TASS – Technology, Access and Support for Seniors

- TASS offers senior-friendly and customized technology, access and support to seniors and senior-serving organizations across Ontario
- Initially designed as an antidote to COVID to keep seniors connected, informed, active and healthy at Human Endeavour
- TASS quickly became a collaborative project with the help of Seniors Cluster Table, led by York Region and United Way Greater Toronto and supported by many non-profits
- Human Endeavour is the backbone technology and support organization

Technology Challenges for Seniors and Senior-serving Sector

- Lack of digital literacy
- Affordability by seniors
- Migration of seniors to online environment
- Developing scalable and replicable model
- Cost effective
- Tight time frame

TASS – Senior-Friendly Customized Solution

Integrated & Simplified Technology

- Tablets (simplified, automated, pre-programmed)
- Internet (built in data, 12 Giga Byte/month)
- Safety & data control (blocked unsafe sites)
- Remote access and support





Making a Broader Impact

- 640+ tablets, 30+ collaborating organizations
- Offering tech support to 850+ TASS seniors
- Offering monthly tech capacity-building workshops (4000+ seniors from 160+ organizations benefited)
- Helpline/Call centre handles 900-1000+ calls/interactions from Ontario

Making a Broader Impact

- Designed Accessible Tablets for seniors who are blind/deaf

- Designing tablets for seniors with early Alzheimer's and Dementia, Parkinson or Multiple Sclerosis
- Proposing a five year technology roadmap for seniors
- Setup Provincial Technology Advisory Committee
- York University is completing research on TASS, next are some findings

Technology as a Social Determinant of Health

- 86% seniors agreed that TASS helped to maintain physical and emotional health
- 85% seniors agreed that TASS helped to maintain social connections
- 93% required initial training from the TASS helpline
- Without a TASS tablet, 67% seniors would not have joined online programs, 28% would have joined with difficulty, only 6% would have joined without any difficulty
- 75% seniors want in-person & online environment post-COVID
- Digital literacy and technology has significantly reduced several risks and barriers for seniors and organizations. e.g. COVID risk, transport, weather, cost, frailty etc.

Recommendations

City of Vaughan's Older Adult Strategy should:

- **Recognize** technology as a social determinant of health
- **Collaborate** to provide technology, access and support to vulnerable seniors to keep them safe, informed, active and healthy
- Mandate technology in future infrastructures to design age friendly communities

TASS Technology Road Map (2020-2025) Current and past Funders

TASS Technology Road Map (2020-2025)

- Based on our 15-year experience of working with diverse seniors, discussion with partner organizations, recent research, and learning from the pandemic, we are proposing the following technology roadmap:
- **TASS Project:** In-home senior-friendly technology, access and technical support
- **Focus:** *Keep seniors safe, connected, active and healthy during the pandemic*
- **Status:** Designed, implemented, and operating since May 2020-ongoing
- **TASS Accessible Project:** In-home accessible technology for blind/deaf seniors.
- **Focus:** Enable blind/deaf seniors to be productive, engaged, and active in daily life activities
- Status: Designed, implemented, and Active. 2021-ongoing
- TASS Technical Capacity Building Project:
- **Focus:** Build capacity of organizations, management, and front-line staff on the use of technology during the pandemic. Provide one-on-one technical support to organizations.
- **Status:** Designed, implemented, and operating. 2020-ongoing
- Integrate TASS and non-TASS Devices Project:
- **Focus:** Provide technical support to seniors and organizations not using TASS technology/tablets
- Status: TBD

TASS Technology Road Map (2020-2025)

- TASS Technology for early Alzheimer's and Dementia, Multiple Sclerosis (MS), Parkinson's disease
- **Focus:** In-home technology, auto-monitoring of Activities of Daily Living (ADL), assisting in ADLs (e.g., reminders), and continuously generating health and wellbeing status for caregivers/service providers
- Status: In development. Design and Implementation in mid-2022
- TASS Technology for Long Term Care / Nursing Home Facilities
- **Focus:** Auto-monitoring of various aspects of seniors' daily living and personal conditions to preserve the quality of life of frail seniors and help staff to provide efficient and timely care
- Status: In development. Design and Implementation in late 2022-2023
- TASS Technology for Monitoring of Vital Signs and Chronic Diseases
- **Focus:** In-Home (can be scaled for groups) to monitor chronic diseases and generate continuous health status indicators, generate necessary triggers for caregivers and/or paramedics to take immediate action to avoid hospitalization and extreme fluctuations in health
- Status: TBD
- TASS Technology to Build Smart Homes, Buildings, Communities, and Cities for Seniors
- **Focus:** The use of the Internet of Things (IoT), Artificial Intelligence (AI), and Machine Learning (ML) will set up an infrastructure in a smart city that can improve accessibility to a wide range of daily services for the seniors and ensure their independence as well as inclusion.
- Status: TBD





Who leads your current AFC I[nitiative] planning/implementation?





- Funded by the Government of Ontario through the Ministry for Seniors and Accessibility


Ontario AFC Outreach Program



12 AFC Planning Questions

Step 1: Define Local Principles	 Are the right voices at the table? (Governance) What is the vision for our work together? (Vision)
Step 2: Assess Needs	3. What are the underlying needs and assets in the community? (Needs and Assets)
Step 3: Develop an	4. What are the short-term and long-term goals, target populations, and objectives? (Goals)
Action Plan	 What changes, interventions or programs should be used to reach your AFC goals and objectives? (Best Practice)
	6. What actions need to be taken so that the selected strategies "fit" the community context? (Fit)
	7. What organizational capacities, partnerships and resources are needed to implement the Action Plan? (Capacities)
Step 4: Implement	8. How will the Action Plan be implemented? (Plan and Implement)
and Evaluate	9. How will the implementation of the Action Plan be monitored? (Process Evaluation)
	10. How well did the Action Plan perform? (Outcome Evaluation)
	11. How can the quality of the Action Plan be improved over time? (Quality Improvement)
	12. If the Action Plan is successful, how will it be sustained and refreshed? (Sustain)

Our recent webinar, Intergenerational Connections through the GrandPals Project: Insights, Discussion and Next Steps, discusses a successful intergenerational program, called GrandPals, that connects middle school students with older adults for mutual learning, storytelling and friendship. GrandPals was first implemented in 2010 in Orangeville, Ontario with the support of the local age-friendly community initiative (AFCI) and has since been implemented in 55 classes at 9 elementary schools.

Intergenerational activities are an important age-friendly practice that have the potential to reduce ageism, foster social inclusion and enhance community vitality. AFCIs have been identified as a key partner to strengthen the impact of GrandPals and enable its growth to more communities. 




