Automated Speed Enforcement

As part of our ongoing commitment to road safety, the City launched an Automated Speed Enforcement program, which uses cameras and speed measurement devices to enforce speed limits in identified areas.

The program launched on April 23, 2025. Ten mobile cameras will be rotated throughout various locations across the city. Cameras are positioned in Community Safety Zones, prioritizing those sites based on speeding concerns, overall traffic volumes, collision history and the presence of sidewalks or cycling facilities, schools, parks, community centres and libraries.

Vaughan launches Automated Speed Enforcement program

Road safety continues to be a leading priority for the City of Vaughan – and we're taking many steps to reduce speeding in our community. The latest launched today – Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE)

Mayor Steven Del Duca and Members of Council officially kicked off the program by revealing the first 'Municipal Speed Camera Coming Soon' sign on Ansley Grove Road, south of Misty Meadow Drive.

As part of our ongoing commitment to protecting our most vulnerable road users, speed cameras are coming to [Community Safety Zones](#) citywide, including school zones, on a priority basis starting in the new year. ASE uses a camera and speed measurement device to enforce speed limits. If a vehicle exceeds the posted speed limit in an ASE area, the system captures an image to be reviewed by a Provincial Offences Officer. An image of the offence, licence plate and ticket with an associated fine are then mailed to the vehicle's owner (regardless of who was driving) within 30 days.

Signage is now in place in locations where cameras will be installed in early 2025 when 10 mobile cameras will go live across the city. The locations were chosen using a data-driven approach to identify areas where speeding is of most concern, prioritizing sites based on overall traffic volume, collision history and the presence of sidewalks, cycling facilities, schools, parks, community centres and libraries.

Evidence and research indicate other jurisdictions have effectively used ASE to reduce speeds on local roads, contributing to a safer road network for all users. Residents may have already noticed speed cameras in Vaughan because [York Region's ASE program](#) is currently in place along some regional roads.

Slow down in community safety zones!



Road safety is a leading priority for the City. That's why the City is working towards implementing an Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE) program within Community Safety Zones, including school zones. Starting in 2025, ASE cameras will be live across the city to ensure that vehicles travelling in excess of the posted speed limits in designated Community Safety Zones are caught on camera. The City took a data-driven approach to identify locations for the speed cameras to ensure we target areas where speeding is a concern.

The ASE program is just one of the many ways the City is working to reduce speeding in Vaughan through the MoveSmart Mobility Management Strategy, which helps form and direct the city's vision to provide a safer, more efficient and sustainable transportation system.

More funding for York Regional Police

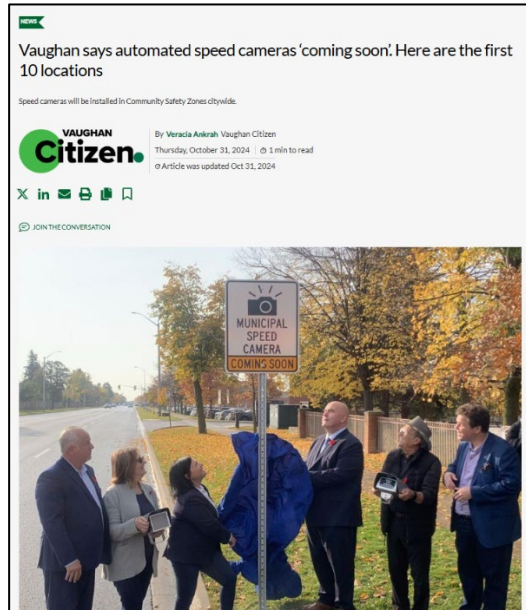

Avoiding a ticket is simple – drive the speed limit! Speed limits are not guidelines – they are the law. Fines are determined under the Ontario Highway Traffic Act, and they correspond with the amount over the speed limit the vehicle is travelling at when the image is taken.

Automated speed enforcement is designed to work in tandem with other road safety methods and strategies, including road designs, education initiatives and traditional police enforcement. The City of Vaughan's automated speed enforcement cameras will go live in 10 locations across Vaughan on Wednesday, April 23, with the goal of keeping all road users safe. Following an extensive notification period, which began in October 2024, this is the next step we're taking to reduce speeding and prioritize road safety for everyone in our community.

With just one week until the cameras go live, we're answering your top questions about the City's Automated Speed Enforcement program.

Why is the City implementing an Automated Speed Enforcement program?

The Automated Speed Enforcement program is another way the City is enhancing road safety across Vaughan. This program is a key initiative under the [MoveSmart Mobility Management Strategy](#) @MoveSmart, which focuses on improving the municipal road network and road safety, and supporting the development of more cycling and pedestrian infrastructure to create fully connected and integrated communities.

Where will the cameras be installed?

The City's Automated Speed Enforcement program will only operate in designated [Community Safety Zones](#) where some of our most vulnerable residents – including children and seniors – live, work and play. These areas are marked with signage indicating when you enter and leave them.

'Municipal Speed Camera Coming Soon' signage was installed in October 2024 at 10 locations where mobile cameras will go live on Wednesday, April 23. How will I know if I'm driving in an area with an automated speed enforcement camera?

Once the cameras are operational on April 23, 'Municipal Speed Camera in Use' signs will replace 'Coming Soon' signage within each designated Community Safety Zone.

Are the automated speed enforcement cameras permanent?

During the first year, the cameras will be rotated in Community Safety Zones across the city on a quarterly basis.

What time of day do automated speed enforcement cameras enforce the speed limit?

Automated speed enforcement cameras in Vaughan will be operational 24 hours a day, seven days a week on local roads. The time of day or year does not affect the enforcement of the speed limit. The speed limit is always 40 kilometres per hour in all Community Safety Zones. The best way to avoid getting a ticket is by driving the speed limit.

Is automated speed enforcement simply a revenue-generating tool?

All revenues generated from this program will be invested back into protecting our most vulnerable road users, including children and seniors.

Is there a set speed above which the camera will issue a ticket?

Speed limits are not guidelines – they are the law, and the best way to avoid receiving a ticket is to comply with the posted speed limit.

Any driver travelling at or below the posted speed limit will be observed as following the rules established in the Ontario Highway Traffic Act and will not be ticketed by the automated speed enforcement cameras. All of Vaughan's cameras will be programmed by the camera vendor in accordance with the guidelines set by a provincial steering committee. This ensures uniformity and transparency across the province.

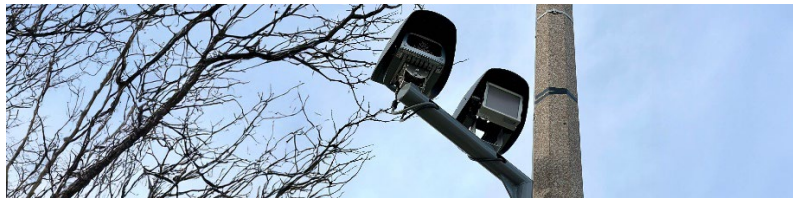

After being announced in October 2024, automated speed cameras will go live in Vaughan on April 23, according to the city.

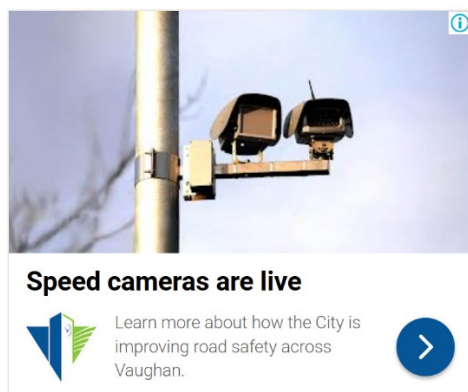

Avoid a ticket, drive the limit!

Road safety continues to be a leading priority for the City of Vaughan. We are taking many steps to reduce speeding in our community and help keep everyone safe, especially children and other vulnerable road users.

As of April 23, speed cameras will be **LIVE** every day, 24/7, in 10 locations on rotation across the city to enforce speed limits. The posted speed limit should



always be followed regardless of the time or day of the week.

These cameras are designed to work together with other road safety methods and strategies to keep residents safe, including road designs, education initiatives and traditional police enforcement.

Vaughan's cameras are in Community Safety Zones, with locations selected based on speeding concerns, overall traffic volumes, collision history and the presence of schools, community centres, parks, sidewalks or cycling facilities, and libraries.

Let's work together to keep our roads safe – the best way to avoid a ticket is to drive the limit!

The City's spring maintenance is underway



Spring has sprung, and so have our spring maintenance crews! To ensure you can make the most of our community this season, the City's Public Works teams are working hard to keep our public spaces clean, beautiful and safe for your enjoyment.

The City's spring cleaning efforts began in March, with crews collecting litter from Vaughan's parks and open spaces, such as paths and trails. Madrac – the City's litter collection vacuum – has returned to Vaughan sidewalks to pick up litter and debris.

The City's street-sweeping program begins in April each year and takes approximately eight to 10 weeks to complete one cycle across

Vaughan. This process prevents unwanted materials from flowing into stormwater drains, river pollution, sewer backups and road flooding.

The annual Stormwater Management Pond Maintenance begins in May and wraps up by October. During this seasonal maintenance, three rounds of litter cleanup and grass cutting will be completed at each pond.

Shrub bed planting and maintenance (including pruning, mulching, weeding, litter cleanup and watering) will take place regularly throughout the season. Grass cutting begins the last week of April and continues every other week throughout the spring and summer.

Crews have begun their annual inspections of more than 10,000 fire hydrants. Preventative maintenance and inspections are performed annually on each hydrant across the city and include flushing, leak testing, cap lubrication and part replacements.

Your role in water conservation



Let's conserve water for future generations! Try these tips to reduce your water use:

- 1. Save water at home**
Turn off the tap while brushing your teeth and run the dishwasher and washing machine only when full.
- 2. Protect your drinking water source**
Whatever enters Vaughan's stormwater system flows into bodies of water like Lake Ontario – Vaughan's drinking water source. Keep fertilizers, yard waste, food scraps and other materials out of drains.
- 3. Check for water leaks**
Most home water leaks are hard to detect and can lead to high water consumption.

Stay safe on trails and in parks



Parks and open spaces are great places to exercise, gather with friends and enjoy nature. Be sure to stay safe while having fun at Vaughan's parks and trails by following these tips:

- Ride bikes on designated paths and do not exceed 20 kilometres/hour.
- Keep dogs on a leash, unless in a designated off-leash area. Pick up and put droppings in the garbage.
- Use campfires and barbecues only in designated areas and with a Fire Burn Permit from the City.

• Setting off fireworks in a park, roadway, sidewalk or other public property is illegal.

• Don't use off-road vehicles in parks, woodlots or open spaces.
