

Taking steps to reduce speeding Vaughan launches Automated Speed Enforcement program

Road safety continues to be a leading priority for the City of Vaughan – and we're taking many steps to reduce speeding in our community. The latest launched today – Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE)!

Mayor Steven Del Duca and Members of Council officially kicked off the program by revealing the first *'Municipal Speed Camera Coming Soci* sign on Ansley Grove Road, south of Misty Meadow Drive.



spart of our onging commitment to protecting our most vulnerable road users, speed ameras are coming to <u>Community Safety Zones</u> citywide, including school zones, on a molify basis starting in the new year. A Sci uses a camera and speed measurement device inforce speed limits. Signage is now in place in locations where cameras will be installed in early 2025 when 10 mobile cameras will go live across the dty. 



The cameras will be in place in 10 locations, which were selected based on overall traffic volume, collision history and the presence of buildings, such as schools and parks. The locations will be rotated periodically in different community safety zones across the city over the next year.

Automated speed enforcement uses a camera and speed measurement device to enforce speed limits. If a vehicle exceeds the posted speed limit, the system captures an image that is reviewed by a Provincial Offences Officer. An image of the offence, licence plate and ticket with an associated fine are then mailed to the vehicle's owner (regardless of who was driving) within

30 days.

Evidence and research indicate other jurisdictions have effectively used this system to reduce speeds on local roads, contributing to a safer road network for all users. 
