EV-2137-19 Installation of Water Sampling Stations

Recommendation

The Deputy City Manager of Public Works, the Deputy City Manager of Corporate Services, City Treasurer and CFO, and the Director of Environmental Services, in consultation with the Director of Financial Services/Deputy City Treasurer and the Director of Financial Planning and Development Finance/Deputy City Treasurer, recommend:

 That the attached detail sheet, Attachment 1 for EV-2137-19 Installation of Water Sampling Stations, be received for consideration in the 2020 Draft Budget 2021 - 2022 Financial Plan.

Background

In order to satisfy regulatory requirements for water quality sampling (O. Reg. 170), the City is required to complete a certain number of representative samples of the water distribution system to maintain quality and ensure the safety of the City's potable water. Dedicated sampling stations would improve sampling efficiency through better access to sampling stations and provide the ability to collect round-the-clock samples as compared to the current sampling sites (e.g. schools, recreation centres, etc.).

In reference to the Internal Audit Report dated April 8, 2019 on the Water, Wastewater and Stormwater Operations of the Environmental Services Departments, one of the audit recommendations was to develop appropriate criteria for when it may be suitable to meet and/or exceed the statutory requirements for the quantity of water samples collected.

Staff reviewed the sampling programs of neighbouring municipalities for benchmarking purposes. The City used the benchmarking data, in conjunction with Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) regulations, to determine the number of sampling stations required for Vaughan's water system. The study determined the city will need approximately 150 sampling stations. The installation of the sampling stations is expected to commence in 2020 and will take approximately 20 months to complete.

Economic Impact

The total cost of the project is estimated to be approximately \$2.5 million (including the administrative fee and applicable taxes) for the installation of approximately 150 sampling stations. It is proposed that \$825,000 will be reallocated from the draft 2021 plan and moved forward to the draft 2020 budget. Additionally, a further amount of \$170,000 will be required in the draft 2020 budget, funded by the water reserve. The revised budget submission is illustrated in Attachment 1 and details of financial impact are shown below.

Conclusion

\$825,000 will be reallocated from the draft 2021 plan to the draft 2020 budget and an additional amount of \$170,000 is requested in the 2020 budget process to install approximately 150 water sampling stations, with installation to commence in 2020. The water reserve will fund the entire initiative.

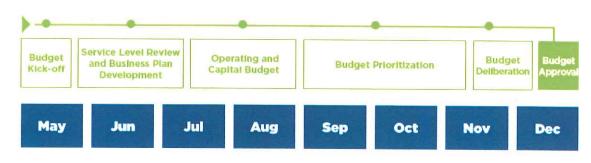

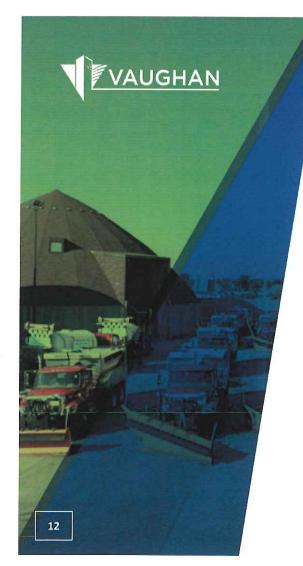

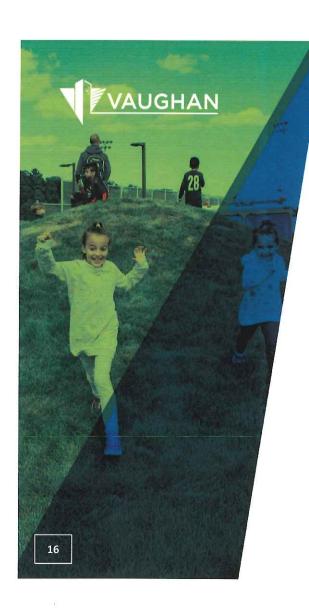

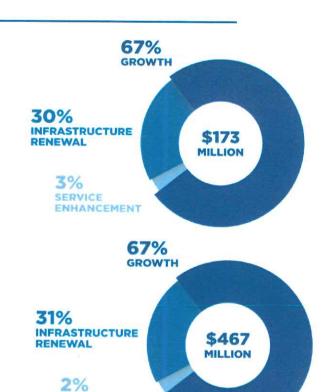

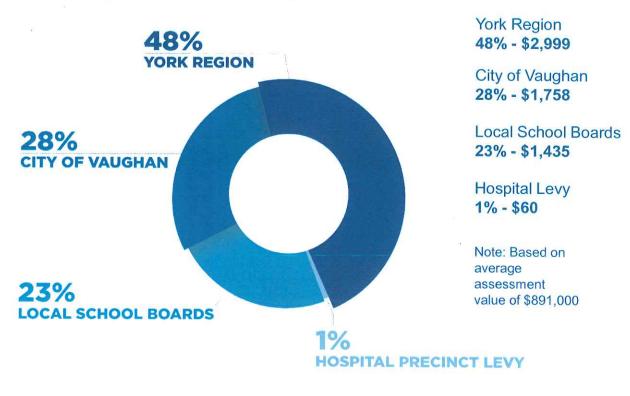

Average Residential Tax Bill

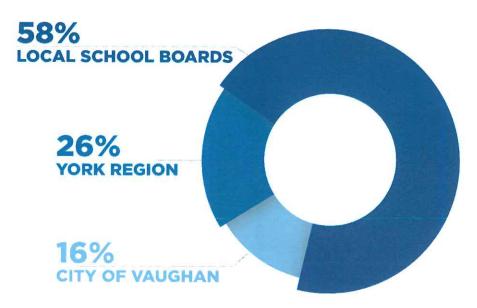

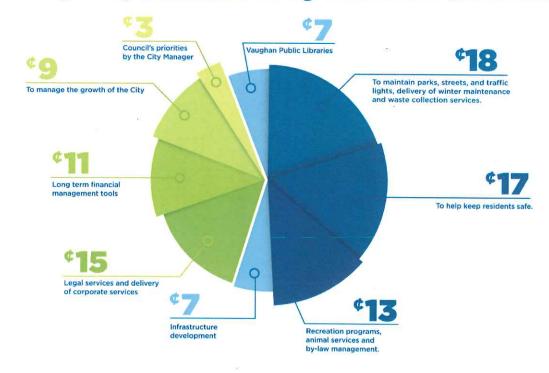

City Expenditures by Service (per tax dollar)

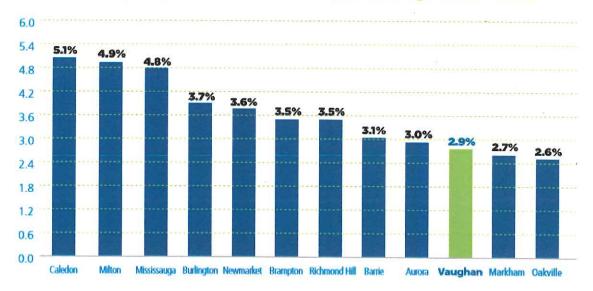




Property Tax Rate Among Lowest in GTA

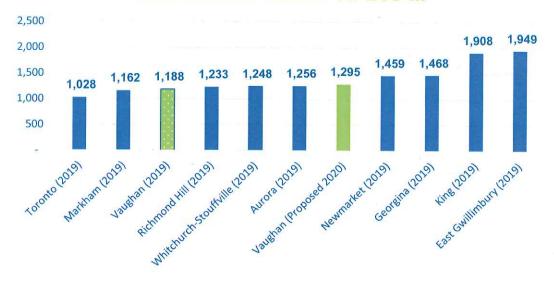
Municipal Property Tax Increases: Five-year Average (2015-2019)
