STATEMENT OF CULTURAL HERITAGE VALUE



ADDRESS: 10921 Jane Street (Heritage Inventory: Property of Interest)
LOT/CONCESSION: Lot 27, Concession 4
DATE: late 1800s

HISTORICAL/ASSOCIATIVE VALUE:

10921 Jane Street contains two structures on the lot. An archival image indicates that the structure closest to the road once had the address of 10915 Jane Street. This was the location of the first blacksmith shop in Teston, which was owned by John Jackson. The property was later sold to Joseph Lund who built a larger structure to serve as the blacksmith shop, which is the existing building. Years later, the property was bought by David Gray who converted it to a farm machinery establishment. This structure highlights the services that were available within the community of Teston.

The second structure, set back further on the lot, has served as a residence. From the resource *Old Buildings in the Town of Vaughan*, an old map identifies the structure as belonging to “Lund,” and the accompanying description of the property states that the structure was the residence of Mr. Lund. It could be understood that Mr. Lund lived at this residence before moving into the brick structure located at 10945 Jane Street.

Joseph Lund was well known in the community. Along with the blacksmith shop, Joseph Lund owned a general store and also operated an undertaking business. He built wagons, buggies, as well as the first hearse that was used in the area. He also served as a local preacher of the Primitive Methodists. The involvement of Joseph Lund within the community contributes to the understanding of the services that were available in Teston, and the varied skillsets of the residents living in the village.

CONTEXTUAL VALUE:

10921 Jane Street is historically, visually, and physically linked to the area. The significance of the structure stems from being a remnant of the historic Village of Teston, which was previously known as Thanesville. The main structure is located close to the road on the east side of Jane Street, like many of the structures in the area. The property also holds contextual value as the buildings on it are longstanding features historically linked to the surroundings.
