Thank you for the opportunity to respond to the Ward boundary review consulting report.

Providing a single response is impacted by the lack of a decision from the province regarding our regional structure.

If Regional Councils are disbanded, then the number of ward councillors should be changed to 8 (preferred) or 9 (max), including the Mayor. A significant change to ward boundaries would be required. This would enable a more equitable distribution of population served but within existing budgets and office space availability. Vaughan Council should resist the notion of "finding a job" for displaced regional councillors. The focus should be on ward workload and effective representation for each councillor, as well as staffing committee, etc.. I would also hope that all existing support staff would be able to find jobs with new Councillors or within the City Corporation.

If Regional Councils are retained as is, and assuming that Regional Councillors have a reasonable workload compared to war councillors, then the existing boundaries should be modified to retain the same number of Ward Councillors. I am however uncertain if this workload assumption is accurate as my experience is that residents contact Ward Councillors about issues more frequently than Regional Councillors. The Consultants should be asked if they have a view on such workload balance issues. I recognize that Wards 1 and 4 are above the average and this will only get more lopsided as population within Vaughan increases within those two wards in particular.

If the province actually intends to make a decision about Regional Councils in 2025, then Vaughan Council should consider waiting for that to occur before going ahead with

changes.



### **Official Plan Review Process**

The Project commenced in 2020, but the work plan had to change course several times in response to **Provincial changes**.

- Original workplan: update the Official Plan through a single Official Plan Amendment
- **Spring 2023:** The implementing Official Plan Amendment was split into Part A (conformity matters, to be adopted in Fall 2023), and Part B (non-conformity matters, to be adopted in Spring 2024).
- **Fall 2023:** In response to Bill 150 and revocation of the approval of York Region Official Plan 2022 (ROP), the adoption of Part A was put on hold.
- **Spring 2024:** With the re-approval of the ROP, the project was resumed as a Comprehensive OPA, with the first draft released in June 2024 for public review.
- Fall/Winter 2024: Given the comprehensive nature of the OPA, it was decided to prepare a new Official Plan.






Work completed to-date is consolidated in the new draft **Vaughan Official Plan 2025** that:

- Responds to Provincial policy and legislative changes;
- Conforms with the YROP, 2022;
- Implements project background work; and
- Integrates feedback received through engagement









### Provincial Planning Statement, 2024

- The Provincial Planning Statement, 2024 replaces the 2020 version and A Place to Grow: Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe
- Key changes impacting the City include the removal of:
  - Office uses as a permitted use in Employment Areas,
  - Municipal Comprehensive Review as a requirement for Employment Area conversions and Settlement Area Boundary Expansions; and
  - Urban Growth Centre, the 2006 Built Boundary, and Designated Greenfield Areas,

- Removal of references to York Region as the approval authority for the Official Plan

Since VOP 2010, the Provincial policy framework for intensification has changed significantly, with the major focus now on intensification around transit stations

- Revised and new policies for Employment Areas to meet the new Provincial definition for Employment Area, and for Core Employment Areas and Supporting Employment Areas

The PPS 2025 and the *Planning Act* prohibit commercial and institutional uses (including office) from Employment Areas

- Alignment with provincial requirement for municipalities to plan for a range of housing options and affordable housing needs

Consider a **broad spectrum of housing types and tenures,** including retirement facilities

The Planning Act now permits three Additional Residential Units as-of-right in urban areas that have municipal water and sewage servicing

#### What has changed?

- Reorganization and streamlining urban design policies around public realm and built form to improve readability
- Enhanced universal design policies to support equity, inclusivity, diversity, and flexibility in buildings and the public realm
- Removal of angular plane requirement for low rise buildings to increase flexibility for builders
- Increased guidance for the design of high-rise buildings to align with the City-wide Urban Design Guidelines



Comments received through engagement noted that innovation and flexibility should be considered in urban design

3.4 Economy and Employment



Encourage the development of **flexible employment** uses that can adapt to the changing needs of modern workplaces

- Revised policies related to the Provincial changes to permitted uses in Employment Areas and for employment-supportive uses
- Policies that encourage Major Office developments in Strategic Growth Areas, direct future office uses around Protected Major Transit Station Areas or along Intensification Corridors where multi-modal transportation and existing or planned frequent transit service will be available
- Increased guidance for retail uses, including Major Retail uses, to maintain retail amenities for residents as mixed-use and residential development increases

3.5 Parks and Open Space



Comments received through engagement encouraged the City to increase the quantity and quality of parks, landscaping and naturalized greenspaces

- Updated Strata Park policies and interim Open Space policies
- New Parkland Dedication policies in alignment with the City's Parkland Dedication By-law

#### What has changed?

- Updated policies based on Provincial modifications to the role and responsibilities of Conservation Authorities

- New systems approach for the City's Natural Heritage Network, aligning with the Province's goal of diverse and connected natural features in a natural heritage system

- New policies for urban agriculture to align with Provincial policy

Engagement feedback noted that the City should support more walkable communities

- New policies implementing the Vaughan Transportation Plan and Pedestrian and Bicycle Master Plan to support safe and connected active transportation and transit networks

- Focused policies on active transportation and the transit network that aim to achieve complete streets
- New policies that prioritize the development of localized networks within existing communities and intensification areas

#### What has changed?

- Reorganization of municipal services, utilities and infrastructure policies to improve readability

- Expansion of policies that support an integrated approach to planning for growth and municipal infrastructure

**Chapter 4**

- Change in ground-floor retail requirements for Mixed-Use designations to provide more flexibility for site-specific and area-specific retail needs



The overall objective of achieving compact, complete communities can be supported by increased guidance and direction for mixed-use development.





**Chapter 4**

#### What has changed?

- Deleted the Community Commercial Mixed-Use designation and redesignated lands to Mid-Rise Mixed-Use to allow for greater diversity of land uses
- New permissions for live-work units, home occupations, additional residential units, and fourplexes (subject to zoning implementation)
- New permissions for stacked/back-to-back townhouses to transition Low-Density areas with Medium-Density and High-Density areas

These changes reflect the need to diversify uses and provide for a variety of building forms in both mixed-use and residential areas.

- Guidance for employment supportive uses in Prestige Employment designations to increase amenities available to employers and employees
- Lands in New Community Areas and New Employment Areas retain their existing land use designation from Vaughan Official Plan 2010 until a Secondary Plan(s) for those areas are completed



These changes implement new policy guidance in Chapters 2 and 3 for Employment Areas and New Community/Employment Areas.

#### What has changed?

- New policies for engagement with Indigenous Peoples
- Expanded engagement and public consultation policies to reflect City protocols and conform to Provincial direction
- Updated pre-application consultation policies, previously adopted by Council in 2023 and amended to reflect Bill 185
- New policies enabling future Inclusionary Zoning and Community Planning Permit Systems to promote an appropriate range and mix of housing
- Updated policies to guide Community Benefit Charges, aligning with Bill 108, defining a broader process for capturing benefits from development



#### **Background**

The subject staff report provides a project update on the Draft New VOP 2025, including the project timeline.

Subsection 17(15) of the *Planning Act* sets out the requirements for consultation with the appropriate approval authority and prescribed public bodies and requires at least one (1) Public Meeting before adopting a new official plan. A statutory Public Meeting was held on October 13, 2023, through the prior process as an update to VOP 2010. However, due to the significant changes to the Project work plan and approach (i.e., proceeding with a new official plan), a new Statutory Public Meeting is required to present the Draft New VOP 2025 and provide an opportunity for feedback from the public and the Committee of the Whole. Non-statutory Public Open Houses will also be held as described in the Project timeline below. Feedback received by the public and the Committee of the Whole at the March 4 April 1, 2025, Statutory Public Meeting will be considered and addressed in a comprehensive staff report at a future Committee of the Whole meeting."

## WB&CCR - Background



Council directed staff to conduct a Ward Boundary and Council Composition Review at its meeting of September 26, 2023.



The City of Vaughan contracted Watson and Associates Economists Ltd. to conduct the review, in association with Dr. Robert J. Williams, Dr. Zachary Spicer and ICA Associates Inc.




The first phase of the project was initiated in April, 2024, with a series of internal stakeholder engagements including interviews with the Mayor and Members of Council and senior municipal staff, and a Council Education Session in May.



The public launch of the project occurred in September with the launch of the project website, informational materials and videos, an online engagement survey and five in-person open houses across the city.






#### Public Engagement – Council Composition




#### Regional Council Composition

#### **Context**

- York Region Council: 21 members: 9 mayors of the lower-tier municipalities and 11 Regional Councillors who also sit on local councils ("double direct"), plus an appointed Chair
- Municipal Act 2001, section 218 (d) (6) "Following the regular election in 2018 and following every second regular election after that, a regional municipality shall review, for each of its lower-tier municipalities, the number of members of its council that represent the lower-tier municipality."
- York Region initiated a review of its composition ahead of the 2018 municipal election but did not complete it (triple majority required).
- In 2020 York Region Council approved a fourth Regional Councillor for Vaughan.





#### 2023

The Province pledged to appoint facilitators for each Region but did not do so.

#### 2024

Review assigned to Standing Committee on Heritage, Infrastructure and Cultural Policy. There are currently no public hearings scheduled for this committee.



#### **Alternative Council Composition**

#### Introduction



Staff have informed the Consultant team that the Province of Ontario is considering governance changes to York Region that could immediately impact the WBR.

- Having only lower-tier mayors represent their municipalities on York Region council
- Employ a weighted vote system

To be proactive, the Consultant Team has explored what alternative options might look like for the City of Vaughan.

#### **Alternative Options**

## Option 1 Six Members (Five Local Councillors and the Mayor)

Council Size	Population Per Ward	Analysis
Six members (five local councillors and the mayor)	66,616	This structure is familiar to Vaughan Council members. Currently, five local councillors are elected from five wards. This option would not include Local and Regional councillors, which is a big change from the current setup. Each councillor's workload would likely increase, and they would need more support to stay responsive to the community.

## Option 2 Seven Members (Six Local Councillors and the Mayor)

Council Size	Population Per Ward	Analysis
Seven members (six local councillors and the mayor)	55,347	This option would add one more local councillor. Even with this addition, the council would still be smaller than it is now. Having more members at the council table would help ease some of the challenges faced by smaller councils. There would be one more councillor to serve on various agencies, boards, and commissions, which would slightly reduce the workload for each member. This model would still keep some advantages, such as making council decisions more efficient.

#### **Alternative Options**

## Option 3 Eight Members (Seven Local Councillors and the Mayor)

Council Size	Population Per Ward	Analysis
Eight members (seven local councillors and the mayor)	47,440	Starting from the seven-member option, an eight-member council would spread the workload even better. This means councillors could spend more time on issues in their areas. With more councillors, there might be less need for extra staff support. Each councillor would represent fewer people, but, without local and Regional councillors, they might get more requests for help from the people in their ward.

## Option 4 Nine Members (Eight Local Councillors and the Mayor)

Council Size	Population Per Ward	Analysis
Nine members (eight local councillors and the mayor)	41,510	This model would spread the workload better among the council members and allow them to connect more directly with the people they represent, since each councillor would be responsible for fewer residents. For a council of this size, the efficiency gained from having only five or six members starts to decrease, which means council meetings might take longer, even though the workload is more evenly distributed.

#### **Alternative Options**

## Option 5 Ten Members (Nine Local Councillors and the Mayor)

Council Size	Population Per Ward	Analysis
Ten members (nine local councillors and the mayor)	36,898	This council size is familiar for Vaughan and could likely work more like the way it does today. The time spent on discussions and the amount of work would be about the same. However, each councillor would represent almost half the number of residents they do now, making them more responsive to the needs of their constituents. Since the council size is familiar, it would probably need similar resources, meaning little to no changes would be required for council chambers, office space, or staffing.

## Option 6 Eleven members (10 Local Councillors and the Mayor)

Council Size	Population Per Ward	Analysis
Eleven members (10 local councillors and the mayor)	33,208	This option adds one more member to council and would slightly reduce the number of residents each councillor has to represent. It could also bring some of the problems mentioned in the Interim Report, like slower decision-making and higher costs.

#### Questions for Council: Size of Council

#### **Status Quo (no change to regional structure):**

#### Should the size of Vaughan's council:

- Remain the same? That is, with ten members including the Mayor elected at-large and nine Councillors elected by ward, by general vote or by some combination of wards and general vote; or
- Increase in size? In this scenario, any adjustment would come from adding additional Local Councillors.
- Feedback suggested that the Consultant Team should explore scenarios with Council size remaining the same or increasing the number of local wards by 1.

#### **No Regional Councillors:**

#### Vaughan's council size could:

- Remain at its current overall size (10). This would include a Mayor elected-at large, and nine Local Councillors, elected in wards; or
- Maintain the current number of Local Councillors, elected in wards. This would create a council of 6

   the Mayor elected at-large and five Local
   Councilors elected in wards; or
- Increase the number of Local Councilors, to a figure between 6-8. Including the Mayor, who would remain elected at-large; this would produce a council of between 7 to 9 total members.

Providing answers to this question does not bind council to a particular size as the Ward Boundary Review continues but rather, will define the configurations that would be palatable and reasonable for the Consultant Team to explore in the second round of consultation.
