagement process.

OBJECTIVE 2: Encourage relationships with Black community organizations.


Key Actions:

- Continue to develop relationships with diverse Black organizations, service providers, community leaders and individuals.
- Establish a SAC of diverse Black individuals to advise Vaughan Council on City services, programs and events and guide the implementation of the action plan.
- Ensure opportunities for Vaughan Council and staff to attend and join events organized by diverse Black communities.

OBJECTIVE 3: Identify and adapt City policies and procedures to reduce systemic and institutional barriers for diverse Black communities.

Key Actions:

- Incorporate an addressing anti-Black racism lens into existing policy review cycles in consultation with the DEI Office.
- Provide ongoing training to all policy writers on addressing and preventing anti-Black racism in policy development and implementation.





PILLAR 1: SERVICE EXCELLENCE AND ACCOUNTABILITY

The City aims to provide services that are affordable, accessible and inclusive of the communities it serves.

Theme 1: City Services and Programming

DEI Office

OBJECTIVE: Provide City leadership, staff and volunteers with knowledge and tools to create inclusive environments.

Key Actions:

- Provide learning and development opportunities on addressing anti-Black racism to enhance awareness among Vaughan Council, leadership and staff.
- Ensure training is tailored to roles, responsibilities, services and programs, and is reviewed by the SAC.

OBJECTIVE: Develop an inclusive complaint process for City services and programs that addresses various forms of discrimination, with an emphasis on anti-Black racism.

Key Actions:

- Implement an external mechanism for documenting racism and discrimination.
- Provide guidance and support to ensure complaints related to racism and discrimination are appropriately addressed according to the updated complaints policy and procedure for complaint intake, resolution and documentation.



- Conduct reviews on complaints leveraging the suggested complaints process above.
- Involve offices such as the Integrity Commissioner, Internal Audit or third-party firms as required.

DEI Office Accountability Measures:

- Regularly benchmark and measure community satisfaction levels against progress in addressing racism and promoting inclusion.
- Continuous engagement by the established SAC on the implementation of the action plan.
- Ongoing review and documentation of received complaints and actions taken in response.
- Review and address complaints received via the expanded complaints process based on a determined, set review schedule.

Parks Infrastructure Planning and Development

OBJECTIVE: Develop and maintain spaces that incorporate the contributions of Black communities, ensuring the involvement of Black artists and designers in the planning and development of public spaces.

Key Actions:

- Develop inclusive signage within parks to highlight Black history, culture and art.
- Engage Black artists in designing public spaces via the Public Art Program and the future Social Procurement Policy.
- Review and amend the City's naming policies to honour Black individuals and refrain from names linked to colonialism and slavery.

Parks Infrastructure Planning and Development Accountability Measures:

- Biennial review of multilingual and culturally relevant signage.
- Quantitative involvement of Black artists in projects.



By-law and Compliance, Licensing and Permit Services

The By-law and Compliance, Licensing and Permit Services department has a responsibility to investigate and enforce potential regulatory by-law violations. The department is committed to ensuring enforcement mitigates biases and is informed by a nuanced understanding of anti-Black racism.

OBJECTIVE: Ensure unbiased by-law enforcement.

Key Action:

• Provide training for by-law staff to identify and address anti-Black racism.

OBJECTIVE: Enhance transparency in departmental and special event permitting processes.

Key Actions:

- Review and update the Special Events Permit among other permitting processes for clarity as needed.
- Offer support on permit application completion.

By-law and Compliance, Licensing and Permit Services Accountability Measures:

- Regular training sessions and feedback monitoring.
- Review effectiveness of application assistance.

Office of the City Clerk

OBJECTIVE: Encourage diverse Black community representation in Council committees through targeted outreach.

Key Actions:

- Review and communicate existing protocol services to ensure clarity.
- Implement intentional outreach and recruitment to increase diverse Black community representation in standing committees.

Office of the City Clerk Accountability Measure:

 Increased targeted promotion, outreach and communication aimed at increasing the participation of Black individuals in standing committees.

Public Records: Archives


OBJECTIVE: Represent diverse Black community histories within City archives.

Key Actions:

- Integrate comprehensive diverse Black community histories on the City's website.
- Collaborate with community groups, universities, libraries and experts in Black history to expand the City's archives including historical context of the city's name.

Public Records Accountability Measure:

• Continuous review of the archives.





Recreation Services

OBJECTIVE: Enhance equitable and inclusive access to diverse recreational activities for diverse Black communities.

Key Actions:

- Provide culturally relevant programming for diverse Black communities offering a range of programming that may include, but is not limited to, knitting and card classes, art classes, Caribbean and African music classes.
- Where possible, programs designed for diverse Black communities are facilitated by people with lived experience.
- Create and maintain inclusive and welcoming spaces for all Black community members including Black seniors, youth and Black members of the 2SLGBTQ+ community, among others.
- Promote existing options for affordable recreational support in accordance with the User Fee Policy and through RecAssist and regional subsidy programs.
- Gather and analyze data on the allocation of spaces to user groups, including tracking the number of requests approved and denied.

Recreation Services Accountability Measure:

 Conduct regular satisfaction surveys to gauge community perceptions of inclusion within recreational services and programming.

Vaughan Public Libraries

OBJECTIVE: Continue to incorporate the stories of diverse Black communities into all library services.

Key Actions:

- Continue to provide resources, collections and programming featuring and celebrating diverse Black communities.
- Ensure library collections feature materials reflecting diverse Black experiences and are authored by diverse Black writers.
- Maintain a focus on collections to highlight positive and strengths-based Black stories and histories.
- Continue to host programming that supports diverse Black communities: book clubs, story times, intergenerational story time events for children and youth, lectures and cultural events spotlighting diverse Black authors and voices.

Vaughan Public Libraries Accountability Measure:

• Monitor and assess the reach and impact of resources, collections and programs that focus on diverse Black communities.



Theme 2: Newcomer Supports

OBJECTIVE: Promote networking opportunities to ensure newcomers to the city have the necessary information to access educational, employment and social support.

Key Actions:

- Where feasible, partner with York Region to promote events aimed at newcomer networking and information sharing, fostering connections and enhancing awareness among communities, City staff and Vaughan Council.
- Where possible, collaborate with the York Region Welcome Centre to initiate multilingual awareness campaigns.
- Advocate for the development of educational initiatives in alignment with the refreshed 2023-2026 York Region Newcomer Strategy.

Newcomer Supports Accountability Measure:

• Monitor and track increased satisfaction and perceptions of inclusion among newcomers accessing support.

Theme 3: City Hiring, Recruitment, Retention and Promotion

OBJECTIVE: Address barriers and enhance processes in recruitment, hiring, retention and promotion within the City to better accommodate diverse Black individuals.

Key Actions – Recruitment:

- Foster partnerships and create avenues for diverse Black individuals to work and volunteer with the City.
- Engage with colleges and universities, as well as organize job fairs during recreational activities, in collaboration with schools, community centres and local organizations to promote available opportunities.
- Develop a talent acquisition strategy focused on minimizing biases in recruitment and hiring.
- Review job postings and guidelines to reduce biases and emphasize transferable skills and competencies.
- Where possible, consider the use of applicant anonymizing tools during recruitment processes to mitigate hiring biases.



- Recognize international credentials and offer requisite training for internationally trained professionals where possible.
- Continue the collection of demographic information during the application and hiring process.

Key Actions – Retention and Promotion:

- Continue employee engagement surveys to gain insights into workplace inclusion, particularly for diverse Black employees.
- Develop opportunities to access networking, mentoring, professional advancement and succession planning resources tailored for diverse Black staff.
- Collaborate with the DEI Office to offer ongoing learning and development to all staff members on addressing anti-Black racism, racial trauma, bias, microaggressions and related topics.
- Collaborate with the DEI Office to integrate diversity, equity and inclusion knowledge into the staff onboarding process.
- Conduct stay interviews.

Key Action – Exit:

• Collect data on exit interviews to understand experiences and turnover of Black employees.

City Hiring, Recruitment, Retention and Promotion Accountability Measures:

- Track and analyze recruitment, hiring, promotion, retention and turnover of Black staff.
- Establish a database to track outreach channels for job opportunities including growth metrics.
- Systematic process for reviewing job postings and hiring.
- Employee resource groups established to support diverse Black staff.
- Employee engagement survey results to indicate inclusion and belonging levels among diverse Black City staff.
- Enhanced understanding and application of diversity, equity, inclusion and anti-racism principles.
- Collaborative consultations with department heads annually to review disaggregated data to pinpoint areas aiding in the retention of diverse Black staff.

Theme 4: Resource Allocation

OBJECTIVE: Strengthen financial and resource commitments to counteract anti-Black racism.

Key Actions:

- Proportionally increase the allocation of financial, human and material resources focused on dismantling anti-Black racism. This includes providing sufficient resources for the proposals described in the action plan.
- Allocate funding to support data collection and public engagement mechanisms, such as surveys.

Resource Allocation Accountability Measures:

- Business case created to highlight the need for additional financial support.
- Increased allocation from the City's operating and capital budgets to support the goals and key actions in this action plan and other supplementary tasks and initiatives.





PILLAR 2: ACTIVE, ENGAGED AND INCLUSIVE COMMUNITIES

The City recognizes the importance of developing events that celebrate Black history, culture and community.

Theme 1: Events and Empowerment

OBJECTIVE: Engage with diverse Black communities in the development of broad City-led initiatives, as well as those that promote and honour Black history, culture and community.

Key Actions:

- Engage with diverse Black communities, organizations and business owners in events celebrating diverse Black history and culture year-round (e.g. Black History Month, Emancipation Day), as well as in general events (e.g. Winterfest, Concerts in the Park).
- Establish pre- and post-event feedback in City-hosted events to identify successes and areas for improvement.
- Use the future Social Procurement Policy and diverse suppliers list in City event planning and hosting.

OBJECTIVE: Support communities in organizing events, simplifying logistics and providing clear requirements.

Key Actions:

Develop a user-friendly event-hosting process which includes:

- providing clear and concise information on how to host an event.
- sharing application requirements and deadlines.
- supporting organizers on the processes and providing guidance.

Events and Empowerment Accountability Measures:

- Increased satisfaction with City events among diverse Black communities.
- Increased use of Black vendors in City events.
- Monitor and increase targeted and general communication about available resources.



Theme 2: Outreach and Engagement


OBJECTIVE: Foster ongoing dialogue between the City and diverse Black communities for input, perspectives and feedback on services and programs.

Key Actions:

- Identify organizations supporting diverse Black communities, leaders, individuals and preferred gathering places.
- Build and maintain a list of diverse Black community service organizations for guidance.
- Collaborate with individuals with lived and professional experience when engaging diverse Black communities.
- Create accessible and safe platforms for cross-community dialogues and engagement through events and initiatives.
- Engage with diverse Black communities when conducting focus groups and surveys at gathering spaces such as churches and community events.
- Develop relationships with diverse Black community organizations to continue to inform services, programs and event planning.
- Measure satisfaction with City services among the diverse Black communities (e.g. City protocol services, enforcement, permits and events).

Outreach and Engagement Accountability Measures:

- Updated community stakeholder map.
- Increased collaborations and consultations with stakeholders.
- Measure and increase satisfaction of City services among diverse Black communities, for example City protocol services, enforcement, permits and events.



Theme 3: Inclusive Communications

OBJECTIVE: Improve inclusive and targeted communication to reach diverse Black communities.


Key Actions:

- Consult with the SAC on what communication channels, such as Black-owned and Black-serving media outlets, resonate with diverse Black communities.
- Create and maintain a media contact list for Black-owned and Black-serving media outlets and ensure these media outlets are included when media products are distributed.

OBJECTIVE: Ensure the City's communication messaging and imagery highlight diverse Black communities.

Key Actions:

- Provide training for staff in communication and marketing roles on inclusive communication practices, including:
 - choosing appropriate and targeted channels.
 - crafting inclusive and proactive messages.
 - showcasing diverse Black communities in City communications while avoiding stereotypes.




OBJECTIVE: Develop public awareness campaigns to increase awareness, educate and drive engagement with City services and programs.

Key Actions:

- Advocate for collaboration among local municipalities in York Region to share information and cross-promote initiatives aimed at supporting diverse Black communities.
 - Promote, where possible, the services of York Region, COSTI, Vaughan Welcome Centre and associations supporting Black immigrants to share information, provide employment opportunities and understand specific needs.
- Use various communication channels to highlight the City's:
 - efforts to combat anti-Black racism and progress updates on the action plan.
 - Recreation Services policies and procedures, including facility allocation and Community Service Organization (CSO) policies.
 - Real Estate Leasing Strategy, policies and procedures.
 - complaint process, with a focus on reporting discrimination and anti-Black racism.
 - Special Event Permit, hosting events and the associated guidelines.
 - protocol and permitting processes.
- Engage the SAC on an ongoing basis to enhance awareness, communication and marketing campaigns, with a particular focus on effectively targeting diverse Black communities.

Inclusive Communications Accountability Measures:

- Regular review of communication channels used to determine new avenues to explore.
- Ongoing data collection, where possible, on the demographics of the audiences using current communication channels.
- Regular staff training sessions developed and conducted.
- Public awareness campaigns developed with feedback collected.



PILLAR 3: ECONOMIC PROSPERITY AND JOB CREATION

The City is committed to promoting economic prosperity and job creation and supporting diverse Black entrepreneurs and Black-owned businesses.

Theme 1: Supporting Black Entrepreneurs and Business Owners

OBJECTIVE: Encourage participation of diverse Black-owned and Black-serving businesses in the City's procurement process.

Key Action:

• Develop a Social Procurement Policy to encourage diverse suppliers in bidding on City contracts.

OBJECTIVE: Strengthen the support network for diverse Black business owners via tailored services and programs.

Key Actions:

- Enhance awareness and education among diverse Black business owners and entrepreneurs on how to participate in the public procurement process through events, webinars, training videos, etc.
- Host business networking events and provide financial planning seminars and mentorship opportunities for diverse Black business owners and youth entrepreneurs.
- Conduct a comprehensive needs assessment to identify strategies to assist the diverse Black business community.
- Use the outcomes of this assessment to support the development of a Black-owned, Black-operated Business Association or Chamber of Commerce.
- Increase targeted communication about available programs, especially services designed for diverse Black youth entrepreneurs.

Supporting Black Entrepreneurs and Business Owners Accountability Measures:

- Development of a Social Procurement Policy.
- Establishment, enactment and data monitoring related to mentorship schemes, gauging the engagement of diverse Black communities in these programs.

Glossary of Terms

Accessibility: Mitigating barriers to ensure the full participation of individuals and communities in initiatives, services, events and others. According to Accessibility Services Canada, this includes the "design of products, devices, services or environments for people who experience disabilities".¹⁴

Accountability: Taking responsibility for commitments, particularly those identified in the action plan, and ensuring identified objectives, key actions and accountability measures are carried out.

Amplify and Uplift: The City's ongoing effort to support diverse Black communities by showing up for them in meaningful ways, for example: supporting Black businesses through programming, ensuring opportunities for Vaughan Council and staff to attend and join events organized by diverse Black communities and others.

Collaboration and Co-creation: An effort to work together towards common goals and ensure communities are involved in the design, development and delivery of initiatives.

Data Driven: A process of leveraging data and findings to make informed decisions. This includes the collection of disaggregated data, which is data that is broken down to analyze different demographic groups.¹⁵ An example of this would be analyzing data on service usage by race.

Diversity: The presence of different and multiple human dimensions, qualities or characteristics within an organization, group or society.¹⁶ This can include, but is not limited to race, gender, age, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, physical ability, language, educational background, expertise and socioeconomic status.¹⁷ **Empathy**: The ability to sense the emotions of another person and imagine what someone else may be feeling or going through,¹⁸ which can result in compassionate behaviour.¹⁹

Engagement: A process to ensure the active participation and involvement of diverse Black communities in City initiatives.

Equity: An equitable approach recognizes that diverse communities may need unique and varied supports in order to better "level the playing field."²⁰

Inclusion: "Acknowledging and valuing people's differences to enrich social planning, decision-making and quality of life for everyone. In an inclusive municipality, we each have a sense of belonging, acceptance and are recognized as valued members of society."²¹

Intersectionality: "Intersectionality is the intersection, or crossover, of our many identities that affect how each of us experiences the municipality. These intersections occur within a context of connected systems and structures of power.²²

Transparency: Ensuring actions and efforts, particularly those within the action plan, are documented, clear and widely available.

Purpose

As per Council direction, this report provides information on the feasibility of the operation of "Project SEARCH."

Report Highlights

- "Project SEARCH" is a program that aims to assist young adults with disabilities in transitioning to employment.
- Project SEARCH was implemented as a pilot project from September 2022 to June 2023.
- Staff have researched alternative funding avenues and engaged an alternate educational partner for a new collaboration to continue Project SEARCH without success therefore we cannot continue the program at this time.

Recommendation

1. That this report be received for information.

Background

People with disabilities in Ontario face employment barriers, including high unemployment rates, underemployment, lack of accessibility, and negative stereotypes. The City of Vaughan has the highest disability rate among local municipalities at 21.4%, with a significant employment disparity between those with and without disabilities. Initiatives like "Project SEARCH" can help tap into the untapped potential of this community.

"Project SEARCH" is a program that aims to assist young adults with disabilities in transitioning to employment. The license to operate the program was purchased from Project SEARCH with funding from the Ministry of Education by the Catholic District School Board. The City of Vaughan, in collaboration with the York Catholic District School Board and Community Living York South, ran a pilot program for ten individuals with disabilities in York Region during 2022-2023. The goal was to help them successfully transition from high school to meaningful employment. Four out of the eight individuals who completed the program were able to secure employment using the skills they acquired.

Despite its success, the York Catholic District School Board ended the partnership agreement on June 27, 2023, due to budgetary issues. Therefore, without sustained financial support from the Province and an instructor from the board, continuing the program in its current form is not feasible at this time.

Analysis and Options

The "Project SEARCH" program is a model that is employer-led; therefore, the host employer/organization is responsible for delivering the program as part of its core business. The organization must fully participate in setting up and organizing the model and overseeing its delivery. At the City, the "Project SEARCH" pilot program was facilitated by one instructor from the school board and two skills trainers from Community Living York South. They taught the necessary skills for workplace success in both classroom and on-the-job settings. In addition, experienced City of Vaughan staff mentored students on the job to develop their skills and provide real-world feedback.

Although the project was largely successful, it faced some operational challenges. One of the main challenges was the lack of dedicated full-time staff to oversee and coordinate the program, which resulted in an inconsistent experience for everyone involved. Additionally, there were instances where the number of interns exceeded the number of skill trainers, which did not meet the recommended standards set by "Project SEARCH" and the City's requirements. This happened due to a partner's labour shortages, which impacted the support available to the participants. For "Project SEARCH" to succeed, the following option was considered for both staffing and funding.

Partnership with an alternate School Board and other Community Agencies:

- The City could initiate outreach to various school boards within the jurisdiction, assessing their inclination to collaborate with "Project SEARCH."
- The approach might also involve liaising with community organizations that specialize in training, especially those that focus on differently abled individuals, such as March of Dime and Abilities Centre.
- As per the Project SEARCH licensing model:
 - The School Board would provide the in-class instructor (cost covered by the school board)
 - The community agency would provide skill trainers and a job developer (cost covered by the community agency)
 - \circ $\;$ The City would provide the Project Coordinator $\;$

Challenges

- Securing a partnership remains a variable, given the discretion of the School Board to select a specific municipality per academic year and the unpredictability of identifying community partners with the necessary funding to employ skill trainers.
- If there is withdrawal of support from external collaborators, the workload will exceed the capacity of a single full-time staff member. This could necessitate a reconsideration of the project's scope.
- The municipality's potential reliance on external financial sources could introduce risks to the project's continuity.

School Board Involvement

The Project SEARCH model requires the involvement of a business partner and school board. York Region District School Board, which has obtained the required license from Project SEARCH to operate in York Region, has partnered with a local hospital as its business partner for the foreseeable future. Therefore, the City cannot proceed with the operationalization of Project SEARCH at this time.

Purpose

To provide Council with the Building Permit Fees Annual Financial Report for 2023, as required by the Building Code.

Report Highlights

- Building permit revenues collected in 2023 were \$10,419,404.
- Direct and Indirect costs in 2023 were \$14,046,567.

Recommendations

1. THAT the Building Permit Fees Annual Financial Report for 2023 be received for information.

Background

The Building Code requires that a financial report be prepared annually to provide information on the following matters:

- i. Total Fees Collected (12-month period);
- ii. Direct Costs of delivering services (Review of permit applications and inspections of buildings);
- iii. Indirect Costs of delivering services (Support and Overhead Costs); and
- iv. The account balance for the Building Standards Service Continuity Reserve as established by Council.

To comply with the Building Code, the Building Permit Fees Annual Financial Report has been prepared for 2023 and is based on unaudited information.

Previous Reports/Authority

None.

Analysis and Options

This report has been prepared in coordination with Financial Planning and Development Finance Department staff. It is based on Council's previous approvals respecting the Watson & Associates Economists Ltd. Activity Based Costing Methodology for User Fees Report, and the establishment of the Building Standards Service Continuity Reserve.

The Building Standards Service Continuity Reserve was established to stabilize fluctuations in permit revenues resulting from changes or variations in construction activity. The stabilization of permit revenues allows the Building Standards Department (BSD) to meet its legislated requirements; thereby ensuring continuity of service delivery without impacting the general tax base.

To develop a sustainable financial model for the BSD, a comprehensive building permit fee study was carried out by Watson & Associates Economists Ltd. in 2017/2018 to ensure fees achieve full cost recovery of direct and indirect costs associated with the delivery of services in the BSD (building permits and inspection services). The study also benchmarked Vaughan's building permit fees with other comparable GTA municipalities to maintain market competitiveness.

In 2022 the City retained Watson & Associates Economists Ltd. to undertake a comprehensive review of the full costs of Development Planning, Development Engineering and Building Standards functions and to make fee structure recommendations to provide for reasonable full cost for the services. This study was completed in 2023 and presented to the April 18, 2023, Committee of the Whole (2) for consideration, and latter approved without amendment at the Council meeting of April 25, 2023. The Building Standards Department will monitor the effectiveness of the new cost model resulting from this study and will work with our partners in Development Finance if further changes are necessary in the future.

Financial Impact

The Building Permit Fees Annual Financial Report shows a total revenue of \$10,419,404 for building permit fees collected in 2023 and a combined total of direct and indirect costs of \$14,046,567. An amount of \$3,627,163 was withdrawn from the Building Standards Service Continuity Reserve to cover the deficit. The 2023 closing balance in the Building Standards Service Continuity Reserve is \$25,535,358.

As required by legislation, this report provides the total fees collected by the BSD in 2023, total costs of delivering its service, and balance of the Building Standards Service Continuity Reserve.

ACTION: DECISION

<u>Purpose</u>

To seek approval from the Committee of the Whole on a city-initiated Zoning By-law Amendment to permit city-wide permissions for Seasonal Outdoor Patios and temporary expansions to existing Outdoor Patios accessory to Restaurants and Banquet Halls, and to amend the City's Site Plan Control By-law 123-2013.

Report Highlights

- The City proposes Zoning By-law Amendments to By-laws 1-88 and 001-2021 to permit Seasonal Outdoor Patios on an annual basis to be regulated under a Licensing By-law.
- The City's Site Plan Control By-law 123-2013, as amended, is also proposed to be further amended to waive the requirement for a Site Development Application to implement Seasonal Outdoor Patios.
- The Development Planning Department support the proposed amendments.

Recommendations

 THAT Zoning By-law Amendment File Z.23.028 (City of Vaughan) BE APPROVED, to amend Zoning By-law 1-88, to permit the use of seasonal outdoor patios and the temporary expansion of existing outdoor patios, both accessory to Eating Establishment, Restaurant and Banquet Hall uses, together with the amendments identified in Attachment 2 of this report;

- 2. THAT Zoning By-law Amendment File Z.23.028 (City of Vaughan) BE APPROVED, to amend Zoning By-law 001-2021, to permit the use of seasonal outdoor patios and the temporary expansion of existing outdoor patios, both accessory to Restaurant and Banquet Hall uses, together with the amendments identified in Attachment 3 of this report; and
- 3. THAT the City's Site Plan Control By-law 123-2013, as amended, be further amended to exempt seasonal outdoor patios and the temporary expansion of existing outdoor patios, both accessory to Restaurant and Banquet Hall uses from Site Plan Control.

Background

Location: City-wide

On October 20, 2021, Council adopted the new Comprehensive Zoning By-law ('CZBL'), which was ordered into force by the Ontario Land Tribunal ('OLT') on December 28, 2022, and as corrected on March 28, 2023, with exceptions. The CZBL affects all lands within the City of Vaughan, except for lands in the vicinity of Yonge Street and Steeles Avenue West, as shown on Attachment 1, and any other lands subject to outstanding site-specific appeals. The CZBL replaces Zoning By-law 1-88 except for matters of transition pursuant to Section 1.6 of the CZBL, and the Yonge-Steeles Corridor Secondary Plan Area. The CZBL has been appealed to the OLT by a number of appellants. The OLT issued an Order on December 28, 2022, which was subsequently corrected on March 28, 2023, bringing into effect all sections of the CZBL that have not been appealed.

Temporary Outdoor Patios were previously approved by Vaughan Council during the COVID-19 Pandemic

On June 29, 2020, Vaughan Council approved a City-initiated Zoning By-law Amendment (File Z.20.017) and passed the associated temporary use By-law 094-2020 to permit the use of temporary outdoor patios accessory to a Restaurant or Banquet Hall subject to the required zoning standards identified in the by-law. The duration of By-law 094-2020 initially spanned the period in which the Province of Ontario declared an emergency to exist under Section 4 of the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act* (the 'Emergency Order') related to the COVID-19 pandemic, or up until November 2, 2020, whichever came first.

The intention of By-law 094-2020 was to allow Restaurants and Banquet Halls to temporarily continue operating outdoors while indoor dining was restricted or not permitted during the COVID-19 pandemic. By-law 094-2020 was further amended by By-law 148-2020 to extend the temporary use permissions to no longer than 14 days beyond the lifting of the Emergency Order, irrespective of the November 2, 2020, date. The Province of Ontario lifted the Emergency Order on July 24, 2022.

The temporary outdoor patio permissions received largely positive feedback from the industry and patrons, and the City did not experience significant enforcement issues or complaints from the public during this time. With the temporary outdoor patio permissions now expired, the City has an interest in reintroducing permissions to provide opportunities for Restaurant and Banquet Hall uses to erect temporary outdoor patios on a recurring seasonal basis to support businesses in the City.

The City has initiated a Zoning By-law Amendment to permit seasonal outdoor patios accessory to Restaurants and Banquet Halls

The City has initiated City-wide Zoning By-law Amendment file Z.23.028 to amend both by-laws 1-88 and 001-2021 to permit Seasonal Outdoor Patios for Restaurant and Banquet Hall uses, along with the draft zoning by-laws shown in Attachments 2 and 3 (the 'Amendments').

The City also proposes to further amend Site Plan Control By-law 123-2013 to waive the requirement for a Site Development Application to implement Seasonal Outdoor Patios or temporary expansions to existing Outdoor Patios accessory to Restaurants and Banquet Halls, as shown in Attachment 4.

The City also proposes to amend its Licensing By-law to establish criteria for receiving a license to erect and operate a Seasonal Outdoor Patio, which will be considered simultaneously with the above noted by-laws. An associated report prepared by the By-law and Compliance, Licensing and Permit Services Department will also be considered at the April 16, 2024 Committee of the Whole meeting.

Public Notice was provided in accordance with the Planning Act and Council's Notification Protocol

- *Date of Notice:* Published in the February 7, 2024, edition of the Toronto Star and circulated to all Ratepayer's Associations on February 9, 2024
- Date of Public Meeting: March 5, 2024, ratified by Council on March 26, 2024
- The By-law and Compliance, Licensing and Permit Services Department conducted a business survey on February 15, 2024, which is detailed in the associated Licensing Report, to obtain feedback on the proposed permissions for seasonal temporary outdoor patios.

One communication was received at the March 26, 2024, Council meeting by the Kleinburg BIA submitted on March 24, 2024 in favour of permissions for Seasonal Outdoor Patios. No additional comments have been received by the Development Planning Department as of April 2, 2024.

Analysis and Options

The Amendments are consistent with the Provincial Policy Statement and conform to the Growth Plan, YROP and VOP 2010

Provincial Policy Statement, 2020 ('PPS'), A Place to Grow: Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe, 2019, as amended (the 'Growth Plan') and York Region Official Plan 2022 ('YROP 2022')

The PPS and Growth Plan provide direction on matters of Provincial interest related to land use planning and development and a framework for implementation through municipal Official Plans. The PPS and Growth Plan promote the building of complete communities that support a strong and competitive economy, make efficient use of land and infrastructure and protect public health and safety.

The YROP 2022 guides economic, environmental and community building decision making across York Region, and describes how York Region will accommodate future growth and development while meeting the needs of existing residents and businesses. YROP 2022 promotes innovation, economic diversity and resilience. Its policies intend to encourage investment and prosperity in a way that creates a competitive business environment.

The Amendments will provide flexibility for Restaurant and Banquet Hall uses to accommodate patrons on a recurring seasonal basis without the requirement to construct permanent patio facilities or obtain Site Plan Approval. These permissions will support economic development and resiliency while still protecting for public safety and site function through the use of appropriate standards identified in the corresponding Licensing By-law. Staff are satisfied that the Amendments are consistent with the PPS and conform to the Growth Plan and YROP 2022.

Vaughan Official Plan 2010 ('VOP 2010')

VOP 2010 sets out the municipality's general planning goals and policies that guide future land use. VOP 2010 permits Restaurants (which are defined as "Retail" for the purpose of VOP 2010) in the following land use designations identified on Schedule 13 - Land Use:

- "Low-Rise Mixed-Use", "Mid-Rise Mixed-Use", "High-Rise Mixed-Use", "Community Commercial Mixed-Use", "Downtown Mixed-Use" and "Major Institutional";
- "Employment Commercial Mixed-Use" subject to a maximum Gross Floor Area ('GFA') of 3,500 m² per unit;

- "Prestige Employment" provided they are accessory and directly associated to a primary use, or are ancillary subject to locational criteria and a maximum GFA of 185 m² per unit and the total GFA of all ancillary uses does not exceed 20% of the total GFA of any one lot; and
- "Theme Park and Entertainment" where they are directly associated with the Theme Park Use.

VOP 2010 does not expressly permit Banquet Halls in any land use designation; however, Section 10.2.1.4 of VOP 2010 recognizes legally existing land uses as they exist at the time VOP 2010 was approved, which may include existing Restaurant and Banquet Hall uses located across the City within various land use designations.

The Amendments will permit Seasonal Outdoor Patios on a recurring basis for Restaurants and Banquet Halls which are permitted as of right by the Zoning By-law, or are legally existing as of the date of the Amendments. The Amendments conform to VOP 2010.

Amendments to Zoning By-laws 1-88 and 001-2021 are required to permit the Seasonal Temporary Outdoor Patios

Zoning By-law 1-88:

- Zoning By-law 1-88 continues to apply to lands subject to ongoing site-specific appeals to Zoning by-law 001-2021, matters of transition under Section 1.6 of the CZBL, and the Yonge and Steeles area
- Outdoor Patios accessory to an Eating Establishment (Restaurant) are permitted
- A Banquet Hall is also permitted to contain an Eating Establishment up to a maximum 20% GFA of the building, which may also have an accessory Outdoor Patio

Zoning By-law 001-2021:

- Zoning By-law 001-2021 applies to all other areas of the City
- Outdoor Patios accessory to a Restaurant are permitted
- A Banquet Hall is also permitted to contain the incidental preparation and sale of food and beverages

The Amendments will establish the definition of a Seasonal Outdoor Patio in both Zoning By-laws 1-88 and 001-2021 to permit their use accessory to a Restaurant or Banquet Hall. The use would be permitted to operate between April 1 and November 1 every year, except in 2024 where the use is expected to be permitted starting May 28 after the last day of the by-law appeal period. Drafts of the proposed amending zoning by-laws are included in Attachments 2 and 3.

Parking

Under the temporary use By-law 094-2020 implemented during the COVID-19 pandemic, Temporary Outdoor Patios were permitted to be up to 100% of the existing Restaurant use's gross floor area ('GFA') or up to 50% of the existing Banquet Hall

use's GFA, did not require any additional parking spaces, and could occupy a maximum of 20% of the total parking supply on the lot.

Under the CZBL, Outdoor Patios already do not require any additional parking spaces, but rather restrict their maximum GFA up to 40% of the existing restaurant GFA. The CZBL does not currently permit a Banquet Hall to have an accessory Outdoor Patio.

The Amendment will permit both a Restaurant and Banquet Hall use to establish a Seasonal Outdoor Patio, subject to the following:

- No requirement for additional parking spaces for the Seasonal Outdoor Patio
- Seasonal Outdoor Patios may occupy existing required parking spaces for the site if the spaces are adjacent to the sidewalk that is fronting the entrance to the Restaurant or Banquet Hall use, provided they are not designated barrier-free parking spaces. This restriction will limit the location of Seasonal Outdoor Patios and prevent them from occupying parking spaces intended for other users of the site.

By allowing the Seasonal Outdoor Patios to occupy required parking spaces, some flexibility is afforded that avoids the need for a detailed parking calculation to be conducted for the site, recognizing that the Seasonal Outdoor Patio placement will be temporary.

Pedestrian and Vehicle Circulation and Safety

To avoid potential conflict between the location of Seasonal Outdoor Patios and the safe circulation of pedestrians and vehicles, they will not be permitted within roads, lanes aisles or parking areas, except for parking spaces that are adjacent to the Restaurant or Banquet Hall use. Seasonal Outdoor Patios will also require enclosure by a temporary fence to add safety for patrons.

The Development Planning Department can support the Amendments identified in Attachments 2 and 3 and the proposed provisions in the Licensing By-law as they are consistent with the PPS, conform to the Growth Plan, YROP 2022 and VOP 2010, and will support economic development and resiliency while still protecting for public safety and site function through the use of the standards as noted above and identified in the proposed Licensing By-law. Minor modifications may be made to the draft amendments prior to the enactment of an implementing Zoning By-law, as required, should the Application be approved.

An amendment to Site Plan Control By-law 123-2013 is required to exempt Temporary Outdoor Patios from Site Plan Control

Site Plan Control By-law 123-2013 designates the City as a Site Plan Control Area pursuant to Subsection 41(2) of the *Planning Act* and requires certain classes of development to be subject to Site Plan Control, including Outdoor Patios. An amendment to Site Plan Control By-law 123-2013 is required to exempt the Seasonal

Temporary Outdoor Patios from the provisions of Site Plan Control. A draft Site Plan Control amendment by-law is included as Attachment 4.

Financial Impact

There are no requirements for new funding associated with this report.

Operational Impact

Various City Departments have provided feedback to develop the proposed permissions for Seasonal Outdoor Patios

The By-law and Compliance, Licensing and Permit Services Department, in consultation with the Development Planning, Building Standards, and Development Engineering Departments have developed the proposed provisions for Seasonal Outdoor Patios contained in their Licensing By-law. The Development Planning Department prepared the draft amending zoning by-laws included in Attachments 2 and 3 to add the definition of Seasonal Outdoor Patios and facilitate the application of the Licensing By-law. The permissions consider appropriate development standards which would enable an efficient permitting process to be implemented by the By-law and Compliance, Licensing and Permit Services Department.

Broader Regional Impacts/Considerations

There are no broader regional impacts or considerations associated with this report.

Conclusion

The Development Planning Department is satisfied the Application is consistent with the PPS, conforms with the Growth Plan, YROP and VOP 2010, and provide appropriate development standards for the implementation of Seasonal Temporary Outdoor Patios. Accordingly, the Development Planning Department can recommend approval of the Application.



A By-law to amend City of Vaughan By-law 1-88, as amended.

WHEREAS the matters herein set out are in conformity with the Official Plan of the Vaughan Planning Area, which is approved and in force at this time;

AND WHEREAS there has been no amendment to the Vaughan Official Plan adopted by Council but not approved at this time, with which the matters herein set out are not in conformity;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Vaughan ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That City of Vaughan By-law Number 1-88, as amended, be and it is hereby further amended by:
 - Adding the definition of "Seasonal Temporary Outdoor Patio" under Part 2.0,
 Definitions, Part 2.2, Vaughan Metropolitan Centre Definitions and Part 2.3,
 Carville Centre Definitions as follows:

"Outdoor Patio, Seasonal: Means a temporary area located at grade and outside of a building used for the accommodation of patrons of an Eating Establishment, Restaurant or Banquet Hall use."

- b) Renumbering paragraph "5.1.6 Outdoor Patio" to "5.1.6.1 Outdoor Patio".
- c) Adding a new paragraph 5.1.6.2 to Part "5.1 General Provisions" as follows:
 "5.1.6.2 <u>Seasonal Outdoor Patio</u>
 - A seasonal outdoor patio shall only be permitted as an accessory use to an "Eating Establishment", "Convenience Eating Establishment", "Convenience Eating Establishment with Drive-Through", "Restaurant" or "Banquet Hall", and shall only be subject to the City of Vaughan's Seasonal Outdoor Patio Licensing By-law.

- 2. A seasonal outdoor patio may be permitted to occupy the minimum required parking spaces on the subject lands in which the seasonal outdoor patio is located, in accordance with the licensing by-law.
- A parking space occupied with a seasonal outdoor patio shall continue to be included in the minimum parking requirements for the site.

- That City of Vaughan By-law Number 001-2021, as amended, be and it is hereby further amended by:
 - a) Adding the definition of "Seasonal Outdoor Patio" under Part 3.0 Definitions as follows:

"Outdoor Patio, Seasonal: Means a temporary area located at grade and outside of a building used for the accommodation of patrons of a Restaurant or Banquet Hall use."

b) Amending "Table 4-1: Permitted Encroachments into Required Yards" by adding a new row titled "<u>Seasonal Outdoor Patio</u>" under the "Structure or Feature" category in alphabetical order as follows:

Structure or Feature	Required Yard	Permitted Encroachment into a Minimum Required Yard (m)
Seasonal Outdoor Patio	<u>Front yard, rear yard,</u> interior side yard or <u>exterior side yard</u>	Up to 0.0 from the <u>front</u> lot line, rear lot line, interior side lot line or <u>exterior side lot line</u>

- c) Renumbering paragraph "5.12 Outdoor Patio" to "5.12.1 Outdoor Patio".
- Adding a new paragraph 5.12.2 to Part 5.0: Specific Use Permissions as follows:
 - "5.12.2 Seasonal Outdoor Patio
 - A <u>seasonal outdoor patio</u> shall only be permitted as an <u>accessory use</u> to a <u>restaurant</u> or <u>banquet hall</u> <u>use</u> and shall only be subject to the City of Vaughan's Seasonal Outdoor Patio Licensing By-law.
 - 2. A seasonal outdoor patio may be permitted to occupy the minimum required parking spaces on the subject lands in which the seasonal outdoor patio is located, in accordance with the licensing by-law.
 - 3. A parking space occupied with a seasonal outdoor patio shall continue to be included in the minimum parking requirements for the site.

NOW THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Vaughan ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- That City of Vaughan By-law Number 123-2013, as amended by By-law Number 141-2022, is hereby further amended as follows:
 - a) That the following be added to Section 5 as a class of development that may be undertaken without the approval of plans and drawings as otherwise required under Subsections 41(4) and 41(5) of the *Planning Act*.

"b) Seasonal Outdoor Patios and the temporary expansion of Outdoor Patios, both accessory to Restaurants and Banquet Halls." Voted in favour by City of Vaughan Council this 22nd day of April, 2024.

<u>Purpose</u>

To provide a summary of municipal infrastructure delivered through the development approval process and growth-related projects that were assumed by the City of Vaughan during the period of January 2023 to December 2023.

Report Highlights

- 22.45 lane kilometres of road and associated sidewalk, curb and underground municipal infrastructure valued at approximately \$52.4 million were assumed by the City of Vaughan in 2023.
- Annual operating and maintenance costs associated with this additional infrastructure is estimated at \$1,549,410.
- Additional operating and maintenance costs to be funded from property taxes and water rates.

Recommendation

1. That this report be received for information.

Background

In January 2018, Council endorsed a streamlined process that facilitated the assumption of municipal services constructed through private land development and growth-related infrastructure projects. This new assumption process included the requirement for staff to prepare an annual summary report for Council's consideration. This annual summary report is to include infrastructure value, as well as operating and maintenance costs for municipal assets, assumed by the City during the preceding year.

Streamline Process for the Assumption of Municipal Services City-Wide 2022 Municipal Assumption Activity Report

Analysis and Options

Between January 2023 to December 2023, the City of Vaughan assumed municipal services in 17 land development projects which included:

- 22.45 lane kilometres of roads
- 18.83 kilometres of sidewalk
- 18.49 kilometres of watermain
- 15.59 kilometres of sanitary sewer
- 13.50 kilometres of storm sewers
- 459 streetlights
- 3 stormwater management ponds

The location of these developments and details of the assumed municipal services are provided in Attachments 1 to 8 of this report.

Financial Impact

The municipal infrastructure assumed by the City over the reporting period is valued at approximately \$52.4 million (Attachment No.1).

The estimated annual operating and maintenance costs of this additional infrastructure is approximately \$1,549,410. (Attachment No.2). In order to maintain this infrastructure to current service levels and regulatory requirements, these projected costs should be considered in future Public Works budgets, funded from property taxes and rates.

Broader Regional Impacts/Considerations

None.

Conclusion

Since the implementation of the streamlined assumption process in March 2018, the City has received positive feedback from industry stakeholders. From January 2023 to December 2023, the City has assumed municipal services in 17 developments valued at approximately \$52.4 million. The annual operating and maintenance cost of this additional infrastructure is estimated at \$1,549,410.





Attachment 3 - City Wide Assumption Map





Attachment 4 - 2023 Ward 1 Assumption Map


























Attachment 8 - 2023 Ward 5 Assumption Map

ACTION: DECISION

Purpose

To seek approval to negotiate and execute all necessary agreements related to the public-private partnership with Gateway Parks Group (GPG) to provide and operate a snow tubing and winter recreation facility at North Maple Regional Park (NMRP).

Report Highlights

- In February 2023, Council received an update on the NMRP Program and a deputation from GPG presenting an interest in developing and operating snow tubing and other winter recreation activities at NMRP.
- Council directed staff to meet with GPG to explore the potential of this opportunity, as well as explore alternative vendors to ensure competitive partnership opportunities.
- In April 2023, a formal Request for Expression of Interest (RFEOI) process was issued by Procurement Services with GPG the only Respondent to this process.
- Based on the results of the RFEOI process, in June 2023 Council supported continuing discussions with GPG to explore terms of an agreement.
- Through consultation with internal departments and verifying the specifications of the site and conducting financial analysis, staff recommend proceeding with a public-private partnership for GPG to design, build, operate and maintain a snow tubing area and associated winter recreation facilities at NMRP.

Recommendation

 That the Deputy City Manager, Infrastructure Development be directed to negotiate and execute all necessary agreements related to the public-private partnership with Gateway Parks Group (GPG) in a form satisfactory to Legal Services, where GPG will provide and operate snow tubing and winter recreation facilities at North Maple Regional Park (NMRP) in a manner consistent with the proposal outlined in this report.

Background

An RFEOI was issued in April 2023 for snow tubing at NMRP resulting in a proposal from Gateway Parks for a public-private partnership

At the February 14, 2023, Committee of the Whole (2) meeting, the City received a deputation from GPG with an interest in providing snow tubing and winter recreation activities at NMRP. Council directed staff to meet with GPG to explore the potential of developing a public-private partnership for snow tubing and other winter recreation activities, as well as explore alternative vendors to ensure competitive partnership opportunities.

GPG is a progressive snow tubing and winter recreational vendor with over 13 years of experience in Ontario and parts of the United States. The City's vision for NMRP aligns with the vendor's goal of providing a local, affordable outdoor experience while enjoying amenities found at world-class resorts.

Following Council direction, staff met with GPG, as well as issued an RFEOI with Procurement Services in April 2023 to help identify the current market interest of potential vendors for providing winter recreational services at NMRP. Based on the results of the RFEOI process, with only one (1) bid received from GPG, staff continued discussions with GPG to explore their ideas and development plans in more detail, and to develop draft terms of an agreement for them to design, build, operate and maintain snowtubing and associated winter recreation uses on a portion of lands at NMRP.

Previous Reports/Authority

North Maple Regional Park Program Update February 2023, Item 7, Report No. 9 of the Committee of the Whole (2), February 14, 2023 Gateway Parks Proposal, Communication: C5 Committee of the Whole (2), Item 7, Report No.9, February 14, 2023 Snow Tubing and Winter Recreation at North Maple Regional Park, Item 15, Report No. 28 of the Committee of the Whole (2) June 6, 2023

Analysis and Options

City staff continue to meet with Gateway Parks to understand key considerations in servicing requirements, community benefits and agreement terms

Since February 2023, staff facilitated meetings with GPG to understand servicing requirements, and to work through various aspects and draft terms of a potential public-private partnership agreement for the creation, maintenance, and operation of a winter recreation area. Key considerations for snow tubing operations and related uses are the need for adequate power and water supply source for snowmaking. Staff has ensured that these requirements have been met. Staff have also collaborated with Finance, Recreation Services, Facilities Management and Parks Operations staff to conduct further analysis to understand the financial and operational implications.

In April 2024, staff presented a summary of information and key details to the City's Senior Executive Leadership Team. Based on the status of the above discussions and coordination, staff are recommending that they be directed to negotiate and execute agreements with GPG to reflect the proposed partnership.

Key Highlights of GPG's Terms include, but are not limited to:

- Minimum 10-year agreement with a mutual opt-out clause after year two; due to their initial significant capital investment GPG will be exempt from paying any fees to the City for the first two years of operations.
- Operating costs will be fully compensated by GPG, including all utilities. As part of the arrangement, no operating costs specific to the snow tubing operation and amenities will be incurred by the City.
- GPG promises remediation of lands to its original condition after each snow tubing season for return to normal park usage in the Spring. The typical tubing season runs from November to March.
- Starting in the third year of operations, GPG will engage in a tiered revenue-sharing model with the City and provide audited financial statements annually to ensure accuracy and transparency.
- In addition, GPG shall manufacture snow, construct and maintain the complimentary, unsupervised park toboggan area according to City specifications.

Community Benefits

• Provides unique, affordable, local winter recreation experiences, activities and facilities regardless of weather conditions from November to March.

- Access to additional facilities and amenities at NMRP that include gathering spaces and warming and viewing areas, concessions, and washrooms.
- Further excitement generated and community interest in NMRP, significantly increasing the number of park visitors and their enjoyment during winter season.

Other considerations include:

- Insurance and liability: GPG indemnifies the City and is responsible for all guests within the perimeter of the snow tubing operation and associated amenities.
- Any additional potential infrastructure enhancements, upgrades or services required to facilitate GPG operations in excess of the current service levels (currently serviced land) is the financial responsibility of GPG.
- Depending on success of this arrangement, potential opportunities for other winter programming can be explored in the future, such as skating, snowshoeing and cross-county skiing.

Procurement Policy

The City's Procurement Policy provides that public private partnerships that meet the requirements of the Policy still require the approval of Council. In this case, Staff have applied the criteria for other non-competitive procurements, found at Schedule A to the policy. Given the revenue-sharing terms proposed by GPG, detailed below, and the special knowledge, skills and expertise required, as well as the prior Request for Expression of Interest results, the Director of Procurement Services is satisfied that this public private partnership will result in Best Value for the City.

Legal Agreements

Staff will work with Legal Services to identify the appropriate legal form of agreement needed. Based on early conversations, terms related to license, operations & maintenance, and revenue-sharing will need to be captured. Staff seek flexibility in the recommendation to allow Legal Services to determine whether one comprehensive agreement or several corollary agreements are best.

Financial Impact

The proposed Revenue-Sharing Model detailed below identifies no anticipated cost to the City

Capital costs for equipment and related components of the snow tubing development and supporting amenities will be the full responsibility of GPG. As part of the agreement, operating costs will be fully compensated by GPG, including all utilities. No operating costs specific to the snow tubing operation and other provided amenities will be incurred by the City.

Starting in the third year of operations, GPG will engage in a tiered revenue-sharing model with the City, provision of audited financial statements annually to ensure accuracy and transparency. City revenue projections are based on high/mid/low attendance rates from similar GPG facilities and does not include potential added revenue stream from concessions.

Operational Impact

GPG assumes all responsibility within the perimeter of their operations. There are no immediate operational impacts associated with the recommendations of this report. Staff currently feel that the GPG proposal will not require any additional investment by the City but will monitor the operation as it matures. Communication and collaboration with affected operating departments will occur regularly throughout this project and financial implications will be identified as required for consideration in future budget submissions.

Broader Regional Impacts/Considerations

Completion of the NMRP project involves regular discussion and coordination with various external agencies and stakeholders, including communication plans and potential funding announcements.

Conclusion

Staff are seeking Council approval to finalize and execute a public-private partnership agreement with GPG. Subject to approval to proceed, GPG can initiate coordination as early as May 2024 to prepare and be operational for winter 2024/2025.

<u>TITLE</u>: REPEAL OF ROAD DESIGNATION BY-LAW 173-2004 REGARDING PORTION OF LANDS ADJACENT TO YONGE STREET NORTH OF CRESTWOOD ROAD

ACTION: DECISION

<u>Purpose</u>

To seek Council approval to repeal By-law 173-2004, which designated a small portion of lands adjacent to Yonge Street north of Crestwood Road as road, and the related stop up and close By-law 014-2024, in order to facilitate the transfer of that portion of lands to York Region to form part of Yonge Street and to facilitate the Yonge North Subway Extension.

Report Highlights

- In 2004, the City passed By-law 173-2004, which designed a small portion of Lands measuring 159 square meters as being part of Yonge Street located north of Crestwood Road.
- In 2023, York Region requested the Lands to be conveyed to it for purposes of facilitating the Yonge North Subway Extension and to reflect York Region's ownership and jurisdiction over Yonge Street.
- On December 12, 2023, City Council declared the Lands surplus and authorized the conveyance of the Lands to York Region.
- York Region requires the City to repeal By-law 173-2004 in order to facilitate the conveyance of the Lands for purposes of the subway extension.

Recommendations

- THAT Council repeal By-law 173-2004 which designated the lands situated within the City of Vaughan, Regional Municipality of York, being a portion of the lands located north of Crestwood Road, legally described as Part of Lots 1 to 6, Plan 3205, designated as Part 2 on Reference Plan 64R-7570, being all of PIN 03248-0627 (LT) as public highway (the "Lands'); and
- 2. THAT Council repeal By-law 014-2024 which stopped up and closed the Lands as part of the public highway.

Background

In 2004 the City of Vaughan enacted By-law 173-2004 which designed a small portion of lands located north of Crestwood Road, legally described as Part of Lots 1 to 6, Plan 3205, designated as Part 2 on Reference Plan 64R-7570, being all of PIN 03248-0627 (LT) as public highway and part of Yonge Street (the "Lands"). The Lands comprise a total area of 159 square meters as shown on **Attachment 1**.

The Regional Municipality of York (the "**York Region**") has jurisdiction over Yonge Street. In 2023 York Region requested the City convey the Lands to the Region to facilitate the Yonge North Subway Extension project (the "**YNSE**"), which will extend the existing TTC Line 1 service approximately eight kilometers north from Finch Station to Vaughan, Markham and Richmond Hill and includes the construction of five new subway stations along these municipalities.

On December 12, 2023, the City declared the Lands Surplus and authorized the conveyance of the Lands to York Region, for nominal consideration. In addition, on January 30, 2024 the City passed By-law 014-2024 to stop up and close the Lands, which had been designated road by the City in 2004, as noted above.

York Region has informed the City that it is unable to accept the transfer of the Lands to facilitate the subway extension unless and until By-law 173-2004 which designated the Lands as road is repealed. Region staff have confirmed that the Surplus Lands will be dedicated as regional public highway upon completion of the transaction.

Accordingly, in order to facilitate the conveyance of the Lands for the purpose of the YNSE, this Report requests that Council repeal By-law 173-2004, and accordingly also repeal the stop up and close by-law 014-2024.

Previous Reports/Authority

Extract - CW (Closed Session) Report 53, Item 2, Council December 12, 2023.

Analysis and Options

As noted above, Council approved the conveyance of the Lands to York Region for nominal consideration on December 12, 2023 to facilitate the YNSE and to reflect York Region's jurisdiction over Yonge Street. York Region requires that By-law 173-2004 which designated the Lands as road be repealed prior to the transfer of the Lands to York Region. Accordingly, Staff recommend that By-law 173-2004 and By-law 014-2024 be repealed so the transfer of the Lands may be completed.

Broader Regional Impacts/Considerations

The lands are required for the planned Yonge North Subway Extension initiative.

Conclusion

Staff recommend that Council approve the repeal of By-law 173-2004 and By-law 014-2024 in order to facilitate the conveyance of the Lands to York Region as approved by Council on December 12, 2023 for the purposes of the YNSE.



TITLE: AMENDMENTS TO NIGHT CLUB AND LOUNGE LICENSING PROVISIONS

FROM:

ACTION: DECISION

Purpose

Staff are proposing amendments to the City's Business Licensing By-law to add regulatory requirements for night clubs and lounges, and to align certain requirements with the City's new Zoning By-law.

Report Highlights

- On June 30, 2023, all businesses defined as night clubs, lounges and pubs were required to meet respective requirements under the City's Business Licensing By-law.
- Staff are proposing language in the Business Licensing By-law to ensure alignment between licensing provisions and the City's new Zoning By-law. Staff are also proposing a series of additional licensing requirements for night clubs and existing lounges.

Recommendations

- THAT Council approve amending the Business Licensing By-law by clarifying that where a night club intends to also operate as an eating establishment/restaurant, subject to licensing provisions, such ancillary use must be permitted under the City's Zoning By-law, as amended;
- 2. THAT Council approve amending the Business Licensing By-law by adding the following requirements for all night clubs and lounges:
 - (a) That upon application, or renewal if not previously provided, a letter from the property owner or authorized property manager be provided stating that the

business has been or will be allowed to operate in accordance with the applicable lease/rental agreement;

- (b) That upon application and renewal, proof be provided in a manner satisfactory to the Chief Licensing Officer of a valid certificate of general commercial liability insurance, in the amount of at least \$2,000,000; and
- (c) That upon request from the Chief Licensing Officer, a copy of the executed lease for the property upon which the business operates be provided.

Background

On November 29, 2022, Council approved staff's recommendations to introduce new categories of licences for night clubs, lounges and pubs, in addition to those for other types of eating establishments. To date, the City has issued 4 lounge licences, 2 pub licences and no night club licences.

Since the introduction of the night club, lounge, and pub provisions to the Business Licensing By-law, staff have observed that the Business Licensing By-law would benefit from enhanced clarity in certain areas. For instance, although the Business Licensing By-law does provide for the Chief Licensing Officer to require any other information she or he deems appropriate in the course of issuing a licence or renewing a licence, staff believe that it is more transparent to include specific provisions where the need is universal.

Previous Reports/Authority

Regulation of Lounges / Night Clubs (<u>Committee of the Whole Item 10, Report No. 38</u>.), approved by Council on November 29, 2022.

Analysis and Options

Under current Business Licensing By-law provisions, night clubs and lounges are required to comply with significantly more stringent requirements, including safety, security and nuisance mitigation requirements. However, night club and lounge owners have the ability to also operate as restaurants when not operating as night clubs or lounges. When operating as restaurants the more stringent requirements need not be in place. In order to avoid any confusion on the matter, owners of night clubs and lounges must file with the Licensing Office the days and times that they intend to operate as a restaurant. During those times they may operate under the same rules as restaurants (as long as they do not carry out any activity that would otherwise be associated with the operation of a night club or lounge).

In order to be as transparent as possible, staff are recommending clarifying language that stipulates that restaurant endorsements for night clubs are only obtainable in areas of the city where such a use is permitted under the City's Zoning By-law. Lounges do

not need this additional requirement, as they must, as part of their initial licensing, meet the definition of eating establishment under Zoning.

To mitigate potential conflicts between landlords and commercial tenants that are or plan to operate a night club or a lounge, staff are recommending that all licence applicants and licence holders provide a letter from the property owner or authorized property manager stating that the business, as it operates or intends to operate is permitted as per the lease or rental agreement in effect. Where deemed appropriate by the Chief Licensing Officer, this requirement could be supplemented by further requiring the applicant or licensee to furnish the Licensing Office with a copy of the executed lease agreement. The provision of a letter of authorization already exists for other licence categories, most notably short-term rentals.

Finally, to address any potential issues of proper insurance coverage, staff are recommending that proof be provided of a minimum of \$2,000,000 coverage through a commercial general liability policy. This requirement already exists as well for numerous business licensees.

Financial Impact

There are no anticipated financial implications to the City's budget as a result of the recommendations of this report.

Operational Impact

There are no material implications to other City departments as a result of the recommendations of this report.

This report was prepared in consultation with Legal Services.

Broader Regional Impacts/Considerations

There are no broader regional impact or considerations as a result of the recommendations of this report.

Conclusion

Since the introduction of the night club and lounge licence categories, staff have identified opportunities for greater clarity and transparency in the Business Licensing By-law, including clarifying eligibility for eating establishment endorsements, and requirements for letters of authorization and proof of insurance. Staff believe that these amendments will assist further in mitigating nuisances issues and ensuring compliance.

ACTION: DECISION

Purpose

To seek approval from Council to create a licensing endorsement to permit licensed eating establishments and banquet halls to erect and operate seasonal outdoor patios from April 1 to November 1, in support of the local hospitality industry.

Report Highlights

- Following the emergency declaration in response to the COVID-19 Pandemic, on June 29, 2020, Council approved a regulatory framework to allow eating establishments and banquet halls to erect temporary outdoor patios.
- As the pandemic and accompanying emergency measures continued to impact the local hospitality industry, and due to the successful implementation of the relief initiative, Council approved multiple extensions to permit temporary outdoor patios until January 1, 2023.
- Because of the success of the initial temporary outdoor patio program, and the current economic climate, staff are recommending that a permanent program be implemented to allow eating establishments and banquet halls to have seasonal outdoor patios from April 1 to November 1.

Recommendations

- THAT the Business Licensing By-law 122-2022, as amended, be further amended, as generally set out in Attachment 1 to this report, and in a form satisfactory to Legal Services, to create a licensing endorsement for seasonal outdoor patios;
- 2. THAT Noise Control By-law 121-2021, as amended, be further amended, as generally set out in the Attachment 2 to this report, and in a form satisfactory to

Legal Services, to permit sound from a sound reproduction device on seasonal outdoor patios, and to create parameters for prohibitions for non-compliance; and

 THAT the Fees and Charges By-law 224-2023, as amended, be further amended, as generally set out in the Attachment 3 to this report, and in a form satisfactory to Legal Services, to create a seasonal outdoor patio licence endorsement fee.

Background

To support the local hospitality industry during the COVID-19 pandemic, Council directed staff to make required by-law amendments and implement the necessary processes to permit licensed eating establishments and banquet halls to erect temporary outdoor patios, and expand existing patio areas, to create additional outdoor seating capacity. Although the COVID-19 state of emergency ended in April 2022, due to the success of the temporary outdoor patio program, the program officially did not end until January 1, 2023, due to multiple extensions of the program by Council. In total, 168 temporary outdoor patio permits were issued, and there were no significant health, safety, or compliance-related issues pertaining to temporary outdoor patios reported to the City.

Municipal Comparisons

Owing to the success of pandemic-related temporary patio programs, and the relatively low-risk nature of outdoor patios, municipalities across the GTA and Ontario have progressed their temporary patio permits into seasonal outdoor patio programs. The regulations differ in every municipality; however, each has developed specific requirements that must be adhered to. Table 1 provides a summary of the Ontario municipalities reviewed, along with a comparison of their temporary patio provisions.

Analysis and Options

Public Survey

In addition to the cross-jurisdictional scan and consultation with other municipalities, staff conducted a public survey to better understand impacts, both positive and negative, the temporary outdoor patio program had on the hospitality industry and the public, and to assess the level of interest in a permanent outdoor patio program.

In conjunction with Communications, Marketing and Engagement, By-law and Compliance, Licensing and Permit Services undertook an online survey between February 15 and March 7, 2024, which was promoted through an extensive communications outreach and through Access Vaughan. The survey received 504 responses. A summary of the findings follows, with a complete set of results provided in Attachment 1 to this report.

Most respondents (481) identified themselves as Vaughan residents. 21 identified as owners/operators of restaurants or banquet halls in Vaughan, and 23 respondents identified as owning other types of businesses in the City. Half of the survey respondents indicated that they are customers of restaurants and banquet halls located in Vaughan, and the majority of respondents indicated that they had visited temporary outdoor patios in Vaughan during the previous temporary program. The idea of seasonal outdoor patios in the City gained overall support (419 positive responses). Most respondents representing restaurant and business owners who had participated in the temporary outdoor patio program indicated they had a positive experience, noting extra revenue and additional employment opportunities as positive outcomes. Few concerns were noted by survey respondents, but included proper waste management, adequate safety measures, accessibility, smoking and noise concerns, all of which will be addressed through various by-laws. Overall, the idea of seasonal outdoor patios was deemed attractive to the majority of respondents, who indicated that this initiative would bring vibrance to the City and support existing businesses.

Proposed Regulations

Staff took a measured approach when developing the regulations for seasonal outdoor patios to balance public safety and nuisance control while providing establishment owners with flexibility to establish additional dining areas with maximum positive outcomes for their businesses and patrons. Most of the proposed regulations mirror those of the previously approved temporary outdoor patios, with additional items added to reflect the permanence of the seasonal patio endorsement. The regulations below summarize the proposed by-law requirements.

1. Licence Requirement

Eating establishments and banquet halls must have a valid City of Vaughan business licence in good standing to qualify for a seasonal outdoor patio. The seasonal outdoor patio permission will be granted by way of an endorsement to the business licence. Endorsements must be renewed every year to ensure ongoing compliance. An endorsement fee of \$200 will cover administration, inspection, and compliance-related costs.

2. Location

Seasonal outdoor patios will only be permitted on private property directly adjacent to the eating establishment or banquet hall it was established to serve. Where the eating establishment or banquet hall is the only use on the property, the operator has discretion as to the location of the seasonal outdoor patio, so long as it abuts the building and is approved by the property owner. Where the eating establishment is located in a multi-unit building, the seasonal outdoor patio may occupy the parking spaces directly adjacent to an entrance leading to the interior of the eating establishment. If there is no sidewalk, the seasonal outdoor patio must abut the building.

To ensure the safety of staff and patrons, setbacks from fire hydrants, fire routes, and accessible parking spaces will be required. Additionally, seasonal outdoor patios may not be constructed in an area within 9 metres of an intersection within a parking lot and may not obstruct or encroach upon sidewalks. The Chief Licensing Officer retains the authority to refuse an endorsement in the instance that he or she is of the opinion that the proposed seasonal outdoor patio poses a risk to public safety or is likely to create a nuisance for neighbours.

If the banquet hall or eating establishment owner does not also own the property, they must obtain permission to erect the seasonal outdoor patio from the property owner or their designate. Further, no property owner or manager shall permit the establishment, existence, or operation of a Seasonal Outdoor Patio that is not in compliance with the provisions of the City's Licensing by-law.

3. Patio Features

Seasonal outdoor patios must be enclosed by a temporary fence of not less than 1 metre in height and of reasonable structural integrity, so as to effectively cordon off the area.

Awnings, tents and umbrellas are permitted in or over seasonal outdoor patios, so long as they are erected in manner to be incompliance with applicable legislation, by-laws or regulations, including but not limited to *Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005, Building Code Act, 1992* and *O. Reg. 213/07: Fire Code,* and are constructed with fire retardant materials.

An operator is permitted to construct a platform to form a temporary flooring for the seasonal outdoor patio, so long as the platform does not exceed the height of the adjacent sidewalk. Where required, ramps must be installed to ensure accessibility.

4. Compliance with Other Legislation

Seasonal outdoor patios must comply with all relevant legislation, including public health requirements, requirements of Vaughan Fire and Rescue Services, AODA Standards and AGCO regulations. Seasonal patios must also remain in compliance with all other City by-laws, including the City's zoning by-law.

5. Noise and Nuisance Control

Seasonal outdoor patios will be permitted to have amplified or acoustic music that complies with the provisions of the Noise Control By-law. Such provisions permit for music that is maintained at a level that allows for normal conversation. Music or other noise that exceeds this threshold shall continue to be only permitted under a Special Event Permit.

6. Permissions

Where the eating establishment or banquet hall owner is not the property owner, permission for erection and operation of the seasonal outdoor patio must be obtained in writing. In the case of multi-unit properties with more than one eating establishment and/or banquet hall, the property owner will have discretion as to how many seasonal outdoor patios are permitted on the property and which units are permitted to have patios, in alignment with the requirements of the by-law.

7. Drainage and Stormwater

Seasonal outdoor patios must be constructed in a manner so as not to obstruct the established flow of stormwater on the property, or to obstruct proper drainage.

Financial Impact

An annual licence fee of \$200.00, expected to generate approximately \$30,000 annually, will be charged to offset the administrative costs of processing applications and enforcement costs for inspections, and to ensure seasonal outdoor patios are established in accordance with the requirements of the by-law.

Operational Impact

The implementation of the seasonal outdoor patio endorsement is not anticipated to have an operational impact that requires additional resources.

Broader Regional Impacts/Considerations

The recommendations in this report do not have a direct impact on other municipalities, the Region or any of its agencies, or other regulatory stakeholders.

Conclusion

The proposed development of an ongoing seasonal outdoor patio endorsement aligns with the City's strategic priority of Economic Prosperity and Job Creation by enabling businesses to have seasonal expanded seating and offering a new dining experience for patrons. Upon receiving a decision of Council, By-law and Compliance, Licensing and Permit Services staff will work directly with Communications, Marketing and Engagement to ensure the timely release of any related communications related to this new endorsement.

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Proposed Seasonal Outdoor Patio Licensing By-law Amendments

 That Business Licensing By-law 122-2022, as amended, be further amended by adding the following definitions to Part 3.0 in alphabetical order:

"Landlord" means the registered *Owner* of a property that contains an *Eating Establishment* or a *Banquet Hall* or both, or a *Person* with the authority to act on *Owner*'s behalf;

"Public Lands" means lands owned by the *City*, and shall include but not be limited to the boulevard, any *Highway*, lane, alley, square, place, viaduct or trestle, water, way or bridge, park, woodland, greenbelt, storm water management facility, open space, municipal golf course or cemetery, and all parts thereof, including any surface, grassed area, boulevard, ditch, curb, gutter and sidewalk, but does not include property owned by the Regional, Provincial, Federal Government, a Crown Corporation, Hydro, Utility or Railway Company;

"Seasonal Outdoor Patio" means a designated seasonal outdoor area accessory to an *Eating Establishment* or a *Banquet Hall* where food or drink are offered for sale or served; or where food and drink are brought from within the *Eating Establishment* or *Banquet Hall* to the outdoor area for consumption;

- 2. Business Licensing By-law 122-2022, as amended, be further amended by repealing section 4.12(3) and replacing it with the following:
 - (3) Where any *Licensee* fails to comply with a request to inspect or fails to comply with the *Notice to Comply*, the *Chief Licensing Officer* may suspend or revoke the *Licence* or the *Endorsement*.
- That Business Licensing By-law 122-2022, as amended, be further amended by adding section 7.0(10) to read as follows:
 - (10) Any *Owner* of a *Banquet Hall* that would like to obtain a *Seasonal Outdoor Patio Endorsement* shall comply with all of the provisions in Part 12.2.
- 4. That Business Licensing By-law 122-2022, as amended, be further amended by adding section 12.0(3) to read as follows:
 - (3) Any Owner of an Eating Establishment that would like to obtain a Seasonal Outdoor Patio Endorsement shall comply with all of the provisions in Part 12.2.
- 5. That Business Licensing By-law 122-2022, as amended, be further amended by

adding Part 12.2 Seasonal Outdoor Patios to read as follows:

Part 12.2 Seasonal Outdoor Patios

- (1) No Person shall establish or operate a Seasonal Outdoor Patio unless an Endorsement under his or her Eating Establishment or Banquet Hall Licence has been obtained, and is in compliance with the provisions of this By-law;
- (2) No *Person* shall apply for an Endorsement for a *Seasonal Outdoor Patio* unless that *Person* is an *Owner* who:
 - (a) owns a *Business* that is primarily an *Eating Establishment* or a *Banquet Hall*; and
 - (b) is duly *Licensed* by the *City* to operate such *Business*; and
 - (c) meets all requirements under this By-law; and
 - (d) is in compliance with all other applicable legislation, by-laws or regulations, including but not limited to Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005, Building Code Act, 1992 and O. Reg. 213/07: Fire Code, the Smoke-Free Ontario Act, Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario Act, 2019; and
 - (e) has written permission from the *Landlord* to establish or operate a *Seasonal Outdoor Patio*.
- (3) Every Owner who intends to establish or operate a Seasonal Outdoor Patio for his or her Eating Establishment or Banquet Hall, and is eligible to do so under section 12.2(2), shall:
 - (a) apply for an *Endorsement* under his or her *Licence* for one *Seasonal Outdoor Patio*;
 - (b) provide proof, in a manner satisfactory to the *Chief Licensing Officer*, that the *Business* has general commercial liability insurance in an amount of at least \$2,000,000; and
 - (c) provide proof, in a manner satisfactory to the *Chief Licensing Officer*, that the *Landlord* agrees to the establishment or operation of the *Seasonal Outdoor Patio*;
 - (d) provide a sketch of the proposed Seasonal Outdoor Patio satisfactory to the Chief Licensing Officer.

- (4) Seasonal Outdoor Patio Endorsement must be renewed for every season(i.e., April 1 to November 1) prior to operation of the Seasonal Outdoor Patio.
- (5) Despite section 12.2(3), the *Chief Licensing Officer* may require an *Owner* to provide any other information that the *Chief Licensing Officer* deems appropriate to ensure the health and safety of the public, consumer protection, or nuisance control, and failure to do so will automatically result in the application for a *Seasonal Outdoor Patio Endorsement* being denied.
- (6) Despite meeting the criteria set out in 12.2(3), the Chief Licensing Officer may deny an application for a Seasonal Outdoor Patio Endorsement, if he or she is of the opinion that the proposed Seasonal Outdoor Patio may pose a risk to the health and safety of the public, or may have a negative impact on consumer protection, or nuisance control.
- (7) Seasonal Outdoor Patios shall only operate from April 1 to November 1.
- (8) Seasonal Outdoor Patios shall be dismantled and removed in their entirety from November 2 to March 31.
- (9) A Seasonal Outdoor Patio is only permitted on private property and shall be located adjacent to the Eating Establishment or the Banquet Hall that it was established to serve.
- (10) Where an Eating Establishment or a Banquet Hall is the only use on the property, the Owner has discretion as to the location of the Seasonal Outdoor Patio, so long as it adjacent to the Eating Establishment or Banquet Hall, and is approved by the Landlord.
- (11) Where an Eating Establishment or a Banquet Hall is not the only use on the property, the Seasonal Outdoor Patio shall be located on the parking space(s) adjacent to the sidewalk that is fronting an entrance to the Eating Establishment or Banquet Hall. If there is no such sidewalk, the Seasonal Outdoor Patio must be located on the parking space(s) adjacent to an entrance to the Eating Establishment or Banquet Hall.
- (12) Every *Owner* shall ensure that a *Seasonal Outdoor Patio* and any of its appurtenances shall:
 - (a) be at least 5.0 metres from a point at the edge on any driving or parking

surface that is directly in front of a fire hydrant or fire department connection;

- (b) provide an unobstructed pathway to such fire hydrant or fire department connection that is at least 5.0 metres wide at any point;
- (c) not encroach on or occupy any laneway or other area deemed a fire route;
- (d) not encroach a sidewalk that is fronting an entrance to an *Eating Establishment* or a *Banquet Hall*;
- (e) not encroach onto or occupy any portion of *Public Lands*, a drive aisle on a parking lot, or a driveway; and
- (f) not encroach on or occupy any portion of the following, if designated for persons with a disability: a parking space, or area/access point.
- (13) Every *Owner* shall ensure that the perimeter of a *Seasonal Outdoor Patio* shall be enclosed by a temporary fence:
 - (a) of no less than 1.0 metres in height;
 - (b) that is self-supporting, plumb and in good repair;
 - (c) that is of a construction that will not under normal circumstances allow a *Person* to pass through or underneath it; and
 - (d) that has reflective markings that are spaced no more than 2.0 metres from each other.
- (14) Every Owner shall ensure that access to a Seasonal Outdoor Patio shall:
 - (a) be attended by a dedicated staff member of the *Eating Establishment* or *Banquet Hall*; and
 - (b) meet all of the accessibility requirements under the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005, S.O. 2005, c. 11 and its relevant regulations.
- (15) No shelter or cover is permitted in or over Seasonal Outdoor Patios other than umbrellas that are constructed of fire retardant materials, and awnings, tents, or roofs only if they are in compliance with applicable legislation, by-laws and regulations including but not limited to Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005, Building Code Act, 1992 and O. Reg. 213/07: Fire

Code, and are constructed of fire retardant materials.

- (16) Umbrellas on *Seasonal Outdoor Patios* are allowed if they are constructed with fire retardant materials.
- (17) Seasonal Outdoor Patios shall not obstruct stormwater flows or block stormwater drains.
- (18) No Person is allowed to smoke tobacco or cannabis and/or vape any substance on and within 9m (29.5 ft.) of a Seasonal Outdoor Patio in accordance with the Smoke-Free Ontario Act, 2017.
- (19) The following activities are not permitted in a Seasonal Outdoor Patio:
 - (a) open air fires or solid, gel or liquid fuel fire featured items;
 - (b) cooking or food preparation;
 - (c) amplified sound or music which is not allowed under *City*'s Noise By-law or Special Event's By-law, as amended or their successor by-laws.
- (20)Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Part, the *Chief Licensing Officer* may impose terms and conditions on *Endorsement* for a *Seasonal Outdoor Patio* at issuance, renewal or at any other time during the *Endorsement* period, including special conditions, as he or she may deem necessary.
- (21)No *Landlord* shall permit the establishment or operation of a *Seasonal Outdoor Patio* that is in contravention of this by-law on his or her property.

Proposed Seasonal Outdoor Patio Noise Control By-law Amendments

- That Noise By-law 121-2021, as amended, be further amended by adding section 16.0(4.1) to read as follows:
 - (4.1) Notwithstanding section 16.0(4) an *Eating Establishment* or a *Banquet Hall* that has a patio that is in compliance with this By-law and all other applicable *City* by-laws may operate a *Sound Reproduction Device* such that the amplified *Sound* from it allows for normal conversation.
- That Noise By-law 121-2021, as amended, be further amended by adding section 16.0(4.2) to read as follows:
 - (4.2) For purposes of section 16.0(4.1), an *Officer* has discretion to establish whether the amplified *Sound* allows for normal conversation.
- That Noise By-law 121-2021, as amended, be further amended by adding section 16.0(4.3) to read as follows:
 - (4.3) Notwithstanding section 16.0(4.1), if three or more complaints are received by the *City* respecting the amplified *Sound* being emitted, as per section 16.0(4.1), within a one-month period with respect to the same *Eating Establishment* or *Banquet Hall*, the *Director* may impose limitations on that *Eating Establishment* or *Banquet Hall*'s municipal business licence or endorsement in accordance with *City*'s Business Licensing By-law, including prohibiting the use of a *Sound Reproduction Device*.
- 4. That Noise By-law 121-2021, as amended, be further amended by adding the following line to Schedule 6:







Q3 Did you work for a restaurant or banquet hall that participated in the City's Temporary Outdoor Patio Program?





Q4 Did you visit a temporary outdoor patio (as a customer) at a restaurant or banquet hall in Vaughan between June 2020 and January 2023?





Q6 Did your business participate in the City's Temporary Outdoor Patio Program?









Q12 Accounting for the effects of the pandemic, did the program impact your business's employment opportunities?







Q14 Which ward is your business located in? Check the ward boundary map (PDF) if you are unsure.







ACTION: DECISION

<u>Purpose</u>

In response to instances of improper wildlife containment and removal practices which cause distress, injury or death to animals, staff seek to develop regulations for companies offering wildlife removal services in the City of Vaughan through the development of a new business licensing category. The new enforcement tools will ensure wildlife removal companies operate in a manner that minimizes the risk of harm or death to wildlife and implements consumer protection measures for the public.

Report Highlights

- Day-to-day operations of wildlife removal companies are largely unregulated.
- Animal Services has responded to complaints of wildlife removal companies using removal techniques that compromise the wellbeing of animals and put the public at risk.
- To minimize harm to animals and the public, staff are recommending that wildlife removal companies be required to obtain a business licence to operate in the City of Vaughan.
- If approved, Vaughan will be the first municipality in Ontario to regulate Wildlife Removal Companies.

Recommendations

 THAT the Business Licensing By-law 122-2022, as amended, be further amended, as generally set out in Attachment 1 to this report, and in a form satisfactory to Legal Services, to create licensing provisions for wildlife removal companies; and THAT the Fees and Charges By-law 224-2023, as amended, be further amended, as generally set out in Attachment 2 to this report, in a form satisfactory to Legal Services, to create a wildlife removal company licensing fee and wildlife removal company vehicle licensing placard fee.

Background

To address nuisance caused by wildlife on their properties, or intrusion within, property owners will seek the services of wildlife removal companies, which is a largely unregulated industry in Ontario. Complaints have been received by the Animal Services division of By-law and Compliance, Licensing and Permit Services that wildlife removal companies are not consistently carrying out the capture and relocation of animals in an ethical or humane manner. Although the Animal Control By-law sets forth broad requirements for the expected treatment of wildlife by all persons, it does not specifically regulate the activities of wildlife removal companies.

Previous Reports/Authority

City of Vaughan Animal Control By-law 066-2020

Analysis and Options

Wildlife removal companies remove wildlife from residential and commercial properties. Most frequently, the wildlife removed include squirrels, racoons, skunks, and other small mammals. More than a dozen wildlife removal companies advertise as being Vaughanbased and are presently operating in the City of Vaughan. It his highly probable that many more companies located/based outside of Vaughan's municipal boundaries travel to Vaughan to offer services.

Although some activities of wildlife removal companies are governed in part by various provincial and federal acts and regulations, there is very little day-to-day supervision of these companies. Due to the lack of oversight of and regulations for wildlife removal companies, inhumane practices have been reported to and observed by Animal Services. Examples include young being needlessly separated from their mother, inhumane trapping, animals being confined without the necessities of life, inhumane euthanasia techniques, and improper relocation and disposal of remains.

Jurisdictional Scan

After completing a comprehensive jurisdictional scan, staff were unable to find any municipalities in Ontario who regulate wildlife removal companies, and only British Columbia specifically licenses wildlife removal companies at a provincial level. By proceeding with and introducing regulations through a business licensing framework as recommended within this staff report, the City will be setting a significant precedent in the care and control of wildlife by ensuring companies that offer and provide removal of

wildlife services do so in a humane and ethical manner, while establishing regulations to support consumer protection.

Industry Consultation

Email correspondence was sent to 24 wildlife removal companies that advertise they are Vaughan-based or provide services within the City, asking for feedback and providing an opportunity to speak with staff. One company responded with feedback, indicating their support for the new regulations.

Proposed Regulations

The proposed regulations include those which are standard for all business licence applications and the regulations for other contractor-type businesses operating in Vaughan, including insurance, vehicle signage, and staff identification requirements. Additional provisions have been developed specific to wildlife removal companies that function to ensure the safe and humane treatment of wildlife and greater consumer protection.

Criminal Record Check

All owners, operators and employees of wildlife removal companies will be required to submit a Criminal Record Check, from an Ontario Police Service, which meets the standard provisions under the licensing by-law and, in addition, must indicate that there have been no convictions under Sections 445, 446, and/or 447 of the Criminal Code of Canada, which are specific to animal cruelty and neglect.

Vehicles

Vehicles used by wildlife removal companies will be required to adhere to certain standards to ensure the safe and humane transportation of animals. In addition to being equipped with working and adequate temperature control measures to prevent distress to wildlife being contained, all vehicles must be equipped with adequate measures to contain and segregate wildlife from coming in to contact with any other animal or human occupant of the vehicle, and all animals must be securely contained within a primary enclosure within the vehicle.

Contracts

As a consumer protection measure, wildlife removal companies will be required to provide a written contract to their customers, specifying the work that will be performed and the payment schedule, prior to accepting any payments or commencing any work.

Bite Reporting Requirements

To limit the spread of zoonotic disease, wildlife removal companies will be required to report all bites or injuries to a person that result in breakage of skin to local public health unit and Vaughan Animal Services within 24 hours. Similarly, all bites on injuries caused

to a domestic animal by wildlife must be reported to Vaughan Animal Services within 24 hours.

Release Requirements

To ensure a reasonable chance of reunification and reintegration within their natural habitat, wildlife removal companies must release an animal no more than 1 kilometer away from the capture location. Further, any animals that cannot be released back in to the wild shall only be released to a Province of Ontario authorized wildlife rehabilitator or Vaughan Animal Services.

Policies and Procedures

To mitigate transmission of zoonotic diseases, such as rabies, and to ensure ethical and humane methods are used in the care and control of animals, it is critical that wildlife removal companies have standardized policies and procedures in place. Companies will be required to submit copies of their policies and procedures for cleaning and disinfection of vehicles and supplies, handling of injured and diseased animals, bites, and personal protective equipment requirements for staff.

Trap Requirements

The new regulations will prevent wildlife removal companies from using certain types of traps that are known to cause unnecessary and indiscriminate distress to animals, including the use of noxious and poisonous chemicals. Moreover, the by-law will stipulate time intervals at which companies will be required to check traps for captured animals, and for their release.

Log and Record Keeping Requirements

Wildlife Removal Company owners will be required to maintain logs pertaining to each wildlife capture and/or removal for a minimum of 1 year, which include information about the capture and and/or removal, such as the date, time and location, species and gender information, condition of the animal, removal of any habitats, and outcome.

Compliance with Other Legislation

To maintain their City of Vaughan business licence, companies will be required to remain in compliance with various pieces of legislation at the municipal, provincial, and federal levels that govern wildlife removal practices in part or any other applicable law.

Financial Impact

Wildlife removal companies will be subject to the same licensing fee that is collected for other contractor-type businesses. It is anticipated that this fee will be sufficient to recover costs associated with the administration and enforcement of this licensing category.

Operational Impact

It is anticipated that any operational impacts resulting from the implementation of this licensing category will be absorbed by the current staff complement.

Broader Regional Impacts/Considerations

There are no municipalities in Ontario known to licence wildlife removal companies. The passage of this new licensing category sets a precedent for municipal standards for these companies.

Staff consulted with stakeholders at animal welfare agencies that work alongside the City, and all expressed their enthusiasm for this new licensing category.

Conclusion

Urban expansion and changing natural habitats are displacing wildlife in our community, creating an urgent need to implement effective measures to ensure they are protected. By licensing wildlife removal companies, the City will not only engage in critical wildlife protection efforts, but will also create additional consumer protection measures for residents who hire wildlife removal companies, and health and safety precautions for the general public. As Vaughan will be the first municipality to create a licensing category for wildlife removal companies in Ontario, staff are hoping that other municipalities will follow suit and make clear that any company interacting with animals on behalf of residents must ensure that the health and safety of both animals and humans remains their top priority.

Proposed Wildlife Removal Company Licensing By-law Amendments

1. That Business Licensing By-law 122-2022, as amended, be further amended by adding the following definitions to Part 3.0 in alphabetical order:

"Wildlife" means an animal that belongs to a species that is wild by nature of that particular region and includes human introduced game wildlife and specially protected wildlife;

"Wildlife Removal Company" means a *Licensed* company which removes *Wildlife* from areas that are not in their normal or usual habitat or causing a nuisance; "Wildlife Removal Company Owner" means a Person who alone or with others Owns and/or has the ultimate control over and/or who directs the operation of the business, activity or undertaking carried out by a Wildlife Containment Company;

2. That Business Licensing By-law 122-2022, as amended, be further amended by adding **Part 16.2 Wildlife Removal Companies** to read as follows:

Part 16.2 Wildlife Removal Companies

- In addition to the requirements set out in Part 4.2, every application for a Wildlife Removal Company Licence shall include:
 - (a) proof, satisfactory to the *Chief Licensing Officer*, that every employee or other *Person* under the *Applicant*'s charge is insured in accordance with the *Workplace Safety and Insurance Act, 1997*, S.O. 1997, c. 16, as amended;
 - (b) a photograph of the *Applicant* taken within thirty (30) days prior to the *Licence* application, such that the photograph is a clear likeness of the *Applicant*, and where the *Applicant* is a:
 - (i) Sole Proprietorship, such photograph shall be of the sole proprietor;
 - (ii) *Partnership*, such photograph shall be taken of at least one of the partners;
 - (iii) Corporation, such photograph shall be taken of at least one of the directors or officers of the Corporation;
 - (c) a complete Police Criminal Records Check issued by an Ontario
 Police Service, dated not more than ninety (90) days prior to the

date application for the *Applicant*, and each employee of the *Applicant*; and

- (d) a map indicating service area.
- (2) In addition to the requirements set out in Part 4.2, every application for a Wildlife Removal Company Licence shall include, by way of certificate of insurance satisfactory to the Chief Licensing Officer, proof of a minimum limit of two million dollars (\$2,000,000) in commercial general liability insurance coverage.
- (3) Every *Applicant* for a *Wildlife Removal Company* shall register each vehicle used in the business by filing a list indicating for each vehicle, the make, model, year and the provincial vehicle plate number. In case of change of the information pertaining to the vehicles used in the business, such changes should be submitted to the *Chief Licensing Officer* in a form satisfactory to the *Chief Licensing Officer*.
- (4) Every Wildlife Removal Company shall ensure that every vehicle actively used in connection with the business, with the exception of a personal vehicle used only for the purposes of visiting a work site to meet a *Customer* or provide a quote, shall have visibly displayed on the dashboard a placard identifying the business name and *City Licence* number in a form satisfactory to the *Chief Licensing Officer*.
- (5) Placards, as provided for in section 16.2(4) are only transferable to other vehicles used primarily in connection with the business, but does not include any vehicles belonging to or used in connection with any subcontractors of the business.
- (6) Vehicle *Licensing* placards are subject to the fees set out in *Fees and Charges By-law*, as amended, or its successor by-law.
- (7) Every Wildlife Removal Company shall ensure all vehicles actively used in connection with the business are equipped with working and adequate temperature control measures to prevent distress to Wildlife being contained therein.

- (8) Every Wildlife Removal Company shall ensure that all vehicles actively used in connection with the business are equipped with adequate measures to contain separate Wildlife from coming in to contact with any other animal or human occupant of the vehicle.
- (9) Every Wildlife Removal Company shall ensure that all animals contained in a vehicle used in connection with the business are contained within a primary enclosure within the vehicle.
- (10) Every Wildlife Removal Company shall ensure that its employees wear identification or an article of clothing which identifies them as an employee of the company when responding to a call for service.
- (11) Every Wildlife Removal Company shall include its corresponding City Licence number on all of its outdoor Sign or other advertising or promotional device used in the City and shall comply with the City's Sign By-law, as amended or its successor by-law.
- (12) When a Wildlife Removal Company has been made aware of or has witnessed any bites or injuries caused to a Person by Wildlife that results in breakage of skin, such information must be reported by the Wildlife Removal Company to local public health unit and Vaughan Animal Services within 24 hours.
- (13) When a Wildlife Removal Company has been made aware of or has witnessed any bites on injuries caused to a domestic animal by Wildlife, such information must be reported to Vaughan Animal Services within 24 hours.
- (14) Every *Applicant* for a *Wildlife Removal Company Licence* shall, at the time of initial application and upon every renewal, provide a detailed log for the preceding year, in accordance with section 16.2(28) satisfactory to the *Chief Licensing Officer*.
- (15) Prior to accepting any payment from a *Customer* or commencing any work for a *Customer*, a *Wildlife Removal Company* shall provide a written contract to said *Customer*, specifying the work to be performed and the schedule of payment and such contract shall be signed by the *Wildlife*

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Removal Company and presented to the *Customer* for acceptance and signature.

- (16) Prior to providing a written contract pursuant to section 16.2(15), a Wildlife Removal Company shall inform the Customer in writing of all local by-laws that affect or may affect the proposed Services and shall also inform the Customer in writing of any permits required by the City. For greater clarity, this information shall be provided in a communication separate and apart from the contract.
- (17) No *Wildlife Removal Company* shall release an animal more than one (1) kilometer away from the capture location.
- (18) No Wildlife Removal Company shall release an animal to any other Person other than a Province of Ontario authorized Wildlife rehabilitator or Vaughan Animal Services.
- (19) Every Applicant for a Wildlife Removal Company Licence shall, at the time of initial application, upon request by the City, or if any changes are made to the policies and procedures referred to hereafter, submit copies of all policies and procedures pertaining to the trapping, care, transfer, euthanasia and release of Wildlife, to the satisfaction of the Chief Licensing Officer, including the following:
 - (a) euthanasia, including methods, circumstances, and disposal;
 - (b) disposal of carcasses;
 - (c) cleaning and disinfection of vehicles and traps, including specific
 details regarding products, frequency and biohazard protocols;
 - (d) personal protective equipment requirements for staff;
 - (e) bite and injury protocol for staff and the public.
- (20) Every Applicant for a Wildlife Removal Company Licence shall provide, at the time of initial application, upon every renewal, and at any time as requested by the City a list of all staff employed by the company.
- (21) No *Wildlife Removal Company Owner* or employee shall use or permit the use of body-gripping traps, leg-hold traps, or any other traps prohibited

under the *Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act, 1997* for the purpose of trapping *Wildlife*.

- (22) Notwithstanding section 16.2(21), it does not apply to individuals licensed to use such devices under the *Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act,* 1997.
- (23) No *Wildlife Removal Company Owner* or employee shall use or permit the use of glue board traps.
- (24) Notwithstanding section 16.2(23), it does not apply if the intent is to use glue board traps to capture insects or vermin.
- (25) No *Wildlife Removal Company Owner* or employee shall permit an animal to be in distress while in a trap or otherwise contained.
- (26) All Wildlife Removal Company Owners shall ensure that all traps and nest boxes are checked at minimum every eight (8) hours and any captured Wildlife is released within one (1) hour of discovery.
- (27) No *Wildlife Removal Company Owner* or employee shall use or permit the use of noxious or poisonous chemicals or substances to subdue or aid in the removal of *Wildlife*.
- (28) *Wildlife Removal Company Owners* must maintain logs pertaining to each *Wildlife* capture and/or removal for a minimum of one (1) year, including:
 - (a) the location of the capture and/or removal;
 - (b) date of capture/removal;
 - (c) common name of the *Wildlife* captured and/or removed;
 - (d) gender and age class of *Wildlife*;
 - (e) bands or tags on *Wildlife*;
 - (f) description of all nests, dams, dens, or other structures destroyed or removed;
 - (g) if the capture or removal was live or deceased;
 - (h) location of release, if applicable;
 - (i) date and method of euthanasia, if applicable; and
 - (j) transfer information to authorized *Wildlife* rehabilitator (date, location).
- (29) Every Wildlife Removal Company Owner shall comply with all applicable

municipal, provincial and federal laws and regulations.

- 3. That Business Licensing By-law 122-2022, as amended, be further amended by adding *Wildlife Removal Company (Owner)* to Schedule A in alphabetical order.
- That Business Licensing By-law 122-2022, as amended, be further amended by adding Wildlife Removal Companies to Schedule F after Pet Shops, Kennels and Pet Grooming Establishments to read as follows:

Wildlife Removal Companies

5.A. If an *Applicant* has:

- 1) any code 01 Conviction;
- 2) any code 02 *Conviction* within the last ten (10) years;
- 3) any code 03 Conviction within the last seven (7) years;
- 4) two or more code 03 *Convictions* within the last ten (10) years;
- 5) any code 04 *Conviction* within the last three (3) years;
- 6) two or more code 04 *Convictions* within the last five (5) years;
- 7) any code 05 Conviction within the last year;
- 8) any code 08 Conviction;
- 9) six (6) or more by-law related* *Convictions* within the last year concerning the *Licensed Business* or individual, or any other of the individual's businesses that are *Licensed* or are required to be *Licensed*, or any of the individual's prior *Businesses* that were *Licensed* or were required to be *Licensed*;
- 10) four (4) or more by-law related* *Convictions* within the last twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date of issuance; or
- 11) overdue by-law fines or penalties, unless the *Applicant* or *Licensee*provides proof that such fines or penalties have been subsequently paid,
 despite the application being complete and all fees paid, the *Licensing Office* shall refuse to issue or renew a licence. In the case of an existing
 licence, the *Licensing Office* shall suspend the licence.
- 5.B. The *Chief Licensing Officer* may, upon a new application for a *Licence* or renewal, as the case may require, issue, renew or reinstate a *Licence*, if at

the time of the said application for a *Licence* or renewal, the *Licensee*'s record of convictions has fallen below the prescribed thresholds and therefore is in compliance with this By-law.

5.C. The *Chief Licensing Officer* may place conditions and/or issue a warning letter on a *Licence* if he or she has reasonable grounds or otherwise believes that a *Licensee* may be at risk of exceeding a threshold prescribed in this schedule or may otherwise be conducting his or her *Business* in a manner that is not in accordance with this By-law, other City by-laws, legislation and its regulations, or with honesty and integrity, and a warning letter under this section shall set out the specific applicable threshold.

* The *Chief Licensing Officer*, in her or his sole discretion, may determine whether a *Conviction* is a related *Conviction*.

TITLE: ALL-WAY STOP CONTROL REVIEW AT THE INTERSECTION OF GRAND TRUNK AVENUE AND SAND VALLEY STREET

ACTION: DECISION

Purpose

This report seeks Council approval to implement an all-way stop control at the intersection of Grand Trunk Avenue and Sand Valley Street to address continued resident concerns regarding traffic operations, sightlines, and pedestrian safety.

Report Highlights

- Residents have expressed concerns regarding the visibility of southbound traffic on Grand Trunk Avenue from Sand Valley Street.
- Traffic studies undertaken at the Grand Trunk Avenue and Sand Valley Street intersection determined that the minimum intersection sight distance is insufficient due to vehicles parked on the driveway's extended boulevard.
- Discussion with By-Law enforcement staff indicate that boulevard parking is permitted where there is sufficient space for a vehicle to park without encroaching on the sidewalk or road.
- The City's parking by-law (064-2019, Sec 5 (9.q)) prohibits parking on any portion of the boulevard except for a driveway, including its apron.
- Staff have explored various options to address the concern. It is recommended that an all-way stop control be implemented at the subject intersection to enhance traffic operations.

Recommendations

1. That the implementation of an all-way stop control at the intersection of Grand Trunk Avenue and Sand Valley Street be approved;

- 2. That a By-law be enacted to amend By-law 284-94, the Consolidated Traffic Bylaw, to add an all-way stop control at the intersection of Grand Trunk Avenue and Sand Valley Street; and
- 3. That the City Clerk forward a copy of this report to York Regional Police.

Background

Residents have expressed concerns over available intersection sight distance and pedestrian safety at the Grand Trunk Avenue and Sand Valley Street intersection.

The intersection of Grand Trunk Avenue and Sand Valley Street is a three-legged intersection, with two travel lanes (one lane per direction). Grand Trunk Avenue, running north-south, is designated as a minor collector roadway with a pavement width of 11.5 metres, and a right-of-way width of 23.0 metres. Sand Valley Street, running east-west, is designated as a local road with a pavement width of 8.0 metres, and a right-of-way width of 20.0 metres.

Under the Highway Traffic Act (HTA), vehicles are required to stop for pedestrians at the pedestrian crossover located at the south leg of the intersection. Vehicles travelling on Sand Valley Street, are required to stop at Grand Trunk Avenue. There are sidewalks along both sides of Grand Trunk Avenue and on the south side of Sand Valley Street.

Residents have expressed concerns about the intersection sight distance and pedestrian safety at the noted intersection. The intersection sight distance refers to the visibility of a driver on a minor-road approach required to safely enter or cross the major road.

Pedestrian generators in the area include Romeo Dallaire Public School (on Peter Rupert Avenue at the west end of Sand Valley Street), Dr. Roberta Bonders Public School (on the southeast corner of Grand Trunk Avenue and Ivy Glen Drive) and Freedom Trail Park (on the southeast corner of Grand Trunk Avenue and Freedom Trail). A location map is provided in Attachment 1.

Previous Reports/Authority

Analysis and Options

A traffic operations review determined that the minimum intersection sight distance requirement at the Grand Trunk Avenue and Sand Valley Street intersection is not met for eastbound motorists.

A review of the sight distance at this intersection demonstrates that the minimum sight distance requirement as per the Transportation Association of Canada (TAC) guidelines is not met for eastbound motorists due to vehicles parked on the extended boulevard portion of the driveway (apron) at the northwest corner of the intersection. The measured intersection sight distance is 24 metres when the vehicle is parked on the apron. As per TAC guidelines, a minimum intersection sight distance is 85 metres at the intersection for a design speed of 60 km/h.

Curb extensions serve to reduce travel lane widths and crossing distance for pedestrians. However, the curb extensions at this intersection result in a larger than typical driveway apron length of 4.6 metres at the two adjacent residential properties and consequently allow for residents to park vehicles perpendicular to the roadway, obstructing sightlines of vehicles stopped along the side street. Attachment 2 outlines the parking location.

According to the City's parking by-law (064-2019, Sec 5 (9.q)), parking is prohibited on any portion of the boulevard except for a driveway, including its apron. At this location, the driveway apron is considered part of the City's right-of-way. From discussion with Enforcement Services staff, parking on an apron is permitted when there is sufficient space for a vehicle to park without encroaching onto the sidewalk or travelled portion of the road. A parking infraction is issued if a vehicle parked on the apron encroaches onto the sidewalk or the road.

Due to various factors, including current city–wide parking enforcement practices, multigenerational homes, and high housing prices, parking on the apron is permitted to accommodate and support residents if there are no vehicular encroachments on the sidewalk or roadway.

The pedestrian crossover at the intersection is considered a controlled crossing, and adequate sight distance for all road users is required.

The current crossing requires pedestrians to observe oncoming traffic on Grand Trunk Avenue before entering the crosswalk to safely cross the street. As a result of the vehicle parked on the apron, the intersection sight distance is also obstructed for pedestrians on the southwest corner intending to cross eastbound.

An all-way stop control is recommended at the intersection of Grand Trunk Avenue and Sand Valley Street to address resident concerns and traffic operations.

According to the Ontario Traffic Manual (OTM) Book 5, the minimum volume warrant for an all-way stop on urban roadways is not currently met at this intersection. However, the OTM also states that if "all attempts to improve the sight distance have been exhausted and it still does not meet the guidelines, the intersection may be considered for conversion to an all-way stop operation". City staff have explored various solutions to the sightline concern, including potential parking restrictions on the apron and the implementation of traffic calming measures.

At this time, implementing a parking restriction on the apron is not a viable option due to current city-wide parking enforcement practices and the need to ensure fairness amongst residents. Traffic calming measures can help manage speed and increase driver awareness, but the sightline issue remains. Therefore, we recommend an all-way stop as the most effective measure to address this concern. An all-way stop requires all drivers to come to a complete stop and proceed safely at the intersection, yielding to other drivers and pedestrians.

Financial Impact.

The capital cost associated with installing the all-way stop signs is estimated to be \$700 and has been included in the approved 2024 Operating Budget. The on-going cost to maintain the signs and pavement markings is estimated to be \$200 per annum and will be incorporated in future year Operating Budgets.

Operational Impacts

Consultation has taken place with Roads Operations, and the By-law and Compliance, Licensing and Permit Services department throughout assessing options to address the parking concerns. Staff will work with Road Operations to implement and maintain the signage. The ongoing cost to maintain the signage and pavement markings will be incorporated in future years' Operating Budgets through the budget process.

Broader Regional Impacts/Considerations

York Regional Police will be responsible for enforcing compliance with the recommended all-way stop at the intersection of Grand Trunk Avenue and Sand Valley Street. As such, a copy of this report will be forwarded to them upon approval of the recommendations by Council.

Conclusion

A traffic review determined the minimal sight distance requirement at the Grand Trunk Avenue and Sand Valley Street intersection is not met for eastbound motorists and pedestrians when vehicles are parked on the apron. Staff have explored several options and propose the implementation of an all-way stop control at the noted intersection to reduce the risks associated with the current sight distance conditions.







Purpose

In accordance with the terms of the 2022-2026 partnership agreement between the City of Vaughan and ventureLAB, ventureLAB is providing an annual update on key activities and successes in 2023. This report seeks Council endorsement to continue the partnership with ventureLAB in 2024 to advance ongoing work to catalyze the growth and development of tech and innovation sector in Vaughan.

Report Highlights

- Economic Development has continued to work with ventureLAB, the provincially designated Regional Innovation Centre (RIC) for York Region, to enhance services for innovators and technology companies in Vaughan.
- In 2023, ventureLAB collaborated closely with Economic Development to build innovation capacity, drive job creation and economic growth, and generate an investment pipeline to attract top-tier tech companies from around the globe to Vaughan.
- In March 2023, ventureLAB opened the Hardware Catalyst Initiative MedTech lab in Vaughan in partnership with Sterling Industries, which is catalyzing the growth of Vaughan's medtech sector by attracting leading start-ups, supporting their growth and development, and raising the profile of Vaughan as a world-class destination for health innovation. This is a key steppingstone to a future ventureLAB facility at the Vaughan Healthcare Centre Precinct (VHCP).
- Given the past year's successes, the City should continue to deepen the partnership with ventureLAB and build on strategies and activities which support the growth and success of Vaughan's technology, MedTech and automotive tech sectors.

Recommendations

- 1. THAT Council receive ventureLAB's annual update, evidencing the successful achievement of the key performance indicators set out in Schedule C of the ventureLAB/City of Vaughan 2022-2026 partnership agreement (Attachment 1); and
- 2. THAT, as per Section 4.4 of the ventureLAB/City of Vaughan 2022-2026 partnership agreement, Council approve the continuation of the partnership in 2024.

Background

Health technology, auto parts manufacturing and innovation, and advanced manufacturing innovation are key established and emerging clusters in Vaughan's economy.

Innovation capacity is central to the success and growth of Vaughan's established and emerging sectors, including advanced manufacturing, auto technology, and health technology. To catalyze economic growth in these sectors, Economic Development has partnered with ventureLAB to provide targeted support, resources, equipment, and

advisory services for businesses in high-growth industries. This partnership leverages ventureLAB's demonstrated track record in the health technology, life sciences, auto technology, software and services, and technology hardware sectors.

Economic Development has continued to deepen its partnership with ventureLAB, the provincially designated Regional Innovation Centre (RIC) for York Region, to enhance services for innovators and technology companies in Vaughan.

ventureLAB offers advisory services, accelerator programming and access to critical equipment and resources to help technology companies raise capital, recruit and retain talent, commercialize new technology and intellectual property, and acquire customers. ventureLAB's mandate is to support the growth of globally competitive technology companies that grow to scale in York Region and Canada.

In 2022, Council endorsed a renewed partnership agreement between the City and ventureLAB for 2022-2026, for the purpose of expanding resources and support available to Vaughan-based technology companies. This partnership agreement focuses on advancing three strategic objectives:

- 1. Contribute to the Diversification and Competitiveness of Vaughan's Economy by building capacity for clusters in Health and Advanced Manufacturing.
- 2. Establish a ventureLAB facility in Vaughan.
- 3. Promote and profile Vaughan as a hub for entrepreneurship.

ventureLAB is a member of the Vaughan Healthcare Centre Precinct (VHCP) partnership and is contributing to efforts to develop the VHCP into an epicentre for excellence in healthcare and health technology.

As a VHCP partner, ventureLAB contributes to the technology development and commercialization, talent development and innovation goals of the VHCP partnership.

In March 2023, ventureLAB opened the Hardware Catalyst Initiative MedTech lab in Vaughan which will act as a critical magnet for supporting the growth of high-potential medical device companies and attracting them to Vaughan. The new MedTech lab is a significant step along the path to developing the VHCP and offers significant opportunities for entrepreneurs, healthcare practitioners, tech-sector talent and researchers to collaborate to advance the next generation of healthcare and health technology.

Analysis and Options

In 2023, ventureLAB delivered programs, services, and ecosystem development activities to build innovation capacity, drive job creation and catalyze economic growth in the city of Vaughan's technology and innovation sector.

ventureLAB has identified 3 key strategic objectives for the term of the 2022-2026 partnership agreement with the City of Vaughan:

- 1. Contribute to the Diversification and Competitiveness of Vaughan's Economy by building capacity for clusters in Health and Advanced Manufacturing.
- 2. Establish a ventureLAB facility in Vaughan.
- 3. Promote and profile Vaughan as a hub for entrepreneurship.

A major milestone in 2023 was the establishment of the Hardware Catalyst Initiative (HCI) for MedTech in Vaughan.

To establish the lab, ventureLAB partnered with Vaughan-based leading medical device contract manufacturer Sterling Industries to establish a State-of-the-Art MedTech Lab at Sterling's Vaughan facility. ventureLAB received \$2.5 in provincial funding to establish the lab and develop the MedTech stream of the HCI program. This first-of-its-kind facility in Canada, and the partnership with Sterling Industries and ventureLAB's global network of partners, are propelling Vaughan into the future of what is possible at the intersection of MedTech, AI and Hardware. Since the MedTech lab officially opened in 2023, 11 MedTech companies have participated in ventureLAB's MedTech HCI stream, gaining access to equipment, advisory services, and commercialization support in Vaughan.

In 2024, ventureLAB will focus on deepening its presence in Vaughan through the MedTech lab and through collaborative programming and marketing targeted at growing Vaughan's MedTech and automotive clusters.

ventureLAB plans to raise the profile of Vaughan's Health Cluster in Vaughan by participating in the 2024 MedTech Conference, hosted in Toronto this October. A focus on hosting sector-specific roundtables will also facilitate the development of ecosystem connections and industry collaboration opportunities. ventureLAB will also continue to collaborate with Economic Development on co-marketing initiatives to promote and attract companies to Vaughan.

Financial Impact

In 2022, Council endorsed a renewed partnership with ventureLAB for 2022-2026. In accordance with the terms of this partnership, ventureLAB reports annually to Council on the three key objectives of the agreement in order to secure approval for the continuation of the partnership.

For 2024-2026, a capital budget request was approved to meet the requirements for the continuation of this partnership agreement, in accordance with the payment schedule set out below:

Vaughan is uniquely positioned to develop thriving MedTech and automobility tech sectors by building on existing regional partnerships, expanding resources and support for emerging industry leaders, and attracting new companies to invest in Vaughan's clusters. Many other municipalities in the GTHA are responding to economic trends by making significant investments in assets and partnerships to support the innovation sector and secure long-term economic prosperity.

Continued investments in expanded services, resources and physical spaces for Vaughan's technology companies will help Vaughan remain competitive relative to other hubs in the Region. Vaughan is uniquely positioned, by virtue of its prime location and access to transportation corridors within the GTA, density of highly skilled talent, and advancement of strategic initiatives such as the VHCP, to develop dense and prosperous MedTech and automobility tech clusters.

Conclusion

In 2023, ventureLAB delivered services and programs to build innovation capacity, drive job creation and economic growth, and generate an investment pipeline to attract top-tier tech companies from around the globe to Vaughan. The annual update from ventureLAB highlights major milestones and successes from 2023, including the opening of the Hardware Catalyst Initiative MedTech lab in Vaughan.

With Council approval, Economic Development will continue the partnership with ventureLAB in 2024.

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FUNDING AGREEMENT

(the "Agreement")

This Agreement is effective as of the 1 day of January, 2022 (the "Effective Date").

BETWEEN:

THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF VAUGHAN

("CITY")

-and-

VENTURELAB REGIONAL INNOVATION CENTRE

("VL")

(each a "Party" and collectively the "Parties")

RECITALS:

- 1. WHEREAS VL is a leading technology hub that supports tech entrepreneurs and small businesses, with a vision to make York Region a destination of choice for technology firms to create globally competitive companies, building and scaling in Canada;
- 2. WHEREAS as a leading innovation partner in York Region with a sustainable governance, funding and staffing model, VL works to grow globally competitive tech titans that build-to-scale in Canada;
- 3. WHEREAS VL manages programs and services that contribute to business growth and innovation, thereby stimulating the economy and strengthening key sectors in York Region and Vaughan, such as advanced manufacturing, hardware and medtech and other emerging technology sectors;
- 4. WHEREAS the CITY works to make Vaughan a place where entrepreneurship, business, tourism, art and culture prosper and grow, with one of its strategic goals to develop Vaughan as an entrepreneurial, small business and innovation hub;
- 5. WHEREAS VL and the CITY share a mutual long-term goal to increase technology related entrepreneurship, research and commercialization services, including the development and operation of an innovation lab in Vaughan;
- 6. WHEREAS VL has partnered with the CITY, York University and Mackenzie Health to establish and operate an innovation lab on CITY-owned lands at the Healthcare Centre Precinct, adjacent to the new Mackenzie Vaughan Hospital;
- 7. WHEREAS the CITY and VL have planned tech entrepreneurship services, projects and programs that drive-toward achieving mutual goals (the "Program");
- 8. WHEREAS the CITY desires to formalize a partnership with VL and fund a portion of

the Program by making a financial contribution to VL pursuant to the terms and conditions set out herein; and

In consideration of the covenants, rights and obligations set out below, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

1.0 SCHEDULES AND ENTIRE AGREEMENT

1.1 The following schedules form part of this Agreement:

Schedule "B"	VL Mark
Schedule "C"	Partnership Objectives

1.2 This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties concerning the Program. There are no warranties, representations, covenants or agreements, expressed or implied, between the parties except those expressly set forth in this Agreement. Any amendments or modifications of this Agreement shall be in writing and executed by the Parties.

2.0 PARTNERSHIP OBJECTIVES AND BENEFITS

2.1 The purpose of the partnership between VL and the CITY is set out in Schedule C "Partnership Objectives". The Parties acknowledge and agree that Schedule C sets out the objectives and key performance indicators to guide activities under this agreement. The intent is to enable the talent, entrepreneurship, and robust industry clusters in Vaughan and to coordinate CITY and VL efforts to scale Vaughan companies into global enterprises.

3.0 TERM

3.1 The term of this Agreement shall commence on the Effective Date and remain in effect until December 31, 2026, unless terminated earlier in accordance with Article 13 of this Agreement (the "Term").

4.0 PAYMENT TERMS

4.1 The CITY shall pay to VL the sum of \$505,000 in accordance with the payment schedule set out below, and VL shall provide the Program hereto:

- 4.2 Payment will be made by cheque, or electronically, payable to VL for the Program.
- 4.3 The Parties acknowledge and agree that the payments made pursuant to this Agreement are in consideration for only the Program described herein and do not replace, reduce, eliminate or otherwise abate any current obligations, financial or otherwise between the Parties.
- 4.4 The first payment under this agreement shall be made yearly. Subsequent payments to be made at the start of each calendar year, but will be conditional upon:
 - (a) successful achievement of the objectives in this Agreement in the preceding calendar year, as evidenced by VL reporting on and meeting, to the satisfaction of the CITY, the key performance indicators set out in Schedule C, and
 - (b) future CITY budget approvals as required.

5.0 USE OF OFFICIAL MARK

- 5.1 The CITY grants VL a non-exclusive, royalty-free, world-wide license to use its Official Mark (as set out in Schedule A) during the Term on marketing, advertising, operation, and promotion of the Program subject to the CITY's consent on the initial use
- 5.2 VL will comply with any guidelines set for the use of the Official Mark. VL will obtain the written approval of the CITY at least five (5) days prior to the use of any marketing or advertising material which uses the Official Mark or refers to CITY in the Program.
- 5.3 In the event VL defaults on any of the obligations set out in this Article, the CITY will have the right to terminate use of the Official Mark immediately upon written notice of such default. The City may, at its sole and absolute discretion, provide a period in which VL may cure the default, during which time VL may continue to use the Official Mark pursuant to this Article.
- 5.4 Upon termination of its rights to use the Official Mark, VL will immediately cease any and all use or display of the Official Mark.

6.0 USE OF VL MARK

- 6.1 VL grants to the CITY a non-exclusive, royalty-free, world-wide license to use VL's Mark (as set out in Schedule B) in association with the operation, advertising and promotion of the Program.
- 6.2 The CITY's use of VL's Mark will be subject to VL's consent. The CITY will comply with any guidelines set by VL for the use of VL's Mark. The CITY will make a reasonable effort to obtain written approval from VL at least forty-eight (48) hours prior to the use of any marketing or advertising material which uses VL's Mark. The Parties acknowledge and agree that under urgent circumstances the CITY may seek such approval on a same-day or several-hour basis, and VL shall use best efforts to provide approval under such circumstances.
- 6.3 The CITY is not obligated to use a particular form of VL's Mark and reserves the right to use a colour or black-and-white version of VL's Mark.
- 6.4 In the event the CITY defaults on any of the conditions set out in the Article of this Agreement, VL has the right to terminate the CITY's right to use VL's Mark after receiving written notice of such default, provided that the CITY is given five (5) business days to cure such default, or such other greater period of time set by VL, after written notice of the default is given.
- 6.5 In the event of termination of the CITY's right to use VL's Mark, the CITY will promptly cease to produce materials that contain VL's Mark. The CITY may continue to use or display materials that contain VL's Mark for a period of up to three (3) months after the date of termination.

7.0 THIRD PARTY AFFILIATION

- 7.1 VL shall not permit any trademark, trade name, emblem, logo or other 'official mark denoting or identifying any third party or any third party's products or services to appear in or otherwise form a part of any marketing or advertising materials which display the CITY's Official Mark without the prior written consent of the CITY.
- 7.2 VL shall not participate in a promotion or activity with a person who is not a party of the Program using the Official Marks or otherwise implying an association with the CITY, or its events, programs, services, and/or facilities without the prior written consent of the CITY.

8.0 PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENTS

- 8.1 The Parties will not publicly announce the existence or nature of the Program formed under this Agreement until both Parties consent to such announcement.
- 8.2 The Parties will provide reasonable advance notice to each other of public announcements, events and ceremonies respecting activities governed by this Agreement. The Parties will make a reasonable effort to provide an opportunity for the other Party to participate in such announcements, events and ceremonies.

9.0 REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES

9.1 Each of the Parties represents and warrants that the signatories to this Agreement have been duly authorized to execute and deliver this Agreement on its behalf, that the execution, delivery and performance of this Agreement have been duly and validly authorized and that when executed and delivered, this Agreement will constitute a legal, valid and binding obligation enforceable in accordance with its terms.

10.0 NOTICES AND AMENDMENTS

- 10.1 All notices, demands, amendments, or other communications ("Notices") required or permitted by this Agreement, to be given to any Party, shall be in writing and shall be
 - (a) delivered either to the individual designated below for such Party, or to an individual having apparent authority to accept deliveries on behalf of such Party at its physical address set out below; or
 - (b) sent by registered mail; or
 - (c) sent by electronic mail

at or to the applicable addresses or electronic mail addresses set out below or to such other contact, address or electronic mail address as may be designated by a Party from time to time:

11.0 DISPUTE RESOLUTION

11.1 If a dispute arises concerning the application or interpretation of this Agreement, the Parties will attempt to resolve the matter through negotiation, and may, by mutual consent and at the sole and absolute discretion of the Parties, resolve the matter through mediation with a mutually acceptable mediator or arbitration process in accordance with the *Commercial Arbitration Code* set out in the *Commercial Arbitration Act* (Canada).

12.0 DEFAULT AND TERMINATION

12.1 In the event of default by either Party of any material term or condition of this Agreement, and subject to Section 5.3, the defaulting Party will have thirty (30) days after receiving notice of the default to cure the default or to take steps satisfactory to

the other Party to remedy the default, failing which the other Party may terminate this Agreement effective immediately at the end of such thirty (30) day period by providing notice of termination.

- 12.2 Either Party may terminate this Agreement
 - (a) immediately, upon written notice to the other, if the other Party becomes bankrupt or insolvent or enters into liquidation (other than a voluntary liquidation for reconstruction, amalgamation, or similar reorganization) or has a receiver appointed;
 - (b) on thirty (30) days prior written notice, if the other Party has ceased to carry on business or undergoes a material change in its business activities; and
 - (c) on ten (10) days prior written notice, in the event that the other Party, including its affiliates and representatives, commits or becomes involved in any activity after the date of this Agreement that results in a material reputational risk to either Party, including without limitation activities which cause offense, outrage, ridicule or contempt and which otherwise may negatively affect the reputation of either Party among the public.
- 12.3 If this Agreement is terminated before the expiration of the Term, and except if it is terminated pursuant to Sections 13.1 and 13.2(c),

(a) the CITY will receive a pro rata refund of any amounts paid, or pro rata extinguishing of any amounts due, or both as the case may be for any rights or benefits not received by CITY at the time of termination; and

(b) VL shall make a pro rata payment for any rights or benefits received and not paid for at the time of termination.

13.0 INDEMNITY AND LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

- 13.1 Each Party will indemnify the other Party, its affiliates, and each of their respective directors, officers, employees, elected officials, agents, successors and assigns from and against any liability, loss, cost, damage, settlement, penalty or expense they may incur, including reasonable legal fees and court costs, as a result of
 - (a) the gross negligence or willful misconduct of the indemnifying Party or any agent or contractor acting on its behalf;
 - (b) any improper use of the Official Mark (in the case of VL), and VL's Mark (in the case of the CITY); and
 - (c) any injuries to persons and/or property sustained at any event or activity held or conducted pursuant to the Program, except to the extent that such injury to property or person was caused by the negligence or misconduct of the other Party or any agent, employee or contractor acting on its behalf.

- 13.2 In no event shall either Party be liable to the other for any consequential, incidental, special reliance or indirect damages (including without limitation lost revenue and lost profits) arising out of or related to the Program, its cancellation or any changes thereto in location, date or otherwise, whether such claim is based in contract or tort.
- 13.3 Each Party shall defend and indemnify the other Party and its Indemnified Associates against any third party claim, suit, or proceeding arising out of, related to, or alleging unauthorized disclosure or exposure of personally identifiable information and personal information .

14.0 INSURANCE

14.1 Each Party will be responsible for maintaining a commercially reasonable type and amount of insurance to cover its participation in Program activities. Without limiting the foregoing, each Party will provide and maintain comprehensive general liability insurance coverage in an amount of not less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000.00) per occurrence during the Term.

15.0 ATTENDANCE

15.1 The Parties agree to attend meetings of the VL Board of Directors and CITY Council (or a Standing Committee of Council), if required, to report on the performance of this Agreement, and the Program.

16.0 GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 16.1 **Construction.** The Parties agree that the terms of this Agreement result from negotiations between them. This Agreement will not be construed in favour of or against either Party by reason of authorship.
- 16.2 **Agency.** Nothing in this Agreement is to be construed as authorizing one Party to contract for or to incur any obligation on behalf of the other, or to act as agent for the other Party; or creating a joint venture or agency relationship between the Parties.
- 16.3 **Severability.** If any one or more of the provisions of this Agreement shall be found to be illegal or unenforceable, this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect, and such term or provision shall be deemed severed.
- 16.4 **Confidentiality.** The data, phrases and circumstances of this Agreement are completely confidential between the Parties and shall not be disclosed to anybody else. Any disclosure in violation shall be deemed a breach of this Agreement. Neither Party shall use confidential information for any purpose other than to facilitate the transactions contemplated by the Agreement.
- 16.5 **Intellectual Property and Acquired Data.** All right, title, and interest in generated Intellectual Property and Acquired Data will remain the property of the respective Parties who originated it. Both Parties will promptly notify each other if either becomes aware of any potential infringement with generated Intellectual Property and Acquired Data in the performance of the Program.

- 16.6 **Waiver.** No failure by either Party hereto at any time to give notice of any breach by the other party of, or to require compliance with, any condition or provision of this Agreement shall be deemed a waiver of similar or dissimilar provisions or conditions at the same or at any prior or subsequent time.
- 16.7 **Jurisdiction.** This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the Province of Ontario.
- 16.8 **Assignment.** Neither Party may assign this Agreement to another Party, or any part thereof, nor any amount payable there under, without the prior written consent of the other Party.
- 16.9 **Force Majeure.** No delay, failure, or default, other than a failure to pay fees when due, will constitute a breach of this Agreement to the extent caused by acts of war, terrorism, earthquakes, other acts of God or of nature, strikes or other labour disputes, riots or other acts of civil disorder, embargoes, or other causes beyond the performing Party's reasonable control.
- 16.10 **Counterparts.** This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts. Each counterpart will be an original, but all such counterparts will constitute a single instrument.
- 16.11 **Morality Clause.** VL, and all its employees, directors and management, is not involved in any situation or occurrence which subjects VL to public scandal, disrepute, widespread contempt, public ridicule, dishonesty, moral turpitude, or which is widely deemed by members of the general public, to embarrass, offend, insult or denigrate individuals or groups, or that will tend to shock, insult or offend the community or public morals or decency or prejudice the CITY in general, including without limitation involvement in obscene publications or hate groups. Failing any of the foregoing, the CITY may terminate the Agreement effective immediately and provide written notice post facto. VL would be responsible for any fees from the CITY's termination of the Agreement.

The five white lines represent Vaughan's historic centres, symbolizing a continuity with the past since the City's incorporation in1991. The choice of bright corporate colours recalls a rural heritage and highlights the preservation of green space as the City evolved into a major urban centre. The logo design has a modern flair with clean typography that reflects the City's growth as a vibrant and successful community. The new logo design was approved by Council on May 4, 2010.

The logo typeface is called Gotham. Modern and accessible in terms of legibility, Gotham is a family of geometric sans serif typefaces designed by American type designers Tobias Frere-Jones and Jesse Ragan in 2000.

The City of Vaughan logo should appear in its two-colour version whenever possible. The logo can only appear in blue pantone 294 and green pantone 376. No other brand colour is allowed.

Printing limitations will determine the need for grayscale and one-colour logo options. The reversed one-colour option should only appear on dark solid-coloured backgrounds.

<u>Purpose</u>

To provide Council with York University's first annual update on the progress towards advancing a medical school and health-related research and education at the Vaughan Healthcare Centre Precinct (VHCP).

Report Highlights

- The City of Vaughan's partnership agreement with York University relating to the allocation of lands in the VHCP for the future York University educational facility requires that York U deliver an annual report to Council regarding key milestones and progress towards the realization of the VHCP vision.
- This annual report from York University highlights recent research collaboration initiatives, the success of the first Community Health lecture series, and the progress toward establishing a School of Medicine in the VHCP.
- Staff will continue to work closely with York University to support the establishment of the medical school at the VHCP and advance the site as a world-class destination for excellence in health research, education, practice, and innovation.

Recommendations

 THAT Council receive an update from Rhonda Lenton, President of York University, regarding key milestones and achievements by York University in advanced health-related research and education, and plans for the future medical school at the Vaughan Healthcare Centre Precinct; and 2. THAT the Mayor and the City Clerk be authorized to execute agreements amending the Implementation Principles Agreement and the Option to Purchase Agreement between York University and the City of Vaughan to change the timelines associated with certain milestones in said agreements as detailed in this report, and in a form satisfactory to the Deputy City Manager, Legal and Administrative Services & City Solicitor.

Background

The vision for the Vaughan Healthcare Centre Precinct is a world-class, health innovation destination that will enhance the City's social and economic vitality.

The VHCP will be a destination for excellence in health research, education, commercialization, and innovation. The expertise and physical co-location of Mackenzie Health, York University, and ventureLAB at the VHCP will provide an opportunity to leverage cross-disciplinary expertise and have the VHCP emerge as a leading medical innovation node.

The vision for the VHCP includes the establishment of a dedicated York University facility for research, education, innovation, and community engagement in health.

The City of Vaughan's partnership agreement with York University relating to the allocation of lands in the VHCP for the future York University educational facility requires that York U deliver an annual report to Council regarding key milestones and progress towards the realization of the VHCP vision.

This annual report from York University highlights recent research collaboration initiatives, the success of the first Community Health lecture series, and the progress toward establishing a School of Medicine in the VHCP.

York University has globally recognized expertise and resources to bring to health innovation partnerships, including 11 faculties supporting interdisciplinary health research, 6 health-specific, interdisciplinary Organized Research Units, and dozens of research collaborations in more than 30 countries.

York University offers high-quality health programs – many of which are ranked in the top 100 in the world — and are graduating leaders in nursing, kinesiology, health and biomedical sciences, psychology, neuroscience, health policy, health informatics and management, social work, critical disabilities, global health, health technologies and analytics, and disease modelling.

York University also has a large network of health researchers — including more than 250 faculty members actively conducting research in health-related areas — from neuro and vision science; to cardiovascular disease, diabetes, and inflammatory-related diseases; to mental illness and addiction; to disease modelling and anti-microbial resistance.

With 11 Faculties supporting interdisciplinary health research, more than 250 faculty members actively conducting research in health-related areas, and dozens of research collaborations in more than 30 countries, York University has significant expertise and capacity for research, education, and innovation and is a critical partner in achieving the objectives of the VHCP.

In March 2024, Peter Bethlenfalvy, Minister of Finance, introduced the 2024 Budget in the Ontario Legislature. The budget includes plans to fund and support the establishment of a York University School of Medicine (YUSoM) in Vaughan.

York University has been working to establish a medical school for more than 15 years. In 2022, York University officially submitted a Major Capacity Expansion (MCE) proposal to the Ontario government for a new School of Medicine, to be established at the Vaughan Healthcare Centre Precinct (VHCP).

The recent provincial approval for the YUSoM is a critical milestone in the advancement of the VHCP as a world-class destination for health and health innovation. York University and the City of Vaughan continue to work together to advance this transformative investment and deepen partnerships in the VHCP.

Analysis and Options

Persistent challenges in the current health system highlight the need for innovation and collaboration between key healthcare stakeholders. The colocation of Mackenzie Health, York University and ventureLAB in the VHCP will facilitate the collaborative development of the next generation of healthcare practices, policies, technologies, and talent.

Co-location in the VHCP will facilitate collaboration between Mackenzie Health, York University and ventureLAB at the cutting-edge of health research, education, innovation, and commercialization. Collaboration between York University and Mackenzie Health, including training placements which leverage the hospital's integrated technologies, will help drive a focus on next generation medical and health education which leverages digital and patient-centred practices.

The YUSoM will play a significant role in addressing current health system challenges by focusing on preparing a new generation of primary care physicians who represent and serve diverse communities across the school's catchment areas.

York University is internationally recognized for its top-ranked, interdisciplinary health programs and health science research and innovation. The plans for the new School of Medicine build on that strong foundation addressing urgent unmet needs in central Ontario.

York University's vision is to create positive change by providing a diverse group of students with access to high-quality education at a research-intensive university that is committed to enhancing the well-being of the communities it serves. This transformative investment will generate significant economic and social benefits, and solidify the VHCP as a first-of-its-kind destination for excellence in health education, research, innovation, and practice.

The development of the VHCP will bring significant Return on Investment in the form of one-time and recurring economic benefits of local, regional and national significance.

Development of the VHCP will lead to direct and indirect expansion of the local economy by generating new economic opportunities, employment growth and government revenues.

One-Time Impacts

 More than \$755 million in value added to the Canadian economy, opportunities for some 6,300 full-time equivalent employment positions and upwards of \$276 million in government revenues; the vast majority of which would accrue directly within the City of Vaughan and surrounding GTA.

Recurring Impacts

• Support for a total permanent, on-site employment base of some 1,800 jobs, yielding more than \$350 million in operational output each year (excluding the hospital).

Other Benefits

• Opportunities to enhance the municipal profile of the City of Vaughan, attract major anchor institutions, foster a culture of entrepreneurship and innovation, as well as optimize recent and ongoing spending infrastructure, among other intangible benefits.

Staff will continue to work closely with York University to support the establishment of the medical school at the VHCP and advance the site as a worldclass destination for excellence in health research, education, practice, and innovation.

York University and the City of Vaughan continue to collaborate closely on planning for the new medical school, as well as key capacity-building initiatives such as the Community Health Lecture series and the development of strategies for collaboration within the VHCP partnership. The upcoming mission to Chicago, led by Mayor Del Duca and joined by President Rhonda Lenton, will focus on gaining insights from international exemplars of best practices in health innovation and collaboration and exploring opportunities to translate international models to the VHCP context.

Request to amend certain milestone timelines in Agreements with York University.

On February 6, 2023, the City of Vaughan and York University executed an Option to Purchase Agreement (OPA) and an Implementation Principles Agreement (IPA), to facilitate the establishment of a York University Medical School within the VHCP. Those agreements set out certain milestones that York University must achieve in order to ensure the timely establishment of a medical school in Vaughan. As detailed above and in the presentation from York University, significant work has been completed and milestones achieved by York University over the past year. York University has requested the time set in the agreements for certain milestones be modified as detailed in Attachment 2. Staff have reviewed the requested time extensions and recommend Council approve amendments to the OPA and IPA in accordance with Attachment 2, as requested by York University.

Broader Regional Impacts/Considerations

The Vaughan Healthcare Precinct will become an important regional asset and major employment node that will create economic opportunity and attract skilled labour from across York Region. The VHCP offers a unique value proposition that reflects the ongoing evolution of the City of Vaughan into a major urban centre, leverages the establishment of new transportation and institutional infrastructure in York Region, as well as capitalizes on recent trends and opportunities in the economy relating to healthcare innovation and delivery.

York University's activities in Vaughan, including the establishment of the medical school, will have far reaching social and economic impact across the region by creating new jobs and educational opportunities, attracting and retaining healthcare talent, enhancing the quality and accessibility of healthcare services, and supporting research, training and technological innovation.

Conclusion

It is appropriate that Committee receive the update from Rhonda Lenton, President of York University, regarding key achievements by York University in 2023, and plans for establishing the new School of Medicine at the Vaughan Healthcare Centre Precinct.


Urgent Unmet Need in Primary Care

- Medical education in Ontario, and Canada, <u>does not</u> produce sufficient numbers of comprehensive, practiceready primary care physicians.
- Currently only 1/3 of graduates from Ontario's existing medical schools enter family practice and about 10% of Ontarians do not have a family doctor (expected to rise to 20% by 2025: *Ontario College of Family Physicians*).
- Examining demand versus supply in Ontario shows that there is a 43% shortfall in the supply of family doctors.
- The underperformance of Canada's health system compared to 10 other high-income countries stems from the lack of primary care physicians and the less than optimum integration of health services.



Social Determinants of Health

Over the last two decades, researchers from York and around the world have contributed to a large and compelling body of evidence showing that the social determinants of health, or the conditions in which people are born, grow, live, work and age, account for as much as 30-50% of health outcomes.






Vaughan Healthcare Centre Precinct: Site Plan




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School of Medicine 2019-2022 Timeline



 - 2. Project for **remote rehabilitation for stroke survivors and others** with the York Centre for Vision Research and VISTA researchers .


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- 3. Project on designing technologies for **early-stage dementia patients**.

ACTION: DECISION

<u>Purpose</u>

To provide an update on enforcement matters related to certain Illegal Land Uses, and for Council to consider directing that a letter be sent to the Province requesting enhanced municipal enforcement powers.

Report Highlights

- In June 2023, Council authorized staff to proceed with statutory injunctions against property owners to address illegal land use within the City of Vaughan.
- Since that time, staff have worked collaboratively with internal and external stakeholders. Key outcomes include 2 prohibition orders issued by the courts, over \$20,000 in fines being issued against illegal operators, 11 cease and desist letters being sent, and 3 sites agreeing to decommission operations.
- Materials are drafted to proceed with additional statutory injunctions, and further cease and desist letters will be sent. BCLPS staff will continue to inspect properties and lay charges for non-compliance.
- Advocacy with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing to secure additional enforcement powers is needed to provide more effective enforcement.

Recommendation

1. THAT a letter be sent to the Province requesting enhanced municipal enforcement powers, as described in this report.

Background

At the Committee of the Whole meeting on June 6, 2023, Council directed staff to proceed with statutory injunctions against two properties in Vaughan which are being used for outside storage of shipping containers, trailer trucks and other heavy equipment in contravention of the City's zoning and other by-laws.

Since June, Legal Services and By-law, Compliance, Licensing and Permit Services (BCLPS) have been working closely with external counsel and the prosecutors at York Region in an attempt to bring properties into compliance. A more detailed report of key outcomes is included below.

In addition to these enforcement efforts, staff have put together a <u>webpage relating to</u> <u>commercial trucking in Vaughan</u> to provide additional information to commercial trucking operations as well as citizens. Staff have also been reviewing and updating by-laws, including the Site Alteration By-law, to enhance and expand enforcement tools to address illegal use of agricultural land within the City of Vaughan.

Previous Reports/Authority

<u>Item 24, Report No. 32, of the Committee of the Whole</u>, which was adopted without amendment by the Council of the City of Vaughan on September 28, 2022.

<u>Item 3, Report No. 43, of the Committee of the Whole</u>, which was adopted, as amended, by the Council of the City of Vaughan on December 13, 2022.

<u>Item 4, Report No. 29, of the Committee of the Whole (Closed Session)</u>, as amended, by the Council of the City of Vaughan on June 20, 2023.

Analysis and Options

Enforcement Key Outcomes

Since the June 6, 2023, Committee meeting, the following key outcomes have been achieved:

- Prohibition Order and \$15,000 fine issued against a company operating illegally on Nashville Road. Similar to an injunction, a Prohibition Order is an Order issued by the Provincial Offences Court prohibiting the company from continuing to violate the City of Vaughan's Zoning By-law.
- Prohibition Order and \$7,000 fine issued against a company operating illegally on Highway 50.

- \$1,000 fine issued against a company operating illegally on King-Vaughan Road. The owners agreed to decommission the site, and an inspection conducted on January 18, 2024, indicated that the site is no longer being put to an illegal use.
- The owners of a property on Huntington Road have agreed to decommission the site. An inspection conducted on January 18, 2024, by BCLPS staff found that there is compliance and trucks are no longer being stored on the property.
- The owners of a property along Highway 50 have re-configured the storage so the shipping containers are no longer stacked on top of each other. An inspection conducted on February 26, 2024, found that the containers are less visible from Highway 50.
- The owners of a property on Nashville Road have agreed to remove the tractor trailers and heavy equipment from the property.

Staff have materials prepared to proceed with statutory injunctions on two key properties and expect to file materials in the coming weeks. BCLPS staff continue to work diligently to inspect properties, gather evidence, and lay charges against offending landowners.

Staff continue to liaise with external stakeholders to discuss the best and most effective methods of obtaining compliance in dealing with the illegal use of agricultural land in Vaughan. A confidential communication will be brought forward to Committee of the Whole relating to tools that can be leveraged to address land use impacts of truck yards/shipping storage containers within Vaughan.

Correspondence Requesting Further Enforcement Powers from the Province

Municipalities across the province are dealing with similar enforcement issues against Illegal truck yard operators. Staff will continue to work with our municipal partners on a comprehensive enforcement strategy.

Other municipalities including Caledon, Cobourg, and Puslinch, have passed resolutions regarding illegal land use enforcement, with the aim of asking the provincial government to strengthen municipal enforcement powers, including:

- Amending the *Municipal Act* to enable municipalities to physically bar entry to properties where illegal land uses that have significant detrimental impacts on adjacent residential properties, the environment or create unsafe situations;
- Increasing the maximum penalty amounts in the *Planning Act* to \$50,000 for an individual upon conviction and on a subsequent conviction, and not more than \$25,000 for each day in which the contravention has continued after the day in which the person was initially convicted; and
- Provisions in legislation to ensure a corporation is liable to fines of not more than \$100,000 upon first conviction and not more than \$50,000 for each day in which the contravention has continued after the day in which the corporation was initially convicted.

Staff recommend that a letter be sent to the province requesting similar legislative changes as noted above.

Financial Impact

The legal fees from the City's external counsel will be absorbed through the 2024 operating budget.

Operational Impact

Legal Services and BCLPS continue to work very closely to implement the City's enforcement strategy. Staff continue to explore ways to better facilitate collaboration and information sharing between departments, including Planning and Growth Management, to better improve enforcement and planning outcomes.

Broader Regional Impacts/Considerations

Legal Services and BCLPS continue to collaborate with other municipalities in Ontario to share strategies on addressing illegal use of agricultural lands. Staff continue to work with York Regional Prosecutors, as well as external agencies such as the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks, Toronto and Region Conservation Authority, and the Technical Standards and Safety Authority to ensure properties are in compliance with all applicable laws.

Conclusion

Staff continue to work closely with our internal and external partners on the comprehensive enforcement strategy related to illegal use of agricultural lands in the City of Vaughan. Since the June 2023 Committee meeting, two prohibition orders have been obtained, over \$20,000 in fines have been laid, 11 cease and desist letters have been sent, and 3 properties have agreed to decommission/scale down operations. Staff have materials prepared to proceed with statutory injunctions, and further cease and desist letters will be sent from the City's external counsel. BCLPS staff will continue to investigate properties and lay charges, as needed. Additionally, staff have identified an opportunity to advocate to the province for expanded enforcement powers and are recommending that a letter be sent to the province requesting legislative changes.

Background

Building Safety Month
